

## Smith Chapman Has Chance To Capture Both Open And Junior Men's Singles

OTTAWA (CP)—Smith Chapman of Montreal has a chance to become the first player to capture both the open and closed junior men's singles at the Canadian tennis championships.

Chapman, who won the closed singles earlier in the tournament, meets Tony Lieberman of Philadelphia in a semi-final match today and the winner meets Francois Godbout of Quebec City in the final.

Godbout scored the upset of the day in a tournament when he ousted David Breckner of Brooklyn, N.Y., 6-4, 19-8 in the semi-finals.

Chapman also reached the finals of the junior men's doubles when he teamed with Geoff Black of Montreal to defeat Tony Lieberman of Philadelphia and Peter Barker of Bradford, Conn., 6-4, 6-4 in one semi-final bracket. Their opponents will be known today.

Miss Dodge captured the junior women's singles with a 6-3, 8-6 victory over Phyllis Saganski of Hamtramck, Mich. in one of the three finals played Thursday.

Bay State Pat's victory in the free-for-all on Tuesday night at the Driving Park stamped him as just about the best race horse in the Maritimes. MacGregor perhaps waited a little too long before opening up in the third go and Josedale Clansman nosed him out at the wire. As it turned out though Bay State was awarded the heat anyway when the judges decided that Josedale Clansman had committed a misdeed on the turn and set him back to last.

It took the judges more than 45 minutes to arrive at their decision and while they pondered the crowd roared. More than one voice was raised in protest to the delay and announce Frank Aspin, who has been doing an outstanding job all season long, was unluckily caught in the middle. Frank, of course, has absolutely nothing to do with making the decisions as to who does or who doesn't win, but he was hearing the brunt of the crowd's vocal displeasure anyway. Possibly if it had been explained to them just why it was taking so long to arrive at a conclusion the situation might have been made a little more bearable.

It would be mighty interesting to see just what time Bay State Pat would clock if he could get away on the rail and stay close to the gate when starting. We have heard that the bay gelding has a tendency to go on the rail if he gets too close to the gate and this is the reason that driver MacGregor always takes him away about four or five lengths behind the rest of the field and as a result has to run the long mile in almost every heat. A race fan told us that even though he ran the long mile in the second heat of the free-for-all, Bay State Pat's own particular time was unofficially clocked at 2:05 1/2. So it would seem that if Mr. Perry's gelding can get away up with the field on Saturday, Charlotte-town's Driving Park may be sporting a new track record come Sunday.

# Bob Clegg & Bud Henley Race To Dead Heat; Ginger Worthy, Money Royal Win

Ginger Worthy and Money Royal raced to triple heat wins in yesterday afternoon's card at the Driving Park before a good-sized crowd, who for the third straight day braved threatening weather to attend.

The times registered weren't the fastest of the week but what the card lacked in speed it more than made up for in thrilling finishes, big pays and upsets.

Ginger Worthy led all the way in the first heat of the C-C Trot with Loretta Lee and Frisco the Great taking up the rear, but George MacDonald's black gelding had to go all out to take the second go with Frisco the Great breathing down his neck and in the finale won only after a sustained stretch drive that overtook Loretta Lee at the wire.

Midvale was third in the second and Frisco the Great showed in the third.

Money Royal was a decided underdog in the first heat of the B Pace but won after a battle to the wire with Miss Donna Mae and America's Ace to reward his backers with the fastest pay of the afternoon at \$43.90. Dr. Preston MacIntyre's bay gelding didn't come the bettors that he was capable of taking the second heat by his win performance in the first but after his second straight win he was finally declared the favorite in this last go and took top money again with Annuncio and Countess Carlo chasing him closely to the wire.

Miss Judy Hal, Faigo and Rosalie Hooper were all surprise winners as far as the bettors were concerned as they paid \$19.00, \$25.30 and \$12.40 in that order in dividing the heats of the CC Pace.

Rosalie Hooper finished second in the first two heats, losing out each time only after neck-and-neck drives to the finish line. Marion E. showed on both occasions and Lou Kalmuck took third position in the last heat.

Money Royal was the only starter to set a new record during the afternoon as he lowered his pace mark from 2:13 1/2 to 2:12 1/2 in the second heat.

The daily double on Miss Judy Hal and Money Royal paid a whopping \$197.00 and the quinnella on Faigo and Rosalie Hooper paid \$26.40.

The Indians, breaking up a 1-1 duel between Score and Frank Lary, started the Cleveland rally when he failed to touch first after taking a toss from Reno Bertoia on Vic Wertz' grounder. Al Kaline then put the tie-breaking run in scoring position when he booted Jerry Doby's single to right.

The Tigers threatened in the ninth, chasing Score with two runs on two walks, a double by Frank House and an infield out. Ray Narveski got Harvey Kuenn on a pop fly to end it.

Washington and Baltimore were not scheduled.

Both horses were underdogs, giving nice pays at the betting booths and both set new records for their mile run. Clegg brought his down from 2:17 1/2 and Bud Henley lowered his to 2:15 1/1.

Bud Henley went on to win the last heat of the event to take the honors for that race while Miss Bluenose came through to win the second, with Bob Clegg placing. Brenda Grattan showed in both of the first two heats and Famous Boy in the finale.

The night card was a repetition of the afternoon's card with the favorites taking quite a shellacking. There were only two dashes on the entire card that didn't send winners into the double figures. They were the first and third heats of the DD Pace.

Jolly Jim was a winner in the opening heat of the DD Pace followed closely by Carrier Pigeon and Jolly Mark while C.P. Clegg captured the second in a tight finish with Tony York and Flicka McElwyn. Carrier Pigeon took the third with C. P. Clegg and Jolly Jim trailing.

Mealey, a former New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island champion, was lightly rated at the start of the meet Monday, but successive wins shot him quickly into the fore.

Harley was leading at the end of nine holes by one stroke, but the booming drives and short iron work of the Westfield golfer enabled him to pull ahead three strokes at the completion of 18.

Mealey won four of the next nine, with Harley taking two and three were even. The 28th and 29th holes were halved and Harley won the 30th. They tied the 31st and Harley won the 32nd. Mealey parred the 33rd while Harley took one over giving the Westfield golfer a four edge with three holes remaining.

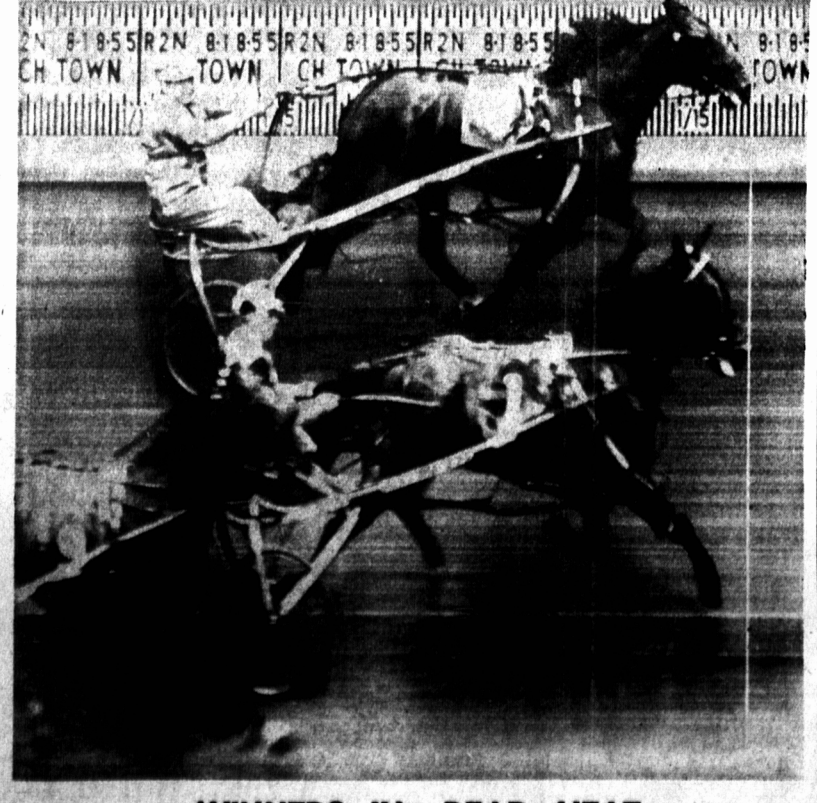
