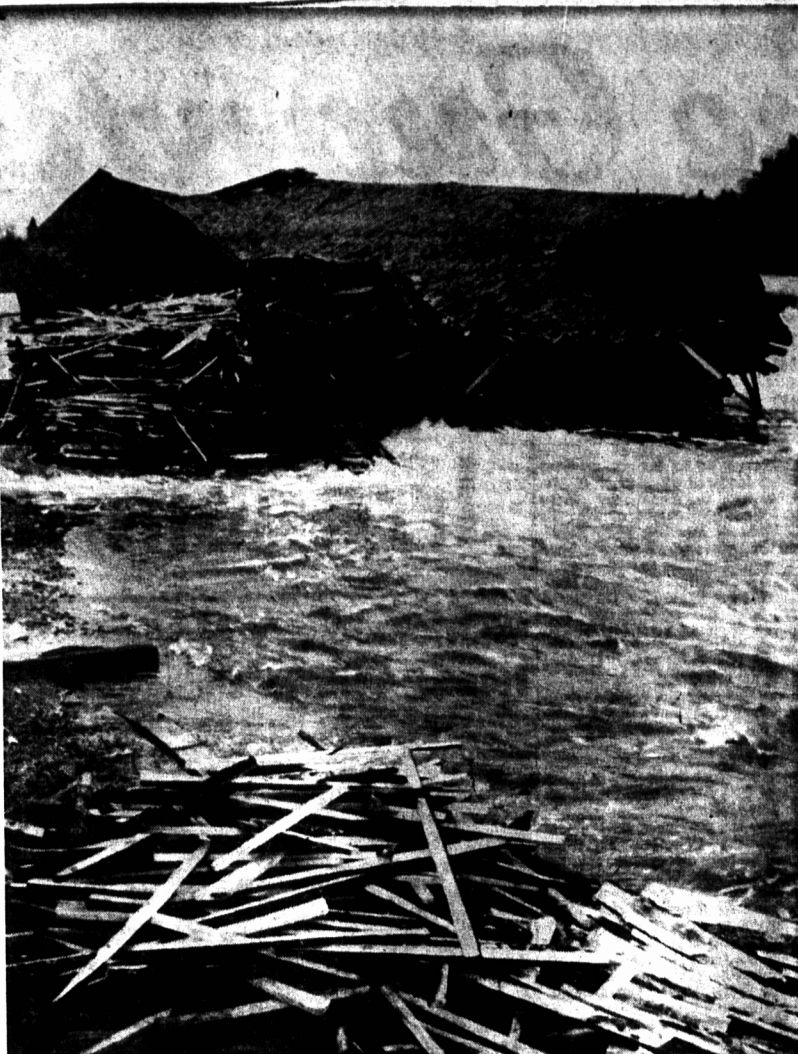

Committee Formed For Regional Drama Festival

On Thursday evening, at the home of Mr. J. A. Lawson, chairman of the P. E. I. Regional Committee of Dominion Drama Festival, the Governors of D. D. 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As the defence continued its cross-examination, the evidence of the witness was questioned by Mr. Campbell who had the witness admit that "some of her account of what the girl told her was not the girl's words, but her own. He therefore made a second motion to have the jury withdrawn from the trial because of inadmissible evidence.

After opposing counsel had again spoken to the motion Mr. Justice Tweedy refused Mr. Campbell's motion and again noted it in the record.

Two members of the R.C.M.P. gave evidence. The first, Const. Gordon Humphrey, said that he was in charge of the Identification Branch at the Charlottetown Detachment.

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Crown Case Is Continued Before Supreme Court

Three times yesterday during the trial of Merlin Maurice Murphy, Defence Counsel J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C., moved that the jury be dismissed because of evidence taken which he claimed was inadmissible in the trial. Mr. Justice G.J. Tweedy is presiding at the trial which started last Wednesday morning and has every indication of continuing for at least two more days.

Crowded court rooms have featured each day of the hearing. Heated cross fire between opposing counsel has also highlighted the proceedings thus far. Murphy is charged with rape of a 14 year old girl which the Crown contends took place in the early morning hours of July 9 at the City Dump.

After about four hours of giving evidence on Thursday, the complainant again took the stand yesterday morning. Mr. Campbell continued his cross-examination and several times during the course of his examination complained to the Court of lack of co-operation from the witness. When he suggested that "someone must have been talking to her from the previous evening," Crown prosecutor J. P. Nicholson objected strongly and Mr. Campbell's statement was struck from the record.

In answer to the Defence Counsel's question, the complainant said that in company with the Mounted Police she was not able to find any tire marks at the Dump where the alleged assault took place.

MOTHER TAKES STAND

The mother of the complainant took the stand to tell her daughter's arrival home at 3:30 a.m. on July 9. She said she had been sitting up waiting for her to return and was greatly alarmed when she saw her daughter's condition.

The mother said that the girl was bruised and beaten about the face and lips, her hair was disheveled and her clothes torn and soaking wet. When she questioned her, the daughter related the events of the early morning to her mother, who, realizing that it was a matter for the police, got in touch with a neighbour, Sam Walker, who drove mother and daughter to the Mounted Police barracks where the alleged assault was reported.

In continuing her evidence as to what the girl told her, Mr. Campbell made his first move to have the jury dismissed from the trial when he argued that since the girl had given her story to her mother and was later questioned by the police, the evidence of the mother was inadmissible.

After the jury had retired from the Court room, opposing counsel argued the point. His lordship, when he had heard the argument, disallowed Mr. Campbell's motion but noted it in the record.

The mother of the complainant told of going to the Central Creameries on the morning of the 11th where her daughter made identification of the accused.

The witness said that she was the mother of five children, the complainant being the second child. On question by defence counsel she said that her daughter the complainant, was in the habit of coming in at 12:30 or 1:00 a.m. She said she did not see anything wrong with such hours so long as the girl told her where she was going or who she was with.

"Would it be all right for her to be with a boy until that hour?" asked Mr. Campbell.

Answer: "It would be all right as long as I knew what boy she was going to be with."

Mr. Campbell: "But you don't always know in advance. You didn't know that she was going for a ride with two boys at 11:00 o'clock on the night of July 8."

The mother said that her daughter had not attended school since the alleged assault took place. She said she was in grade seven. Continuing his questioning, the defence counsel found it difficult to obtain answers from the witness.

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
