A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate or Waterworks Fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the general Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such Water Works Fund for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

3rd. The amount of Poll Tax to be paid by every person returned by the said Assessors in said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll as liable for such Water Works Fund under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the sum of Ten Cents (10c) on the poll of every person so assessed and returned as aforesaid.

A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December A. D. 1899.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. A discount at the rate of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1899, pay to the City Clerk at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein, made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

THE UNITED STATES AND THE PHILIPPINES

If the Philippines should continue to refuse to submit to the power of the United States, the United States people may, ere long, be able to appreciate and understand, better than they have ever done, the difficulties under which the English troops labored at the time of the American revolution. Fighting in a wild and unknown country, unacclimatized, against enemies who fire upon them from ambushes, unexpectedly, dogging their line of march in front, flank and rear, picking off their commanders and prominent officers, the United States troops, brave as they are, have yet a worrying and difficult task to perform in the Philippines—if only the Filipinos show that they are true patriotic men. The condition of public opinion in the United States is not calculated to inspire the United States soldiers. There is a feeling abroad throughout the States that forcing the Philippines to submit in their own land is not quite consistent with their republican principle. More than that there is the same doubt concerning their moral right to fight the Filipinos in their own land that existed in England when the Americans were fighting for their civil rights and their political freedom. A writer for Harper's Weekly, (Mr. F. S. Martin,) hits off the American condition of mind very aptly. He says:—

"As to the Philippines, though it certainly appears at present that there is nothing for it but to go and fight out the fighting end of that job, and then tackle the rest of it, it is strange that honest men have had all sorts of feelings and opinions about those islands? Was there ever before such an acrobatic group of lightning-change real estate as those Philippines have proved to be? It is less than a year since the majority of us learned that there were such islands on the map. Since then, and while we have tried to keep our eye on them, they have appeared as Spanish colonies blighted by tyranny; as our allies in fighting Spain; as the home of lovers of freedom, not on any account to be given back to Spain; as rich islands which we needed in our business; as islands we had bought at a low price, which Spain had to take; as islands we could swap; as islands we could not swap; finally, as rebellious islands full of half-devil, half-child Malays with Mauser rifles in their hands and knives convenient. Small blame to citizens who haven't recognized their duty about the Philippines. If the islands would stop turning hand-springs long enough for us to identify them as something we could understand, we would all do better."

Under these conditions the people of the United States will feel greatly relieved if only their representatives in the Philippines will but make a dicker, and get them out of the scrape.

—Mr. Escott, in a pleasant article on the "The Disasters of Fact and Fable," discloses the truth as to the famous purchase of the Suez Canal shares. It has been repeatedly stated that the suggestions came to Lord Beaconsfield from the Rothschilds. But, as a matter of fact, it came from Mr. Frederick Greenwood, then editor of the Pall Mall Gazette. The shares were bought for £4,000,000; to-day they are worth over £24,000,000. Mr. Greenwood was offered a knighthood, which he declined.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

The Hillsborough Bridge Resolution

IS STILL UNDER CONSIDERATION OF THE HOUSE.

Important Amendment Introduced at Last Night's Session.

TUESDAY, April 25.

House met at 11. Mr. Birch asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to repair the damage done to the Lot 6 wharf at Gordon's Point in the fall of 1898.

Hon. Mr. McLean said he believed there was some damage done, and it would be attended to.

Hon. Mr. McLean submitted the supervisor's returns. Hon. Mr. Farquharson presented a bill amending the Act relating to Life Insurance, which was set down for second reading to-morrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Macdonald, the House resumed committee on the bill amending the act incorporating the town of Summerside, Mr. Birch taking the chair. The bill was reported agreed to with amendments and set down for third reading to-morrow.

The House then went into committee to further consider the resolution relating to the proposed bridge across the Hillsborough, Mr. McWilliams taking the chair. Mr. Campbell continued his remarks. Referring to the figures given by the Attorney-General and the hon. member from Murray Harbor, he (Mr. Campbell) said it looked as if the expenditure had been deliberately swelled in order that the cost might be shown to be in the vicinity of that of the proposed bridge. He claimed that the ferry was as efficiently managed during the years he was Commissioner of Public Works, as it had been since, and there was no complaint regarding the service from those most interested.

The expenditure on the ferry has since gone up by leaps and bounds, showing that its management has not been as economical as it should have been. The increased expenditure by the present administration gave color to the statement some time ago made by a member on the government side of the House that it was necessary to spend a large sum in order that six members might be retained in their seats. Now they ask us to vote \$12,000 a year for a bridge, but they do not bring down a particle of information regarding the structure. The finances of the Province are in a deplorable condition by reason of the bad management of the Government; and he thought that in view of the fact, some steps should be taken to augment the revenue before asking us to add \$12,000 to the expenditure, no matter how favorable we are to the bridge project. The government had no mandate from the people to proceed with the work. The government had a mandate from the people regarding the arbitration of our claims, but they had not acted upon it. They had fooled the people in this matter as they had fooled them in others matters, and their promises could not be relied upon. In view of the facts he had set forth he thought it necessary that mature consideration should be given to the resolution before voting upon it.

After recess Mr. McKinnon continued the debate saying that the question for the House to consider was whether we are justified in voting the \$12,000 towards building the bridge considering the advantages to be gained therefrom. Our ferry service may be good, but it has its faults. Its cost of maintenance is too great while not giving sufficient accommodation to the people south of the Hillsborough. It is proposed to do away with the Southport ferry by building a combined railway and traffic bridge. A railway bridge means a

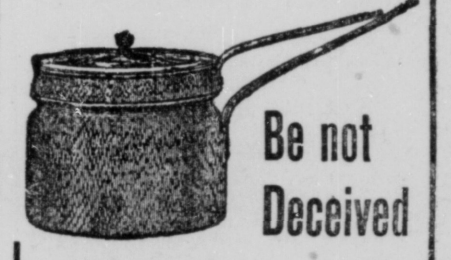
