New Butter Restrictions By U. S. Announced

WASHINGTON, (CP)—Despite
Canadian protests against trade-
throttling import restrictions, the
United States agriculture department
has announced new butter
limitations as part of a general
reduction of dairy imports.
The announcement Wednesday
followed a strongly-worded note
from Canada to the U. S. protest-
ing new American quotations on
foreign shipments of dairy prod-
ucts, fats and oils.
The new butter quota limits im-
ports from all countries to 707,
000 pounds. New Zealand is al-
lowed 332,000 pounds, Denmark
212,000 and 163,000 pounds in the
group total allowed Canada, Ar-
gentina, Australia, Finland, Nor-
way, Sweden and Switzerland. The
U. S. agriculture department did
not break down the 163,000
pounds into allocations allowed
the last seven countries.
The butter restrictions are ef-
fective until July 30, 1954, and
are part of general restrictions
recommended by the U. S. tariff
commission and applied by the
Eisenhower administration under
provisions of the Agricultural Ad-
justment Act.

Former Islander Dies In Oregon

ly, Wash. and was later with the
Clarke-Nickerson Lumber Company
at Everett and the Seaboard Lum-
ber Company at Seattle.

ber Company; the McIntosh Lum-
ber Company; the McIntosh Lum-

mills, Inc., Orestent City, California.

Oregon.

W.C.T.U. NOTES

TEMPERANCE EDUCATION
INCREASED IN CANADA
British Columbia was the first
of three provinces to introduce al-
cohol education into its depart-
ment of education, National Wom-
en's Christian Temperance Union
was told recently.
Mrs. Grace Knight of Calgary
reported this at the 35th biennial
convention in West Point Grey
United Church at which she was
re-elected corresponding secretary.
Mrs. James Lade, Vancouver,
was re-elected president.
Schools Take Over
Mrs. Knight said that gradu-
ally WCTU work of education and
promotion of scientific temperance
in schools and young people's
societies was being taken over by
departments of education and in-
corporated into the school curricu-
lum. She mentioned, specifically,
British Columbia, Ontario and
Manitoba.
She referred also to the Alber-
ta—Saskatchewan—Manitoba
School of Narcotic Education in
Saskatoon, sponsored by the WCTU
and now receiving grants from the
governments of the three prairie
provinces.
The school, unique in Canada,
gives summer courses in narcotics
and alcohol education especially
for teachers and youth leaders.
Hostess Fund
Miss Zella Shaver, Toronto,
re-elected treasurer, reported that
the world WCTU hostess fund,
raised from contributions given by
WCTU members across Canada,
had amounted to \$10,564, making
it possible to pay for accommoda-
tion and entertainment of dele-
gates from overseas and other non-
dollar countries.

FISHERMEN!

Protect Your Fishing Vessels!
The Fishermen's Indemnity Fund, set up by the Govern-
ment of Canada to enable fishermen to secure low cost
protection against storms and other perils, will go into
effect in the Maritime Provinces on July 6th.
This low cost protection will help you in time of need.

WHO ARE ELIGIBLE?

All commercial fishermen who operate their own fishing
vessels.
WHAT VESSELS ARE ELIGIBLE?
All seaworthy fishing vessels valued at between \$250 and
\$7,500.
WHAT COVERAGE YOU GET
Total loss — 60% of the appraised value.
Serious damage — If the damage exceeds 30% of the ap-
praised value of the vessel, you will be paid 85% of the
amount over 30%.
WHAT YOU PAY
The yearly premium is 1% of the appraised value of your
vessel.
HOW TO SECURE COVERAGE
Get in touch with your local Fishery Officer, who will ex-
plain the plan and help you fill in the application form.
Arrangements will then be made for an appraisal of your
vessel. You pay the premium and your vessel is then pro-
tected.
A handbook with details of the plan can be obtained from
your local Fishery Officer, or the Department of Fisheries,
Box 550, Halifax, Nova Scotia.
The plan to provide coverage for lobster traps will be an-
nounced in July.
