

MacLean Hurls Two-Hitter As Dodgers Defeat Flyers

Barbour's Dodgers downed the M.C.A. Flyers 5-1 in a regular City Baseball League game which was called after 8 1/2 innings because of rain at Memorial Field last evening.

Donnie MacLean pitched 2-hit ball for the Dodgers, allowing only two singles in the bottom of the second which resulted in the Flyers lone run. MacLean walked two batters and struck out eight.

The Dodgers made their first break in the first inning. Vern Handrahan, pitching for the Flyers, walked Ralph Pineau, the first man at bat. Then Buck Whitlock stepped up to the plate and banded a home run over the right center field fence to put the Dodgers ahead 2-0. Charlie Ryan scored the Dodgers third run in the third with the aid of a walk, an error and a single. Whitlock's two-bagger in the 5th sent two men over the plate to end the Barbour gang's scoring.

The losing pitcher was Vern Handrahan who allowed 7 hits, 9 runs and struck out 8.

The Flyers only run came in the second inning as Lorne MacGugan singled to push John Squarbriggs across the plate.

Forbes Kennedy, Flyers catcher,

made a fine running catch behind the plate in the third, and Buck Whitlock made a nice pick-up on a hard-hit ball to left centre.

Last night's game leaves the Dodgers on top of the league with four wins and one loss, followed by the Stars with two wins and two losses. The Flyers, who have played one less game than the other teams, hold one win and two losses.

Island Players In Running For NB-PEI Golf Honors

FREDERICTON (CP) — Amateur leadership of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Islands golf tournaments again changed hands Wednesday when John Steele, Riverdale Golf and Country Club, shot his second straight 72 for a three-round total of 218.

His closest amateur competitor, clubmate John Randles, who had led his class Tuesday, soared to 78 in his third outing and at the end of 54 holes lagged three strokes behind Steele.

The latter's 218 tied him with defending pro champion Archie Skinner of St. Andrew in the contest for the open crown. Another pro, Charlottetown's Cecil Dowling, was third in the field with 220. Don Sinclair, Riverside and Jimmy Walker, Kentville, N. S., had 22's for a third place tie among the 12 professionals.

Steele carded a 72 Wednesday—best of the day—after previous rounds of 74 and 72. Skinner took 75, adding to his 73 and par 73. The various championships will be decided by another 18 holes today.

Ben Isner, of the Moncton Golf Club, who was in runner-up position among the amateurs Tuesday,

added a 78 to two 72's, only one stroke below Randles. Tied with Steele was Bob Gray, Charlottetown. Gray carded 74 after rounds of 70 and 78.

The defending amateur and open champion, Art MacKenzie, Charlottetown, continued out of the close fight. He started with an unfavorable 80 and took 76 for each of the next two rounds.

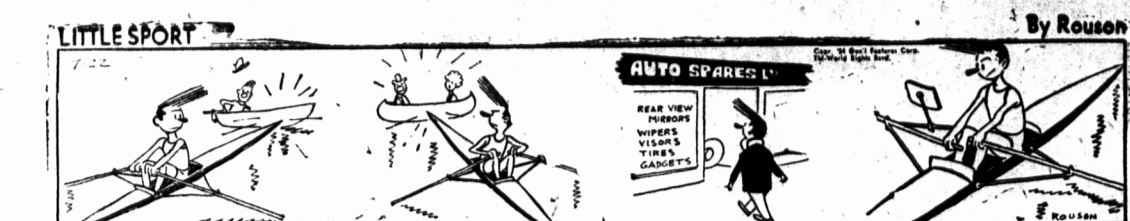

Chisox Pound Yankees 15-3 While Indians And Boston Tie

New York Indians edged a half-game ahead of the New York Yankees Wednesday but needed help from Chicago White Sox to do it. The Sox pounded out a 15-3 victory over the Yanks as Virgil Trucks became the first American League pitcher to win 13 games. The triumph boosted the third-place Chicagoans to within 4 1/2 games of the league-leading Indians, who could manage only their second straight tie with the Boston Red Sox, 7-7.

New York Giants helped their National League lead by edging the Cubs 2-1 in the opener of a two-game series at Chicago. Bill Taylor's ninth-inning single scored Hank Thompson with the winning run.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Second baseman Jim Brideweser permitted Jim Busby's easy grounder to trickle past him with the bases loaded and one out in the ninth inning, enabling Eddie Yost to score the tie-breaking run as Washington defeated Baltimore 6-5 Wednesday night.

The Senators shelled Bob Turley with a four-run outburst in the first inning and grabbed a quick 5-3 lead but the Orioles battled back to tie the score with two runs off winner Camillo Pascual in the eighth as Don Larsen checked Washington.

Yost opened the bottom of the ninth with a double and Johnny Pesky sacrificed. Mickey Vernon and Roy Sievers were purposely passed, filling the bases, before Brideweser committed his costly error on Busby's grounder.

The defeat was Baltimore's 15th in its last 17 games.

Loine Main Eliminated In Tennis Championships

TORONTO (CP)—Canada's No. 1 player, Lorne Main of Toronto, was eliminated in fourth-round men's singles play Wednesday in the Canadian tennis championships but No. 2 man Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., kept Dominion hopes alive, moving into the quarter-finals after a close fourth-round win.

Andre Hammersley, Chilean Davis Cupper and seventh-seeded foreign player in the tournament, upset Main in straight sets 6-4, 6-2.

Bedard, Canadian Davis Cupper, was forced to the limit by Reijin Kemo, Japanese star, but stopped the eighth-seeded foreigner in straight sets, 6-4, 8-6.

Bernard Tut Bartzon of San Angelo, Tex., top-seeded foreigner in the tournament, crushed Jim Bentley of Toronto, sixth-seeded Canadian, 6-0, 6-0, in their fourth-round match late Wednesday. The match lasted only 20 minutes.

JINX REPEATED

Main's loss was a repeat of his Canadian championships' jinx. Last week he defeated Hammersley in Davis Cup play. Last year he stopped Mario Llamas of Mexico in Davis Cup play and then was eliminated by Llamas in an early round of Canadian championship play.

Other seeded Canadians went down in fourth-round men's singles.

Paul Willey, Davis Cupper from Vancouver and seeded No. 3 Canadian in the tournament, lost to Ricardo Balbiers of Chile 8-6, 4-6, 6-0. Balbiers is seeded fifth among the foreign entries.

Jacques Giguere of Quebec City, fifth-seeded Canadian, lost to Kosei Kamo of Japan, third-seeded foreigner, after a hard fight, 7-5, 6-4.
