NOTES AND COMMENTS

It is reported that 150,000 French-Canadians now in the State of Maine, are preparing to return to Quebec next spring.

It is stated that there is no truth in the rumor that the Government of Canada has decided, following the example of New Zealand, to offer another mounted contingent for service in South Africa.

In the Fulford libel case, Mr. Clarke Wallace pleads that Fulford did pay \$50,000 for his seat in the Senate! Some interesting developments are apparently in store for the people of Canada.

EX-PRESIDENT KRUGER ought not to complain that the European governments and people didn't, according to their agreement, give the Transvaal moral and material support. It is notorious that they gave both. Great Britain has had to cope in South Africa with the power of Europe.

The refusal of the United States Senate to pass the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty as submitted has been philosophically received in Great Britain. The feeling is that "it is Uncle Sam's business anyhow," and "the States are simply thrown back upon the Clayton-Bulwer treaty."

DR. GRANT seems to think that Great Britain is in the wrong about South Africa; and it is remarked by the Montreal Gazette that according to his reasoning "it is to be assumed that had he been born a Kaffir he would have resisted the Boers as Dinizula did, or if he had been an Indian he would have joined Pontiac in his war against the British in America."

COMMENTING upon the wonderful development of the United States in recent years, Mr. Henry Clay's remarks that for a "long time, Europe has been assuring us how much more largely it would invest and speculate in our securities provided our monetary system were securely planted on the gold basis. We now see how much was intended in this. The election was accepted as ratifying the Act of Congress establishing the gold basis of value; and, ever since, there has been an extraordinary increase in both the speculative and investment transactions in American at London and Berlin." This course acts as an important stimulus to the United States market.

In England the desire for the suppression of General DeWet is accompanied by generous admiration of his latest feat. "It would be unworthy of the British name," says the London Times, "to refuse the credit that is due a feat of arms so brilliant as the unexpected dash backward of DeWet and his men through the British lines." Other papers take the same view, comparing the ride to Springham's Nek with the charge at Balaclava. In fact, admiration for the extraordinary daring displayed by the Boers on this occasion almost predominates over the chagrin at the failure of the British officers to catch their opponents.

Yesterday afternoon Dr. Goodwill lost a valuable horse. It seems that he and Mrs. Goodwill were out for a drive, and when near the residence of Rev. John Goodwill the horse took fright and ran away. Dr. and Mrs. Goodwill were thrown out of the sleigh and somewhat shaken up. The horse kicked over the shafts and injured the cords of his legs so severely that he had to be shot.

A CHRISTMAS THOUGHT

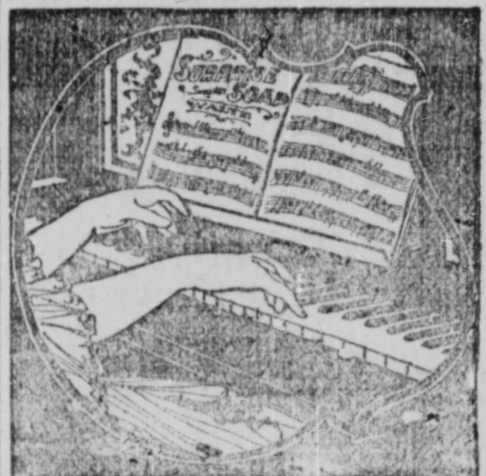
