Gomez Wins Pitching Duel From Harder As Yankees Turn Back Indians 1-0

Giants Beat Cubs 7-4 For 7th Straight

NEW YORK, June 15—(AP)—A drab run in the fourth inning became a glit-tered security in the ninth today when it decided a spectacular pitching duel between Lefty Gomez and Mel Harder in favor of the Yankees 1-0 over Cleveland Indians in an American League baseball game. Each pitcher gave four hits, but the champions supported Gomez with three double plays to make his route easy. Harder gave four passes and one of these got him in trouble in the fourth when it put Tom Henrich on base to start the inning. Joe DiMaggio singled to left, sending Henrich to third and enabling him to score as Bill Dickey grounded out on the next play. Detroit Tigers gained their eighth straight win and Tommy Bridges hit his eighth triple of the season when they gave Boston Red Sox their third defeat of the series 6-3 thanks to Pete Fox's grand-slam homer. After Jack Wilson passed three to lead the bases in the first inning, Fox cleared them by driving into the left field screen. Behind the air-tight pitching of Jack Knott and Thornton Lee, Chicago White Sox took a double-header from Washington. Knott allowed only two hits to win 5-1. Lee allowed but five for a 4-2 victory. Gerald Walker hit a homer and two singles, and Mike Krewech collected three singles for the Sox in the first game. The Senators' lone run came when Case scratched a hit, stole second and third and scored on Buddy Lewis' fly. Two errors by Lewis gave the Sox two runs in the ninth and they picked up two more on timely hitting by Ollie Bejma and Tony Renna, and Walker's sacrifice fly.

Bobby Riggs In Finals Of Tournament

PARIS, June 15—(CP)—Bobby Riggs, young American ace, advanced to the final of the French Hard Court singles championships today when he overpowered Ottar Szigeti of Hungary in straight sets, 6-3, 6-0, 6-4. Szigeti was no match for the cool American, who placed his shots in the far corners at will. Two other Americans, Don MacNeil and Elwood Cooke, will meet tomorrow in the second semi-final. MacNeil was considered the favorite over Cooke, but a foot injury suffered by the former yesterday enhanced Cooke's chances. The best tennis of the day was provided by the veteran French doubles team of Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon, who defeated Riggs and Cooke in three fast sets, 6-3, 6-2, 6-1. Forty-year-old Borotra, "the brawling basque," thrilled the crowds by leaping all over the court and returning near-impossible shots. During the first two sets, the French team virtually blasted the young Americans off the court. The Americans recovered swiftly and with brilliant netplay by Riggs tied the third set at seven-all before Borotra and Brugnon, flashing their old-time speed, won the next two games to take the match. In women's singles, Mme. Simone Mathieu, France, advanced into the final by defeating her compatriot, Mlle. Simone Panetter, 6-2, 6-3. In the quarter-finals, Mlle. Jadwiga Jedzejowska, Poland, beat Mme. Lebally, France, 6-3, 2-6, 6-3. In the quarter-finals of the men's doubles, the Polish team of Adam Bavarowski and I. Tociyski scored a surprise upset in defeating Demeter Mitic and Ferenc Puncz, Yugoslav Davis Cup pair, 6-4, 4-6, 7-5, 7-5. Paul Feret, France, and E. Gebory, Hungary, also advanced into the semi-finals in defeating Jacques Sanglier and Robert Desai, both of France, 6-3, 5-7, 6-3, 3-6, 6-4.

LONDON, June 15—(CP)—British sports writers have a couple of suggestions about how Americans should conduct themselves Saturday in the Sydney Wooderson vs. Glenn Cunningham mile race at Princeton. First is that it wouldn't be quite sporting for other Americans running with Wooderson and Cunningham to gang up on Sydney and second is that it's not polite to alibi for Glenn Cunningham before Wooderson beats him. NEW YORK, June 15—Ceferino Garcia, the bolo-punching Filipino from Los Angeles, belted his way into the forefront of the middleweight ranks tonight by flattening Walker (Poppy) Woods, New York, east sieder, in four rounds in Madison Square Garden. The 154-pounder, who only recently graduated from welterweight ranks and went into tonight's tilt a 2-1 underdog, dropped the 160-140 pound Woods five times before putting him down for keeps at 17 seconds of the fourth heat. A crowd of 6,068, who contributed to a gross rate of \$9,876, saw the Filipino's famed "bolo" club (the blow he developed chopping sugar cane in his native islands) put Woods on the floor each time.

Britain Fears New Air Raids - Potato Bugs

Rhoades) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, June 15—(CP)—Migratory flights of potato bugs across Belgium from France and Holland have brought a new headache to Britain's ministry of agriculture which for years has prohibited importation to this country of potatoes from Canada, the United States and European France. Efforts of Canadian authorities to satisfy the ministry they could guarantee bug-free French potatoes have consistently failed and now tight supervision of potato imports from numerous European countries have been ordered. Present restrictions on shipment of plants to Britain from France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Holland and Switzerland have been extended to require a certificate of freedom from Colorado Beetle (potato bug) eggs, larvae, or adults. Nevertheless officials are worried by the possibility of migratory flights across the English Channel. The potato bug is not a strong flier but has migrated considerable distance under favorable conditions. The ministry of agriculture has distributed circulars describing the beetle and urging farmers to watch closely for it and report its presence immediately if it has been discovered. Experts Warn Farmers The circular warns also against unauthorized spraying of any potato patches in which the insect might be found, fearing that poisoning of the food supply might cause the bugs to migrate to other fields and become distributed over a wide area. Restrictions governing importation of potatoes from countries in which the little black-striped yellow bugs have been found have been strengthened in the light of new findings by an international commission investigating its spread. The new certificate accompanying shipment must state that no infestation of crops has occurred within 50 kilometers of the patch in which the shipped potatoes have been grown and that
