

OBITUARY

HUGH J. BUD MacLEAN On Wednesday, October 14, 1964, the death of Hugh John MacLean was both shocked and deeply saddened to hear of his sudden passing. He was a very short time, and only in recent years having begun to assume a less active role in the life of the community and home, the loss is one that long shall be felt.

Hugh MacLean was born in Meadobank in 1883, the second oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel MacLean. Having worked a few years in Massachusetts, he married the late Sarah MacKinnon (Rose Valley) in 1905. Twelve years later they returned from Quincy to their native province to live in the farming community of Clyde River. People will always remember the warmth, humor and understanding that had endeared Mr. MacLean to all who came to know him. A leader in the affairs of his church and community, the passing of Hugh MacLean leaves a void in the family and friends, a valuable resource has been lost.

Mr. MacLean leaves to mourn his children: Pearl, Mrs. Daniel MacKinnon, Charlottetown; Elizabeth, Mrs. William May, Medford, Massachusetts; Myrtle, Mrs. Douglas MacLean, Charlottetown; Hugh J., Jr., Cornwall; Ruth, Mrs. Frances Hannon, Belton, Massachusetts. He leaves seventeen grandchildren and five great grandchildren. His wife and one son, R. King, died age 84 years. He leaves his granddaughter, Mrs. George H. Watts, who loyally cared for him in recent years. The largely attended funeral was held on Saturday, October 17, at the River Presbyterian Church. The funeral was conducted by the Reverend Don Nicholson, a long time friend of Mr. MacLean.

Neatly Tailored Fiedler Gets Into Night Club Act

NEW YORK (AP) — If you have talent, it's never too late to break into the night club set. Arthur Fiedler, white-haired and elegantly tailored conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra and turning 70 on Dec. 17, did just that at jazz trumpeter's Al Hirt's night club in New Orleans.

As he raised his bow to give Hirt a cue, his conge the down beat, he asked, "Where are the old men?"
Hirt's reply was to blow the first bright note of Bugles Holiday and a Fiedler evening had begun.

Fiedler made a night of it, going down Bourbon Street to hear some old-time jazz and later to see a strip show.

Fiedler, who enjoys the best of all kinds of music, has no patience with those who take pride in confining their appreciation to one special form.

"There is such damn snobism in music, you know," he says, pronouncing the words with rapid relish in a melodic Boston accent. "Some people go on forever listening to baroque music. I don't see how they can, as great as some of it is. There isn't very much variety in rhythm or tonality."

ROSSINI'S RULE
The Boston Pops agree with Rossini that all music is good except the boring kind.

arrangement of their song, "I Want To Hold Your Hand," and conducted it wearing a Beatle wig. He didn't hang himself; he was a smash hit.

Fiedler's father, born in Austria, was first violinist in the Boston Symphony. Two uncles also were Boston Symphony violinists and conductors.

After graduating from Berlin's Royal Academy, a fourth Fiedler, age 19, joined the violin section. That was 50 years ago.

In 1924, Fiedler organized the Boston Sinfonietta, a chamber ensemble of symphony musicians. In 1929, he instigated and conducted two weeks of free, outdoor concerts by the Boston Symphony on the Charles River Esplanade. Fiedler still conducts the two-week Esplanade concerts, and in 1954 Governor Christian Herter dedicated the Arthur Fiedler Bridge over the highway bordering the area.

A year after Fiedler started the Esplanade concerts he was named conductor of the Pops.

"The name Pops meant popular — Tchaikovsky, Beethoven, ballet music—things that appealed to people. I've kept more or less the same philosophy, from Bach to Beatles."

Fiedler has no idea how many recordings he has made or how many by the Pops have been sold. "I know our jalousee was the first record by an orchestra to reach the million — selling point."

The newest Pops record album, Pops Goes The Trumpet features Al Hirt, playing with 50 more backup men than is his custom.

The maestro has only praise for his new friend, the trumpeter. "Al does a fine Haydn."

He means to keep directing the Pops, 10 weeks in Symphony Hall and two weeks on the Esplanade, the rest of the summer divided between conducting the pops at the Fandewald Music Festival in the Berkshires Hills, a dozen concerts with the San Francisco Symphony and miscellaneous guest appearances and recordings.

This winter Fiedler has European and United States tours planned. He has Japan on the calendar for fall 1965 and New Zealand for early 1966.

In January he will receive an honorary degree, his seventh since 1924.

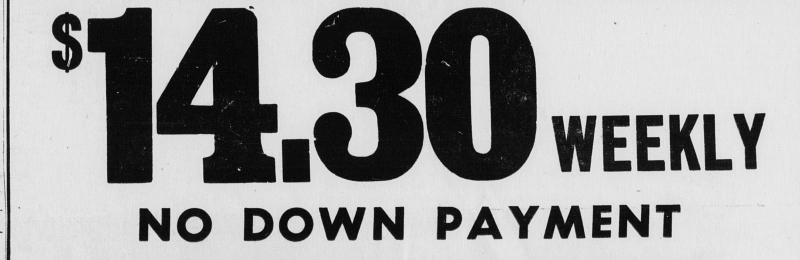
