THE LAW OF LIBEL.

The Montreal Star has had a libel suit on its hands. It appears that that newspaper published a report of a political meeting in which a Minister of the Crown had stated that the plaintiff had taken part in "a drunken orgie." The Star admitted the publication but pleaded that having reported faithfully and exactly what had occurred at a public meeting without malice and in the public interest, it could not be condemned in damages on account of such publication. The trial of the action came off before a judge and jury in Montreal, and the jury found, as a fact, that the report published in the Star had been a faithful and exact report of what had taken place at the meeting in question. They also found that the report had been published without malice and in good faith, and in the public interest. But these findings did not avail, for the presiding judge ordered a verdict to be entered against the Star proprietors for \$150, the amount of damages assessed by the jury. From this decision an appeal was taken to the Court of Review for the Province of Quebec, and that Court on Friday last, unanimously dismissed the appeal and sustained the Court of first instance. This question of the right of a newspaper to publish a fair and accurate report of what took place at a public meeting was raised before Mr. Justice Holton last winter in the Ferguson-Patriot libel suit when Mr. Davies, Q. C., for the Patriot, contended exactly what was contended on behalf of the Star, but the learned Judge rejected the contention and declined to instruct the jury. The Judges of all the Superior Courts of Montreal have, it appears held the same view as Mr. Justice Holton. But the case is to be appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada for a final decision. The point is one that is particularly interesting to the publishers of newspapers, who naturally desire not to be held responsible for slanders that may be uttered by those whose speeches they are called upon to report.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND LOAN.

The Government of Newfoundland have effected a loan of sufficient money to pay off the floating debt of the province and give them \$250,000 cash in hand. If very careful, and the people have back in their fishing, the province will now be able to float along, though the burden of the taxation must necessarily be heavy and the retrenchment stringent. It is possible that the prejudice of the people against Confederation will, ere long, wear away and it will be far better if the province should become a part of Canada when under no compulsion to do so.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CITY OF MEXICO, June 2.—Excavations in an underground city of Aztec times continue at Ametlan, Guatemala. Many curiosities have been unearthed. A large city existed there once, which was doubtless destroyed and buried by earthquakes.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 2.—The Sultan has sent his private secretary to the English and French and Russian ambassadors to express his profound regret at the Jewish outrage, and to inform the ambassadors that the offenders would be court-martialed and punished.

LONDON, June 2.—A Paris despatch to the Daily News says it is reported that the cholera has appeared in Brest. The report proves true, the French warships may not go to Kiel to take part in the ceremonies attendant upon the opening of the Baltic Sea canal.

BERLIN, June 2.—The petition of Berlin financiers with the capitalists of France and England for control of the Chinese indemnity loan is likely to result in Berlin having the largest share in the arrangement. On the English side, the Rothschilds, of London, with the Hong Kong and Shanghai bank, offered to loan a sum reported to be \$25,000,000, upon terms fully received at Paris. If the plan of the Berlin financiers are successful, German banking houses, with the assistance of Paris and London bankers, will finance the loan of \$50,000,000.

LONDON, June 2.—The Standard publishes a despatch from Constantinople saying that the situation there arising from the delay of the Porte in replying to the proposals about Armenian reforms, is extremely critical. Should the reply when made contain anything short of entire assent, it will be returned.

ROME, June 2.—Ballots were held today for members of the chamber of deputies in districts where none of the candidates obtained a constitutional majority. Today the radicals carried Milan, and the socialist convict Boice, was selected in Palermo. This success caused great excitement.

LONDON, May 31.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Sir Ellis Ashmead Bartlett (Conservative) attacked the foreign policy of the Government. One of the grounds on which he based his attack was that the Government had abandoned Lord Salisbury's policy, which, he declared, was founded on an entente with Germany, Austria and Italy to co-operate with Russia and France. He especially attacked the Government for assailing the Porte, whose friendship might yet be of enormous value to Great Britain.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, stated that the Government was acting cordially with Russia and France. Sir Ellis Bartlett—"Where?" Sir Harcourt—"Everywhere. The object of the Government is not to ally itself with the radicals, any group of powers, but rather to remain friendly with all European and American nations."

In conclusion, Sir William declared that there was not the slightest foundation for the charge that the Government was repelling the friendship of Germany.

HOW THE COLIMA WAS LOST.

A despatch from Mazatlan says a steamer has arrived there with the 21 passengers picked up from the wrecked Colima. All the rescued were badly bruised. They were picked up from pieces of wreckage and rafts, with the exception of A. J. Sutherland, who had clung to the boat after it had capsized five times and all the occupants had been drowned. The steamer was heavily laden and had a large deck-load of lumber. She encountered a storm which grew to be the fiercest on that coast in 20 years. Her deckload started, the steamer became unmanageable and a tremendous wave struck her and threw her on her beam ends. The wave struck the vessel with such force that she trembled as if she had run on a reef and most of the passengers thought this was the cause of the shock. The survivors say the officers were brave and active. The lifeboats were launched and filled with passengers, but just then the ship went down, the boats capsized and all in them are supposed to have been drowned. Captain Taylor stuck to his post until he was down with his vessel. Third Officer Hanson, who was saved, says that as the steamer foundered, her boilers burst, throwing debris in all directions and killing many persons who were struggling in the water.

TELEGRAPHIC.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. PARLIAMENT OF CANADA. Nothing Very Important Going On. OTTAWA, June 4.

In answer to a question yesterday, Hon. Mr. Foster stated that legislation by this parliament would be required before the French Fishery would come into operation. Mr. Haggart stated that the summer intercolonial time table would come into operation June 24th.

Mr. Clark Wallace said that instructions have been issued and reiterated, directing the collectors not to act as customs brokers.

A warm discussion went on over the case of the brothers Noble, fishermen on the Georgian Bay, whose boats and nets were seized some years ago for violation of the fishery regulations. Sir Charles H. Tupper, the former head of the Department, defended the course of the Government in the transaction. In the Senate Sir Mackenzie Bowell said he would endeavor at the earliest moment to have the vacancies in the Senate filled.

THE BANK OF MONTREAL. Hopeful Outlook for Canada. MONTREAL, June 4. The annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal took place yesterday, Sir Donald Smith presiding. He declared that there were signs of returning prosperity to Canada. As for the bank, Sir Donald quoted figures to show that while the increase in the value of shares in the Bank of England since 1880 had been 25 per cent, those of the Bank of Montreal had increased 79 per cent, during the same time.

The future of Canada, he said, depended upon a well-directed immigration policy and the settlement of the great Northwest. He also deprecated the idea of building railways where they were not required, and expressed the hope that Newfoundland would soon form part of Canada.

The Champion Yacht. LONDON, June 4. The Britannia defeated the Ailsa in the yacht race yesterday.
