Arrests Made In Summerside Following Breaks

Summerside police over the holiday cracked down hard in a serious campaign to end and clean up a number of breaks that have recently occurred.

The campaign was officially opened early Wednesday morning by officers Elmer Matheson and Keith Champion who surprised two young men returning home allegedly from a break that had just been made at Robinson's Bakery.

Before the young men could say "If I'd known you were coming I'd have baked a cake" one of them was relieved of the eggs, lard, etc., that he was carrying, and an investigation revealed he was warmly dressed in an item of clothing allegedly stolen from the War Surplus Store, in a break that occurred the previous night.

The other suspect escaped in a very fast dash, but swift action followed as Chief of Police Peter White, accompanied by Officers Joe Linkletter, Harry MacKay, and Elmer Matheson raided two homes, and recovered merchandise allegedly stolen from a number of Summerside merchants.

The merchandise recovered is said to have included a wide variety of items such as chocolates, jewellery, plumbing fixtures, miscellaneous hardware, clothing, etc.

The man who was arrested appeared on Wednesday morning and was separately charged with breaking, entering, and theft, in connection with the breaks at Robinson's Bakery, and the War Surplus Store.

He was not asked to plead, and was remanded in custody until Saturday when it is expected the case will be proceeded with.

His suspected companion, who had not been taken into custody last night, is already awaiting sentence after pleading guilty to a theft that occurred about two weeks ago. It is believed that both young men may be charged with other breaks which may be tied in with the stolen merchandise recovered in the raids.
