



# Ike Denies U.S. Planes Play 'Games' With Reds

WASHINGTON (CP) — President Eisenhower Tuesday voiced a suspicion that the Soviet Union sometimes uses false radio signals to throw American military aircraft off course.

He made the comment in referring at a press conference to the American charge that Soviet fighters shot down an unarmed U.S. transport over Soviet Armenia last September, but made no attempt to link the use of false radio beams with the September incident.

At the same time he vigorously denied reports current in the U.S. that American aircraft sometimes play "fox and hounds" along the Turkish frontier to lure Soviet fighters into the air to test their state of preparedness.

American planes occasionally strayed into Soviet territory, he

said, because of "errors in navigation" or "storms and things of that kind."

**FALSE SIGNALS**  
"Once in a while," he went on, "we believe there are false radio signals that will take a plane off course."

He also told his weekly press conference that he is sorry state Secretary Dulles has had to go into hospital for a hernia operation.

In almost harsh tones, Eisenhower rejected an invitation, extended to him last week by Soviet Premier Khrushchev in a speech before the Communist party congress in Moscow, to visit the Soviet Union.

He asked whether his questioner had read that speech "and

what he had to say, particularly about the United States as a whole. Its leaders, and some of the language he used to describe us as a nation."

**WANTS BETTER INVITATION**  
"I would think," the president added, "that certainly I would have to wait for some more official type of, and more, let us say, persuasive kind of invitation than that."

He expressed his conviction that the four-engine U.S. transport shot down 25 miles in Soviet territory last Sept. 2 had strayed over the border accidentally. The state department last week made public what it said was a tape recording of intercepted radio talk between Soviet fighters as they brought the aircraft down in flames. Six U.S. airmen died and 11 others still are missing.

Radio Moscow has denounced the recording as a fake.

# Liquor Charge Draws Fine And 6-Month Jail Sentence

**SUMMERSIDE** — A Summerside man was sentenced to serve six-month term in jail and fined \$500 when he appeared for sentencing in Magistrate's Court here Tuesday morning.

The man will serve an additional six-month sentence if he fails to pay the fine. It was the accused's second conviction on a charge of possessing illegally manufactured liquor.

A heavy docket-faced Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C. Two young men, residents of Borden and Alberton were each fined \$20 and costs for making application for a liquor permit

while under the legal age of 21 years.

A Miminigash man was handed a fine of \$20 and costs for unlawfully allowing another person to use his permit.

A St. Eleanor's man was fined \$1 and costs of \$4 for failing to provide adequate shelter for his horse. The court was told the horse was now being properly cared for and a neighbour wishes to purchase him. The court ordered the accused to sell the horse.
