A HERO UNREWARDED.—A brave seaman sprang overboard from the S. S. Parisian Monarch when the thermometer stood at five degrees below zero to secure one of the hawsers with which an attempt was made to tow the disabled Edna into port. He has not yet been recognized nor rewarded.

DEATH FROM EXPOSURE.—Matthew McArthur, aged forty, a resident of Prince Edward Island, Canada, died this morning at the Charity Hospital, Jersey City. The man was picked up yesterday in Burnham's lumber yard, suffering from cold and alcoholism. He was also injured by a fall. The physicians did what they could for him, but were unable to save his life. His friends in Canada were notified to-day of his death.—New York Evening News, 2nd inst.

A HEAVY GALE from the N. E. set in yesterday, about 10 a. m., accompanied with snow, and was very severe between 5 and 11 p. m., during which time (six hours) 253 miles of wind passed, at times running at the rate of fifty miles an hour. The snow fall is estimated at seventeen inches. About midnight the wind backed around to the N. W., and moderated until about 5 o'clock this morning, when the gale was well spent.

THE storm yesterday was heavy along the Railway. Reports from different points on the line state that the fall of snow was from ten to fourteen inches, and the drifts along the line are from ten to fifteen feet deep. The road between Summerside and the City is now open. No. 1 train for Tignish, left County Line at 2.47 p. m. No. 4 train from Summerside for Charlottetown, left Bradshaw at 2.55 p. m. No. 2 train from Tignish for Charlottetown, left Blomfield at 2.32 p. m. No. 6 train from Georgetown, left Caidigan at 1 p. m. No. 8 train from Souris, left Bear River at 11 p. m.

RECOVERED.—Last evening at 7 o'clock, when the storm was raging, Marshal Flynn, in crossing Queen Street, heard the cries of a child in the snow bank opposite Mr. Ferguson's store. The storm was blinding, and although the cries were uttered a short distance from the Marshal, he was unable to discover the exact place from whence they came. He asked the child to speak loud and tell where it was, but it was evidently exhausted and could not speak. He then plunged into the bank, and after wading to his shoulders in the snow, succeeded in finding the child, which proved to be a little girl named Rochford. With the assistance of Mr. Bernard Callaghan, she was rescued from the bank in an exhausted condition. She said she had been there two hours, and felt very sleepy. Had the Marshal not discovered her when he was passing, she doubtless would have perished.

Trouble in Limerick.

OTTAWA, Feb. 5. The retirement of Major Ridout, on Jan. 26th, from the staff of the Royal Military College, is gazetted.

Lieut. A. G. Wurtelle and J. B. Cochrane, graduates of the Royal Military College, have been appointed on the instructional staff of the College.

Col. W. Lauris, D. A. G., of Military District No. 11, has been permitted to retire, retaining rank from Jan. 30, 1882.

Applications will be made to Parliament for acts of Incorporation by the Ocean Mutual Insurance Company, Rapid City Central Railway Company, and Rainy River Boom Company.

An Order in Council provides new regulations for slaughtering swine in bond.

Commissioner Johnston, yesterday, completed his investigation at Montreal in the Pullman Car investigation. He will report to the Minister.

A local paper charges gross irregularities in the Montreal Post Office.

Lord Dunmore has engaged rooms at the Russell House, to be here on the 13th.

HALIFAX, Feb. 5. The bill for the consolidation of provincial railways has passed the second reading in the House of Assembly.

The steamer "Peruvian" arrived at two o'clock this morning with the English mails, but did not dock in consequence of a case of small-pox in her stowage. None of the passengers landed.

DUBLIN, Feb. 5. Great uneasiness prevails at Limerick owing to the ill-feeling existing between certain classes of citizens; and the militia officer commanding addressed a communication to magistrates pointing out that the soldiers are unable to walk on the streets at night without being stoned, and giving warning that the military will be compelled to fire on the people in self defence if the attacks continue.

The magistrates have resolved to take extraordinary precautions to preserve peace.

LONDON, Feb. 5. Everything points to a stormy first night in the House of Commons.

The Parnellites threaten to raise the question of privilege, in regard to the imprisonment of Parnell and his colleagues. The Bradlaugh question will almost certainly be discussed before the Irish one, Bradlaugh meaning to arrive among the first to take oath.

The Government intend to secure his admission, the Home Rulers and Tories have agreed to oppose it.

The British steamer "Cosmo," reported at Sebastopol from Galveston, via Norfolk has foundered in the Black Sea. Ten corpses were washed ashore from the vessel.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. Judge Cox this morning overruled the motion for a new trial in the Guitreau case, and sentenced him to be hung June 30, between 12 and 2 p. m., in Washington jail.

MONCTON, Feb. 6. The storm yesterday was the worst experienced for years.
