The Department of Marine and Fisheries has received, through the Imperial Board of Trade, a gold watch, which has been awarded by the Austro-Hungarian Government to Capt. Dunbar, of the ship Hannah Morris, of Windsor, N. S., in recognition of services rendered to the shipwrecked crew of the Austro-Hungarian ship Hunnus.

The Sydney, C. B., Express has the particulars of a fatal affray on Scatarie Island last week. Two boys, named Scott and McQuish, aged respectively 8 and 12 years, while in their school's coal cellar getting coal, had a quarrel, and McQuish stabbed his companion in the abdomen with a broom stick, sharpened at the end, causing almost instantaneous death.

In connection with the departure of the British Agricultural Delegates from Quebec on Saturday, that it is the intention of the Government to send no more special immigration agents to Europe, as it is held that the information the returning delegates will be able to furnish to intending emigrants, will have far greater weight among the agricultural classes than the paid agents of a colony, who are generally viewed with a degree of suspicion.
