Pearson "Thunderstruck" By News Of Nobel Prize

OTTAWA (CP) — Lester B. (Mike) Pearson, the Canadian diplomat with the bowtie and razor-keen wit, Monday joined the ranks of acknowledged great world peacemakers with humility, awe and some feeling that it just couldn't be true.

"Gosh, gee," he murmured as a Canadian Press reporter gave him his first word on the Oslo report that he had won the \$40,000 Nobel peace prize.

THUNDERSTRUCK
"Gosh, I am thunderstruck and overwhelmed," said the 60-year-old baseball fan and world-trouble-shooter who guided Canada's foreign policies for nine years as external affairs minister in the Louis St. Laurent Liberal government.

Later, after the bedlam in his office subsided, he told reporters he considered his selection for the Nobel peace prize—first for a Canadian—a tribute to Canada's peace efforts since the Second World War.

"I am proud beyond words to be the Canadian chosen to receive it."

What made him think twice about the news report was that he had received no advance information that he had even been nominated for the award. A cable apparently had landed in Ottawa in the early morning but it didn't get to Mr. Pearson until some four hours later.

It had been addressed to a house which Mr. Pearson had vacated. His wife was away from the new residence during the morning getting her hair waved for the opening of Parliament.

When he telephoned her, he said, "she forgot her wave for a moment."

TAX UNLIKELY
The prize amounts to \$40,275, which is unlikely to be taxed. Mr. Pearson reflected that was a "lot of money" for a man who had been a history professor, a civil servant and a member of a now-defeated government. He didn't know what he would do with it.

The cable from the Nobel peace prize committee invited him to come to Oslo Dec. 10 to receive the prize in person. Mr. Pearson said he hopes to be able to do so.

Though he hasn't officially announced it, the man who was perhaps more instrumental than any other in getting the United Nations Emergency Force set up in the Middle East will be a candidate for the Liberal party leadership.

Undoubtedly the award will enhance his chances.

Mr. Pearson said one of the first to congratulate him was the present Liberal chieftain, Opposition Leader St. Laurent, who, along with Mr. Pearson had been nominated for the award five years ago.

When the Commons met, Prime Minister Diefenbaker crossed the floor to shake hands with the year-old Mr. St. Laurent and with Mr. Pearson, offering his own good wishes.
