### Island's First Eviscerating Plant Opens Today At S'side

The official opening this afternoon of the new poultry killing and eviscerating plant of Jenkins Bros. Ltd. in Summerside will mark a development of importance in the campaign to have more agricultural products processed in the Province. The official opening by Premier A.W. Matheson at 2:30 p.m. will mark the establishment of the first and only eviscerating plant to be established in Prince Edward Island and will fill a long felt need. It will be recalled that last Christmas the market for Island turkeys became almost nonexistent because of the demand for eviscerated birds only, and these could not be supplied here. The housewife today is demanding that foodstuffs be retailed in sanitary packages and almost ready for the table hence the need of an eviscerating plant. The company of Jenkins Bros. Ltd., who last year handled about one million pounds of poultry, expects that the existence of the plant will revitalize the poultry industry in the Province. Jenkins Bros. It is located across Noonan Street from the canning plant. The building is constructed of cement blocks and is of two stories. The original building is 100 by 30 feet and the addition is 58 by 30.

### S'side Home School Group Holds Meeting

The Summerside Home and School Welfare group held its first monthly meeting of the 1957-58 school season at Civic Auditorium last night with the newly elected president, Mrs. J. Arthur Clark, in the chair. Mr. D.O. Stewart, chairman of the Summerside School Board, addressed the group, giving a picture of how enrollment and expenditure had increased down through the years. In 1937 there were 44 students and 553 elementary students. In 1957, 127 students attended the new high school and a total of 1,096 were enrolled in the elementary school. Keeping pace with this advance, expenditure in 1957 was \$10,909 and the budget for 1957 was \$77,530. Revenue coming to the school from non-resident pupils has also increased greatly in the last two years, and has about reached the saturation point. Mr. Ralph Judge reported on the "Sale-of-Books" project, under taking by the Home and School in Holman's store at the beginning of school. Receipts from books sold amounted to \$3,079.41 and the Home and School Association would receive about \$250 from the project. A motion was unanimously passed that a letter of thanks be written to R.T. Holman, Ltd. for allowing the home and school to participate in this sale of school books. Mr. Clarence Mercer, school supervisor, introduced the new teachers and explained to all the group some of the problems which faced the teachers. Television, to many extra-curricular activities were two things he stressed as preventing pupils from realizing their potential in school work. After other routine business was discussed the meeting adjourned and after a short "get-acquainted" period between teachers and parents, refreshments were served by the committee in charge.

### Former Freeland Man Dies In California

The death of Caleb Milligan Smith occurred in Redding, California, on September 13th in his 84th year. He had been in failing health for almost three years. He was the son of the late David and Elizabeth Smith of Freeland, P.E.I. but had lived most of his life in California. ### Mink Breeders Will Spend \$70,000 For Promotion

According to Lowell W. Hancock, Prince Edward Island delegate just returned from a 4-day convention of C.M.B.B. at Lac Beauport, Quebec, the C.M.B. executive voted \$50,000 for mutation, and \$20,000 for dark mink fur promotion at the retail level in Canada during the coming year. It is felt with the rising economic status of the country Canada is due for larger promotions of our own furs to our own people in addition another \$47,000 of Canadian mink breeders funds have gone into E.M.B.A. (the mutation breeders association in the U.S.A.) as deductions from Canadian mink sold in U.S. markets the past year of the overall world promotion of E.M.B.A. mink furs during the coming year. Funds were also made available for research work on mink diseases of which the most dreaded at present is infectious enteritis, a disease presently taking large toll of mink in the Winnipeg area and which particularly wiped out the Fort William, Ont. mink ranching over the past several years. Part of Ontario has also been subjected to this disease as well as areas in the U.S. Dr. Alex Wood of the University of B.C. is research coordinator and work is being carried on there, and at Hull, Quebec and at the Ontario Veterinary College. Arrangements were consummated with Canadian auction houses regarding the sale of C.M.B. members pelts and deductions thereon for advertising and promotional purposes for the coming season. Auction house representatives present voiced their opinion that barring unforeseen economic developments, the mink market for 1957-58 should be much improved over last season, due to the large consumption of pelts in the trimming and split skin trades which has resulted in an almost bare market at the moment. Present at the C.M.B.S. 5th annual convention Sept. 12-15, were delegates from British Columbia, Ontario, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Quebec and Nova Scotia. Other prominent fur men present were Dr. C.K. Gunn Dom. Exp. fox-mink ranch, Summerside who addressed the meeting; Dr. Alex Wood, University of B.C.; L.J. Simard, Supt. of Quebec Exp. Fur Farms; Arthur C. Prentice, Mgr. Canadian Fur Auction Sales Co., Montreal and Alf. Cleven Mgr. of Hudson's Bay Company, Montreal. The Quebec Fur Breeders Assn were the hosts and entertained the meeting at a dinner and arranged tours and teas for wives or those attending during the conventions. The 1958 C.M.B. convention will be held at Edmonton, Alta. as a result of acceptance of an invitation from that province at the 1957 convention. All officers were returned to office for another year. The 1957-58 executive elected K.W. Butlerfield, Chas. Combs, Lindsay French, Cal. Martin, Kenneth Montgomery.
