Island, and is particularly attached to Senator Howland, the inventor and agitator of the great subway scheme.—Transcript.
FOR the following mortuary statistics for the month of Sept., we are indebted to Dr. Johnson, Statistical Officer: There were 14 deaths during the month. Teaching claimed 1 victim: dysentery, 1; whooping cough, 2; typhoid fever, 1; acute disease of lungs, 2; consumption, 4; embolism of heart, 1; cancer, 2. Of this number five were under 5 years of age; two from 5 to 20 years; three from 20 to 50 years; four from 50 to 72 years. Seven were Catholics and seven Protestants; three were English; three Scotch and eight Irish. The death rate per thousand per year is fourteen, and the average age at death 26 1/2 years.

THE Charlottetown correspondent of the Halifax Herald telegraphs to that paper under date of Oct. 5—"The Herald correspondent went to Georgetown yesterday to witness a gathering of Liberal reform delegates from every section of King's County and all friends of the Liberal party, to nominate a candidate for the Dominion Parliament for King's County. After searching for some hours he finally found out that the meeting was called for three o'clock. At that hour a baker's dozen had gathered at street corners. The meeting was adjourned for an hour to clear up a crowd. At half past four the mass meeting took place, less than forty being present. It was a sickly gathering. They nominated Dr. McIntyre, one of the present members, and Dr. Robertson as the grid standard bearers. The Liberal Conservatives will hold an early convention and nominate their candidates."
