Mr. Bartlett will immediately assume the responsibility of coordinating the activities of the Board and Corporation and Provincial Government involvement with the Georgetown Industries, Bathurst Marine Ltd. and Gulf Gardens Foods.

### Caravan To Be At Montague

MONTAGUE — Montague will be one of only eight communities in Canada that will be able to celebrate July 1, 1967, Dominion Day, with the Centennial Caravan in Iowa.

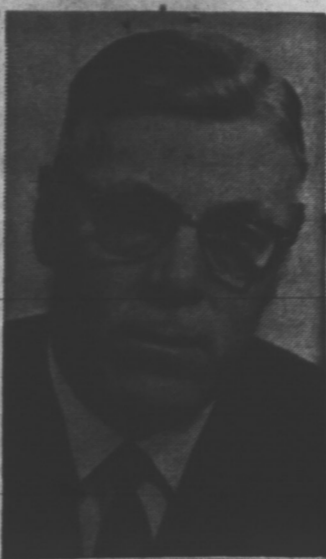
The eight-unit caravan will visit also communities in Prince Edward Island from June 30 to July 10 and will present a unique application of display methods to tell the story of Canada. Visitors will be able to hear the sounds of the prairie as well as see the polar glaciers move down over Canada. They will experience the hardships of Canada's early pioneers traveling from Europe in the storage compartment of an immigrant ship and catch a whiff of gunpowder in a World War I trench.

**GAILY DECORATED**  
Each unit of the caravan is 75 feet long and weighs 20 tons. When set up they will form a large quadrangle inside which regional exhibits will be displayed on gaily decorated tridetic forms.

Besides Montague, the caravan will also visit the following communities: Murray River, June 30; Souris, July 2; Morell, July 4; North Rustica, July 5; Kensington, July 7; O'Leary, July 8; Wellington, July 9; and Borden, July 10.
