Strawberry Pickers Are The Seasonal Placements Now

Approximately two-hundred boys and girls have registered at the National Employment Office as berry pickers, to assist in harvesting the strawberry crop. The office has orders for pickers from the Mt. Stewart Strawberry Association, from growers in Southport, Bunbury Mt. Herbert and Pownal. Orders have also been received for women of adult age, who will hull the berries prior to canning, or being placed in cold storage, fresh-frozen.

The cold weather and lack of sunlight has retarded the growth of the berries and full-scale harvesting has not yet commenced. But given a few days of warm weather the gathering of the crop will get underway. All of the young children, who apply for work as pickers, must have a signed statement from their parents relieving the local office of any responsibility for injury during transportation to and from work.

The growers who hire the pickers supply transportation, and all arrangements for this service are the concern of each individual employer.

The Employment Office has been carrying out annual book renewal for the past three weeks and more than thirty percent of this work book renewal is being carried out at the premises of the employer and teams of workers, visit employers each day for this purpose. In past years this on-premises service was only given to the larger employers, but this year book renewal is being completed at many smaller business establishments.

Members of the local office staff assigned to this work, have visited the two large fishing plants in Souris, and several of the smaller merchants. They have renewed books at Morell, Montague, Lower Harbour district. For the past few days they have carried on their activities in Charlottetown, and it is hoped to complete the round of visits in the city within a week.

A re-registration of all insurable workers is being carried out in conjunction with the renewal of books, and this entails more work than the ordinary year. It is second time in fifteen years that a registration of insurable employees has been made. The first registration was carried out when the Unemployment Insurance Act came into force in 1941.

There are about nine thousand insurable workers in Kings and Queen's counties, which comprises the area under the local office administration. However the Charlottetown office has on file the names of 40,000 insurance numbers of over twenty thousand people. Many of these people have moved permanently to other parts of Canada or to the United States; some have died and others for one reason or another have ceased to be in insurable occupations.

When the present re-registration of employees is completed the local office will have a much smaller file of insurable workers and it will be up-to-date as it is possible to have it. Re-registration is being carried out by all National Employment Offices in Canada.

Report Canadian Exports Higher

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian exports were higher in value to all major geographic areas except the United Kingdom both in May and the January-May period compared with the corresponding periods last year, the bureau of statistics reported Monday.

16.7 per cent and bettering the previous monthly peak of \$411,700,000 in June, 1953, by four per cent.

In the first five months of 1956, exports advanced 11.6 per cent to \$1,846,300,000 from \$1,654,200,000 a year earlier, another record. Volume of exports rose 12.5 per cent in May and 7.9 per cent in the five-month period both records.

Last Friday the bureau announced that the excess of imports over exports in May rose to \$119,300,000 from \$61,000,000 last year boosting the five-month total to a record \$484,200,000 from \$127,300,000 a year ago.
