THERE are over 18,000,000 lbs. of cheese in Canada unmarketed, 30,000,000 in the United States awaiting export, besides 15,000,000 unsold in the English market. In Liverpool, G. E., goods are being forced upon the market at ruinously low rates to dispose of surplus stocks.

AN OLD MAN WALKS FROM THE ALMS HOUSE TO ETERNITY.—William Irvine, aged 80 years, escaped from the Alms House, on Saturday, and walked on his "sock feet" to Mr. John Campbell's, Duke street, Carleton, where he died soon afterwards. Coroner Earle decided that an inquest was unnecessary. A daughter of the old man, a single woman of forty years, perished in our big fire, a fact that has only just been made public.—St. John News.

H. M. S. Orient arrived at Halifax on Monday with the 101st Regiment, having sailed from Bermuda on Monday last. Of the 1,000 men that left Cyprus, only about 650 arrived in Halifax, numbers of the men having been compelled, through sickness, to remain at Malta, Gibraltar and Bermuda. They landed in the afternoon and took their quarters at the Wellington Barracks. A number of the men are still sick with Cyprus fever, but there have been no deaths. The 20th Regiment has been ordered by telegram received on Monday to immediately get ready to embark for Cyprus instead of Gibraltar. They will embark either on Wednesday or Thursday.

At the last meeting of the Supreme Court in Charlottetown an application was made by William Lowther, a resident rate payer in the Rice Point School District, for an injunction to restrain John MacEachern and others as Trustees of the said school district from allowing the school house in said district to be used for purposes other than strictly school purposes, but more particularly from using it as a place of worship and Sunday school. The application was opposed on behalf of the Trustees, and the unanimous decision of the Court was, that the school house, with the consent of the Trustees, may be used as a place of public worship, or for any other lawful public meeting, and that so using it was not in any way a violation of or contrary to the provisions of the Public Schools Act, 1877. It may be interesting for the Trustees of other districts to know what their powers are in such cases.

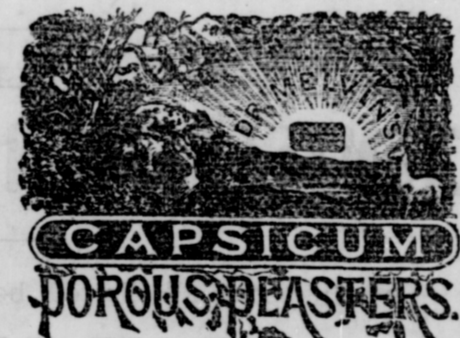
