COMING THIS WAY.—The Tiber is on the berth at Montreal, and will leave for Summerside and Charlottetown about the 26th inst.

THE POLINO.—The steamer Polino, from Montreal, arrived at Charlottetown last evening about six o'clock, bringing a large cargo of general merchandise and a number of round trip passengers. She left about nine o'clock this morning for Sydney and St. John's, Nfld. Her outward cargo included 30 head sheep, 50 head cattle, 4 crates pigs, 400 bags oats and a quantity of butter, cheese, potatoes and other products.

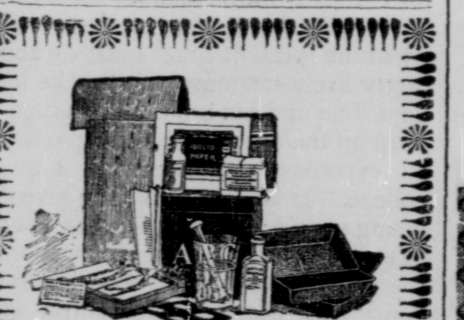
