Bob Sweikert Drives To Victory In Auto Race; Costs Life Of Two-Time Winner

By Dave Burgess INDIANAPOLIS, (AP)—Handsome Bob Sweikert of Indianapolis drove to victory Monday in the bloodiest 500-mile auto race in 25 years—a bitter contest that cost the life of two-time winner Bill Vukovich of Fresno, Calif.

Eight other persons were hurt in race mishaps. The five-car accident that sent Vukovich hurtling to flaming death was the first fatal smashup in the Memorial Day classic since William (Shorty) Cantlon of Indianapolis was killed in 1947.

Vukovich kept the track record in death—46th since the speedway opened in 1909. Sweikert's winning speed was 128.209 miles an hour. Vukovich set the record last year at 130.84 in winning for the second straight year.

Sweikert, whose new Offenhauser-powered Kurtis-Kraft was a painted tropical rose and white, said a stiff wind made the race "twice as hard" as usual and sometimes made the cars jump six feet.

The 28-year-old driver, competing in the race for the fourth time, blamed the wind for a spin by Roger Ward of Los Angeles that started the big pile-up. It was the worst smash up in the race since seven cars jammed up in a non-fatal accident in 1930.

Vukovich, who had led 50 of the first 56 laps, tried to make the wreckage and his car flipped end over end and landed outside the two-foot-high barrier. The car caught fire while lying upside down. Vukovich was dead when he was removed from the cockpit.

Vukovich had been battling with Jack McGrath in a neck-and-neck duel for the lead. After 155 miles, McGrath, fastest qualifier in the classic, came into the pits, and his car was pushed to the garages out of the race.

Two laps later Vukovich smashed into the back stretch. McGrath's car had flipped end over end. Ploving into the pile-up were the cars of Ward, Boyd, Vukovich, and rookie driver Al Keller.

After the smashup Elisian, Keller and Boyd were reported in good condition in the track hospital. Vukovich's death ended another driver's attempt to win three straight races. Wilbur Shaw, the late speedway president, crashed into the wall in 1941 not far from the scene of Monday's pile-up, winning in 1939 and 1940.

Mauri Ross engine failed late in the 1949 race after he had won two straight. Sweikert, whose car is owned by John Zink of Los Angeles, drove a smart race. He won't know how much he won until the victory dinner tonight, but he picked up \$22,900 in lap prizes in 1954—\$150 for each lap he was in front.

The speedway varies its purse according to the attendance and Monday's crowd looked about as big as usual despite chill winds and a dull sky. Never announced, the attendance appeared to be about 120,000. Vukovich won \$74,000.

NEW YORK (AP) — Detroit's K-Kids, Harvey Kuan and Al Kaline, have vaulted into the two top spots in the American League batting race and show no signs of slowing up their base-hit pace.

Kuenn, a 24-year-old shortstop who was signed off the campus of the University of Wisconsin in 1952 leads the league with a .377 average.

The 26-year-old Kaline, an outfielder who joined the Tigers as a bonus player in June, 1953, after his high school graduation, ranks second with a .361 mark. Vic Power of Kansas City Athletics dropped to third at .354. Figures are based on games through Sunday.

Kuenn, who has led the American League in base hits for the past two seasons, currently is tied with teammate Kaline in that department with 57 each. He suffered a pulled leg muscle in a game against Kansas City last Tuesday night and has been sidelined since.
