

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

KILLED BY THE HEAT.—Six persons were killed by the heat on Saturday last in Chicago.

GOOD PRICE FOR BERRIES.—Raspberries are being brought into the city in large quantities and are selling in the market for \$3 and over a pair—Manitoba Free Press.

NEW CAUSE FOR DIVORCE.—An exchange says that a prominent English lady has sued for a divorce because her husband persists in having the barber cut her hair short.

THE FASTEST ARRIVED.—Summerside at two o'clock this morning with a general cargo and one passenger—Miss Walsh. She will leave for Halifax at the usual time this evening with a general cargo.

MILITIA INSPECTION.—Lieutenant-Col. Montclair yesterday inspected Camp Brighton. This afternoon he and Lieutenant-Col. Mansell are inspecting the Artillery and Infantry on Victoria Park.

A CONTRADICTION.—The injurious report of the Guardian and Watchman that the Rankin House is to be converted into two tenement houses is not true. We have Mr. Bolger's assurance that the Rankin House will be maintained as heretofore for the accommodation of visitors.

THE STORM OF YESTERDAY.—A heavy rain and hail storm with thunder and lightning passed over the city yesterday afternoon. The rainfall was the heaviest seen here in recent years, and the hailstones were unusually large. During the afternoon a large waterpout was observed in the harbor off the park.

THE LIBERAL CANDIDATES.—At the Liberal Convention held at the Hotel St. Peter's Bay on Tuesday, Messrs. Anthony McLaughlin, of Pictou, Station, and Arthur Peters, of Charlottetown, were nominated as candidates to contest the Second Electoral District of King's County at the forthcoming election.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Yesterday afternoon, while Beecher Crosby and John McNeill, of Bonshaw, were on their way from Bonshaw to Nine Mile Creek with a raft of timber they were struck by the squall and the raft went to pieces. Both jumped off the raft to save themselves and swam to the shore.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—A pleasant event took place at Kelly's Cross on Tuesday, the 18th inst., when Thomas P. Cass, of North River, was united in marriage to Mary Ann Trainor, of Kelly's Cross. The ceremony was performed by Rev. P. A. McInnes, assisted by Rev. James E. McDonald. Many valuable presents were presented to the bride on the occasion.

THE CREST OF SOCIETY.—Mr. Stetson's company of players gave their closing performance of "The Crest of Society" in the Lyceum last evening. The play was presented with the same care and skill as on the preceding evening, but the audience was not so large. The company play in Summerside to-night and at Amherst tomorrow night.

MAGDALEN ISLAND NEWS.—We learn from Jas. E. Grant, Esq., who has just returned from a business trip to the Magdalen Islands, that a Nova Scotia schooner lost two of her crew out of a crew of 12. When passing by the St. Olaf, the schooner was lying to with her flag at half mast high, and the above information was communicated.

Mr. Grant reports that the catch of mackerel is good at the Magdalens.

PHONICS.—The League of the Cross picnic at Shaw's Wharf yesterday afternoon proved very successful. The rainfall in the afternoon did not affect the picnicers on the ground, although the passengers in the second boat got a slight wetting during the trip up.

At St. Margaret's it began to rain about noon, interfering somewhat with the pleasure of the occasion.

IS A BAY WAY.—Recent advices from St. Thomas state that the brig, Prince LeBoa from Antigua for Charlottetown, which put in there on June 12th, leaky, has discharged half her cargo of molasses. The captain is without funds to perform necessary repairs. He owns the vessel, which has no class, and neither vessel nor freight is insured. He entiled to consignees and shippers of cargo, but as yet no funds are forthcoming.

NEW HALL AT CARLISLE.—The new hall at Carlisle Bridge has been commenced and is now well under way, being mostly covered in. The building will be 70 feet long and 26 feet wide, with an arched roof finished with hard pine sheathing. Ample provision is made for stage accommodation, and the seats in the rear end of the hall will be raised, so that the whole audience can have a complete view of any performance. This hall will fill a long-felt want at Carlisle. Mr. D. S. McLaren has charge of the work.

AS ISLANDER DROWNED.—An Edmondston, N. B., despatch of the 18th says: Thomas Lafferty was drowned while crossing the St. John river at Connors' station last Wednesday. He was a stranger, but it is supposed he had a brother in P. E. Island and other brothers in Haverhill, Mass. Deceased had some property, which is in the hands of Hilare Peltier, Edmondston, who will furnish his friends with any information. P. E. Island and Haverhill papers are desired by friends of the deceased to copy this despatch.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon the case against Michael Power et al. and William Power, for assaulting officers Taylor and Bradley, while in the discharge of their duty, was further adjourned until tomorrow morning, after hearing the evidence of officers Taylor and Campbell, City Marshal Cameron, and Messrs. William Dillon and Michael Luby. The case against William Larter for supplying fluid extract of ergot with intent to procure abortion, comes up again this afternoon. The witnesses summoned to give evidence are Drs. Warburton and Morris, and Mr. Fred Davies, druggist.

HE WANTS DAMAGES.—The St. John Globe says: James J. McCalligan, ten merchant, has entered an action against the Pullman Palace Car Co. for \$5,000 damages. In February, 1892, Mr. McCalligan was returning from Boston to St. John. He could not obtain a berth in the sleeper, and had to contend with a chair in the palace car. He took this car at Portland, and went to sleep. During the night, he claims, the heating apparatus got out of order, and as a consequence he took cold, and several weeks and was seriously affected. All efforts to obtain satisfaction by correspondence having failed, this action was instituted.

NEWS NOTES.

The wheat area of India is estimated at 27,000,000 acres. Europe has 66,320,000 farmers; the United States, 9,000,000. The largest apes have only sixteen ounces of brain the lowest men have thirty-nine.

One-fifth of the total resident population of Denver is composed of people who went there for their health's sake. It is gratifying to note the large proportions which the live lobster trade of Yarmouth, N. S., is assuming. In 1888 the value of the business only equalled \$60,107. This year it totals up to \$227,366. The Imperial Canal of China is the longest in the world and the greatest in point of traffic. Its length is 2,100 miles, and it connects forty-one cities situated on its banks. It was completed in 1350, after 600 years spent on its construction.

Shipbuilding on the Clyde has not revived to any considerable extent. The tonnage launched during the first half of this year is the lowest since 1888, and only about two-thirds of the shipping sent out in the first half of last year. The June output of all the Scottish shipyards was nearly 28,000 tons.

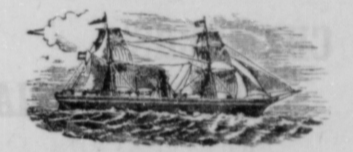
