A TELEGRAM to the Hon. John Longworth, conveys the sad intelligence that Mrs. Israel Longworth died suddenly at Truro this morning.

The Legislature of Nova Scotia has been summoned to meet on the 8th February, the same day on which the Dominion Parliament is to meet.

THEMOMETRIC READINGS.—The highest temperature yesterday was 12.5 above zero, and the lowest 3 below. Early this morning it was 7.3 below, and at eight o'clock 5 below.

The Liberal-Conservatives of Westmorland have scored another great victory. The Government candidates for the Local Legislature were elected by an overwhelming majority.

As an illustration of the importance of British Columbia trade it is stated that in seven years past Victoria has paid \$50,000,000 in customs duties; on dutiable goods imported last year \$300,000; free goods \$450,000. Exports show a still more remarkable increase. The exports for the year were \$4,500,000. For the last quarter the exports reached the unprecedented sum of \$1,339,000. These figures do not include lumber shipments for the last half year or fish shipped direct from Fraser River, which would swell the total exports for the half year to \$1,650,000.

MISS LIZZIE MARCELLUS, chief equestrienne of Dan Rice's Great Show, met with a very severe accident at Cadiz, Ohio, on the Fourth of July last. It appears the lady was executing a most difficult piece of ring horsemanship, when some boys exploded a fire-cracker, causing her horse to leap from the ring, and throw her on her head and shoulders, inflicting very severe injuries. This morning at half past one o'clock a fire broke out in a building owned by Mr. Adam Murray, situated on the north end of Queen Square, and occupied by Mr. Pickard as a stable, and store house for mowing machines and farming implements. The fire was discovered by two Post Office clerks, who, after removing the horses and cattle from one apartment of the stable, gave the alarm. The fire bell rang slowly; the different engines led by Rook and Laidler Co., went quickly to the scene and did excellent work in extinguishing the fire and saving the surrounding buildings. Mr. Pickard had, we learn, stored in the building fifteen mowing machines, a number of rakes, farming implements, etc., all of which were destroyed. The mowing machines, etc., were insured; the building was not.

O'ROURKE, condemned to die for the murder of Patrick Maher, aged 80, and daughter Bridget, aged 30, was executed at Milton, Ont., on the 5th. The prisoner slept well and ate a light breakfast. The hangman pinioned him in his cell by tying his arms to his sides tightly. The procession was then formed, the sheriff leading, the condemned man following and the priest and doctors bringing up the rear. O'Rourke walked firmly up the steps leading to the scaffold. The sheriff said:—"Michael O'Rourke, if you have anything to say, say it now." He answered, "I don't think I have anything to say." He knelt on the drop and the hangman adjusted the noose. O'Rourke repeated the Lord's prayer. The hangman then shot the bolts, O'Rourke falling nine feet. His death was instantaneous, the neck being broken. The body, after hanging twenty minutes, was cut down. Life was pronounced extinct by the goal surgeon.

CIVIC ELECTION

BY THE MAYOR.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.'"

I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of a Mayor and One Person to Serve as a Common Councilman in the City Council for each Ward of said City,

Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILMEN, will be held on

WEDNESDAY, the 24th Day of January, A. D. 1883,

At the several places, that is to say:

In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.

In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Heertz's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets.

In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House.

In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets.

In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Euston and Great George Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS.

Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground.

Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street.

Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street.

Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets.

Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

NOMINATION DAY.

Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15.—Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councilors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councilor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and additions of such persons, together with the office and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates.

There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councilor, a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councilor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid.

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose. Qualification of Electors, see Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15, sec. 20 and 64.
