

Glance Bay Miners In Impressive 5-2 Win Over Moncton Hawks

GLANCE BAY, N. S., Oct. 16 (CP)—Glance Bay Miners made an impressive entrance into Maritime Major Hockey League tonight before 2,774 fans by whipping Moncton Hawks 5-2.

The contest saw 20 minor penalties handed out by referees Hugh MacLean and Larry Heffering who had to be on their toes in a speedy, hard-hitting tilt.

Danny Horeck put Moncton into a lead at 4:40 of the second period on a sleeper play with Morey Hamilton drawing the lone defenceman. Four minutes later Moncton rearguard Maurice "Moose" Lallo galloped the length of the ice to beat Miner goalkeeper Bob Arneil.

Miners picked up the loose ends and, led by playing coach Norman "Bud" Poile, roared back. Poile, set up by linemate Phil Dalgleish, punched the first Miner tally from point blank range. Miner's Skippy Frezell was serving time on a quick handling penalty when the Glance Bay club hit the score sheet for the first time.

Three minutes later Dalgleish squared accounts on an assist goal. Then veteran Hub Macey roamed in from the wing to draw Gibson and score the winning goal.

As Hawks wilted in the third frame, Miners applied all their forward might, outshooting the visitors 15-2. Out of it they got two goals, one a quick break by right winger Bob Leger at 4:45 and the fifth a blistering ankle shot by Poile, set up by Dalgleish.

Soviet Sport World Rocked By Decision

MOSCOW, Oct. 16 (AP)—The all union committee of sports, Russia's highest athletic authority, rocked the Soviet sports world today by ordering a replay of the final game of the U.S.S.R. football championship.

It is a situation similar to what would happen in the United States if the Baseball Commissioner ordered a replay of the World Series.

The Soviet Army team had defeated the underdog Kalinin Club 2-1 Sunday, for the annual football cup. The game closes the football season.

Kalinin, an underdog all the way through the season, fought its way into the finals by beating everything in sight, including the mighty Moscow Dynamos. It didn't lose a single game. Army had won the big league play and reached the finals by turning back all other clubs. Kalinin, not even in the big league, met Army Sunday.

With 20 minutes to play, Army led 2-1, but in the final period Kalinin drove home a goal. But referee Latshev ruled "no goal."

He said the ball had been out of play.

Fans protested. So did the Kalinin team. Pravda took up the matter. Without taking sides, it said great skill is needed in refereeing. Today the press announced tersely that the game would be replayed. It didn't specifically blame the referee.

Islanders In Deal For Top Left-Winger; Name Not Announced

The Charlottetown Islanders are making a deal for a high scoring left winger, it was announced last night by coach Leo Lamoureux. He did not divulge the name of the player.

The Islanders will leave for Sydney this morning by bus. They have two engagements in Cape Breton, one with the Millonaires tonight and another in Glance Bay with the Miners tomorrow night.

The lineup will be the same as that which was used here Monday night against Halifax, with the exception of Johnny Morrow. Morrow injured his hand Monday night and may be out of action for a couple of days. Charlie Knox will be used tonight.

Leo Lamoureux was in touch with Walter Pawlyshyn by telephone again yesterday and Pawlyshyn stated he would be here by Thursday if he could make the plane connections. He is presently in Providence.

Morrow and Marcel Clements were the two casualties of Monday night's game. In addition to bruising his hand Johnny also received a cut in his forehead that required three stitches. Clements was cut over the eye and needed four stitches to close the gash.

The Islanders planned to travel by plane this year but a shortage of planes necessitates their use of a bus. The extra ten cents a head charge that will be forwarded to the visiting team is expected to take care of most of the Islanders' travelling charges.

Upset Win For Empire Welter Championship

LONDON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Wille Thom, an unheralded 23-year-old boxer from Liverpool, upset Eddie Thomas of Wales tonight to win the British and Empire welterweight championships in a 15-round bout.

The defeat stripped Thomas, one of the world's leading welterweights, of his last title. He lost his European crown to Charles Humeux of France in June.

Thomas outwitted his young rival, 147 to 145 3/4.

In the co-feature, Don Cockell, British and European light heavyweight champion, knocked out Albert Finch of London in 45 seconds of the seventh round of a 15-round title bout. Cockell weighed 174 3/4, Finch 172 3/4.

Challenge Bout At Georgetown Promises Action

A challenge bout at Georgetown tonight between clever Harry Poulton and Louis "Kid" Lafferty will feature a six-bout card that promises plenty of excitement for boxing fans.

Poor Construction Blamed For Fire

FREDERICTON, Oct. 16 (CP)—Cause of Sunday morning's fire at Bronson, where the Alphonse Dupuis family of eight persons met death, was reported tonight as "improper and highly dangerous type of interior construction."

E. J. Sturgeon, deputy provincial fire marshal, said his investigation revealed that overheated stacks or pipes had ignited partitions through which the pipes passed without proper clearance or insulation.

Smouldering could have created sufficient gases and super-heated smoke to asphyxiate all eight occupants while they slept, he reported. The evidence suggested that all died in their beds before the flames reached them.

Mr. Sturgeon said that such super-heated air and gases were more dangerous than carbon monoxide and more stupefying than chloroform.

Insurance on the Dupuis residence had been cancelled because of the dangerous conditions and at least two warnings had been given.

Nylon Smugglers Face Charges

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Oct. 16 (Reuters)—British customs investigators are ready to pounce on a well-organized gang of transatlantic nylon smugglers, with headquarters in New York and London, it was revealed today.

Evidence on the operations of the gang which brings thousands of smuggled nylon stockings into this south-coast port every year, has been obtained after recent arrests in this country.

A two-year hunt for the gang has been mainly centred on the crack British liners Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary, which ply regularly between Southampton and New York.

Nylons, bought in New York at less than \$1 a pair have sold in nylon-starved British girls at \$2.80 to \$4 a pair.

In Britain, nylons are taxed to one-third of their value with a further one-third customs levy.

Claims Farm Systems Will Wreck Baseball

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—Leslie O'Connor, for 21 years one of Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis' closest advisers, said today farm systems are destroying organized baseball.

O'Connor told a house Judiciary sub-committee that late Judge Landis never liked the farm systems. But, O'Connor said, "Judge Landis did not oppose it as much as I do."

Under the farm system, a major league club owns or controls minor league teams. The sub-committee, studying whether baseball violator anti-trust laws has been casting a critical eye on the farms.

O'Connor said that the rules say no team can control more than 40 ball players. "But by the farm system," he said, "it actually can control hundreds of players."

He contended that this isn't good for the player, the minor leagues or, in some cases, the major league clubs which go in for farming.

Here are some of the objections O'Connor raised:

Ball players — under the farm system they're largely limited to the organization with which they sign. If a second baseman is signed, and the club happens to have a good second baseman, O'Connor said the player may be put in "cold storage."

Minor leagues — they have been cut off from many sources of revenue that they had before, such as sale of players. He said the farm system got its foothold during the depression, and originally the idea was that the majors would help the minors only until the emergency had passed.

O'Connor, now a Chicago lawyer, and also counsel for the Pacific Coast League, admitted that any attempt to cancel the farm system entirely would cause considerable confusion.

Beavers Outskate St. Mary's For 5-2 Victory; Halifax Outshot 31-15

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 16 (CP)—The Maritime Major Hockey League season here had a brisk opening tonight before a full house at the Forum as the revamped Saint John Beavers outskated Halifax St. Mary's for a 5-2 win.

Appearing caught off balance at the outset, the Saints were kept behind their blue line during most of the first 77 periods and much of the third.

The tale of the game was reflected largely in the number of stops. Laurie Frechette, playing well for Halifax, had to make 31 as compared with 15 by Phil Hughes.

Beavers, mostly former Toronto St. Michael's and Los Angeles Monarchs players, passed and combined in good style for their first league game of the season. They shot one in the first period and three in the second. Bill McCracken fired a brace for Saint John, with Johnny Ubrico, Jack Meldrum and Tom Smelle getting the others. Ubrico had two assists. Pete Leswick and Freddy Weaver countered for St. Mary's.

The ice surface soon became wet as play proceeded in a mild temperature.

The first Halifax shot on goal was not until 15 minutes after the game opened. Frechette was falling as Ubrico opened the scoring on Matt Mesich's rebound. Meldrum counted at the start of the second period and McCracken's brace made it 4-0. The visitors, seeming bewildered at times by the Beaver attack, rarely ventured ahead of their blue line.

Leswick scored in the third period after Beavers were caught up the ice and Mickey Keating drew out Hughes. Five minutes later, with Saint John players in the penalty box, Weaver capitalized on the situation. Andy Brown assisted. Tom Smelle ended the scoring after a breakaway with Ubrico.
