

Favored Jaipur Is Winner In Belmont Stakes Sat.

NEW YORK (AP)—Favored Jaipur won Admiral's Voyage right on the wire in a blistering finish of the \$163,300 Belmont Stakes Saturday and brought fulfillment to the dreams of George D. Widener, who has been trying to win the race since 1918.

It was perhaps the most wide-open of all Belmonts since the grueling event for three-year-old horses was inaugurated in 1867. Fred W. Hooper's Admir-

al's Voyage led most of the way in the 1 1/4-mile race but could not hold off Jaipur and jockey Willie Shoemaker in one breath-taking instant at the finish.

Admiral's Voyage led through Crimmon Satan, from King Farms, by 1 1/4 lengths. George W. Pope's Decidedly, the Kentucky Derby winner, finished fourth. Donald P. Ross' Greek Money, Preakness victor faded in the home stretch and finished next to last in the field of eight.

Yank From Europe Cops Sports Car Race At Mosport

ORONO, Ont. (CP) — Masten

Gregory, 30-year-old Kansas City driver now racing professionally in Europe, won the 200-mile international sports car race at Mosport Park Saturday

as hard luck dogged Californian Dan Gurney. Gregory, 28 seconds behind Gurney after the first of two 100-mile heats, grabbed the lead in the second and whittled away at the seemingly insurmountable margin as Gurney's car

began to lose its blazing speed. The bespectacled Gregory was in front by 12 seconds at the halfway mark of the second heat when Gurney rolled into the pits to retire the car in disgust because of an overheating engine.

Both men drove Lotus 119s. Gregory was at the wheel of the same car with which Stirling Moss of England last year won the inaugural 200, sponsored by the Canadian Racing Drivers Association.

Gregory collected \$3,200 and the Player's Cup for his winning effort. He flashed around the 10 laps of the twisting, 2 1/2-mile course in two hours, 10 minutes, 26 seconds.

MOSS RECORD STANDS
Gregory, who ran away from the field in the first heat, set the day's fastest lap of one minute, 34.3 seconds. That was an average of 91.7 miles an hour and only one-tenth of a second slower than the lap record set by Moss last year in the Canadian Grand Prix.

Roger Penzance of Philadelphia

drove a consistent race in his Cooper Monaco for second place and \$1,800. He finished in 2:12:19 and was the only other driver to complete the full 20 laps.

Rounding out the top five were Bob Helbert of Warrington, Pa., in a Porsche RS61, 2:11:50 for 79 laps; Francis Bradley, Toronto, Lotus 18, 2:11:18 for 77 laps; and Joakim Bonnier, Sweden, Porsche RS61, 2:11:58 for 77 laps.

Gregory, who drives for the British UDT - Laystall team, said Gurney was the man to beat and his only strategy in the second heat was to drive as fast as he could to make up the 29 seconds he lost to the Californian in the opening 100 miles.

"I was pretty sick in the first

heat when all times got into the cockpit, but I felt fine in the second and was doing my best to beat Gurney."

Only 15 of the 39 starters were around to take the checkered flag.

A paid crowd of 28,654 attended but strengthened police patrols on the approach roads and efficient organization inside the park kept traffic moving smoothly.
