NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5.

It is asserted in well informed Conservative circles that Mr. Chapleau will only remain a short while in the local ministry, provided he can succeed in retaining a majority for the Local Government in the Legislature. He will ultimately remove to Ottawa.

The Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, W. Smith, has adjourned the investigation at Quebec into the stranding on Prince Edward Island of the Dominion Line steamship "Quebec." The vessel has been permitted to proceed to Liverpool and the Captain will return if required to do so.

It is learned from the Department of Agriculture that no official notification has been received from the United States Government that embargo has been placed on the importations into that country of Canadian Cattle, as is announced in the mid-day press despatch from Washington. There is little doubt entertained, however, as to the truth of the statement.

The committee have collected a guarantee fund of \$1,200 towards the \$1,500 or \$1,600 required for the banquet tendered to Sir John A. Macdonald.

Private advices from Rome, say that on the 15th of October His Lordship Bishop Fabre was accorded a private audience by His Holiness Leo XIII. He was granted a special benediction for himself, his clergy and his diocese.

NAPANEE, ONT., Nov. 5.

The river was frozen over last night as far as Unger's Island, the ice being strong enough to carry persons across on foot. The steamer "Pilgrim" was three hours getting through four miles of ice this morning coming to this place. The sleighing is good here.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.

Total city vote for Governor: Connell, 45,010; Robinson, 58,548; Kelly, 42,136. Lieut. Governor: Geo. G. Hoskins (Republican), 49,661; Clarkson N. Potter (Democrat), 95,593. Of the Aldermen elected 9 were Tammany, 7 anti-Tammany, and 6 Republican.

The Times claims the Republican victory to be complete. Cornell is elected by 40,000 votes and the entire Republican state ticket is elected. The Republicans elect 24 Senators, 85 Assemblymen. Republican majority on joint ballot will be 58.

In New Jersey, the Republicans have again carried the day.

Returns from Wisconsin show Republican gains. A Republican Governor has been chosen.

In Connecticut, also, the Republicans won.

The Democrats carried Mississippi. Democratic successes are reported from Maryland.

LEAVENWORTH, Kansas, Nov. 5.

The Democrats elected the Sheriff by 250 majority; Republicans elected the Treasurer by 200 majority. Remainder of the ticket doubtful. The Democrats re-elected their County Commissioners by a large majority.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.

The city complete, except three precincts, gives Johnson 20,254; Gueirn 15,635. Johnson's majority in the entire county is over 7,000. The Socialists polled about 4,500 in the city, a large falling off. The entire Republican ticket elected by about the same vote.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 5.

There will probably be a Republican majority in the State of 10,000 in a light vote, with Rice (Democrat) 2,000 or 3,000 ahead of the balance of that ticket, and Pillsbury (Republican) correspondingly behind. Gilman (Republican) for Lieut. Governor, will be ahead.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.

As yet, there is nothing definite from the city vote, but the friends of Robinson are claiming 35,000 plurality. It is likely that this is too large.

The Sun's editorial returns at hand indicate the election of A. B. Cornell as Governor, and cannot fall below 20,000. Fate of the rest of the Democratic State tickets is still in doubt. The defeat of Robinson is the work of Kelly who it appears has received 40,000 votes in this city, and from 10,000 to 15,000 in the interior, chiefly along the line of Canal.

The city will give Kelly 40,000 votes. Predicting on the city vote with that of Potters' vote, it will more than double Cornell's. The Democratic State ticket, except for Governor, is elected. The vote on County officers is close, but Tammany will probably elect its nominee.

BOSTON, Nov. 4, 8 p. m.

General Butler has carried Boston by a plurality of 5,000. Returns from throughout the State, received thus far, 8 p. m., indicate Long's election by a decreased majority from last year.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.

The defeat of General Butler is conceded by his own friends, who allow that Long's plurality will be 8,000, but there is every indication that it will reach 15,000, and may touch 17,000. The Republican Councillors are elected, and the Legislature is overwhelmingly Republican.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 5.

The indications are that Philadelphia has gone Republican by a larger majority than has been ever known on State ticket. Returns from the State continue to show Republican gains.

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 4.

The election was very quiet. The returns are light, and cannot judge the result, although it is expected the Democrats will carry the State.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 4.

The seats are sure for 20,000 Republican majority.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Nov. 5.

The Paris correspondent of the Times discredits the report of fresh differences between Mr. Layard and Mr. Fournier, and the possible replacement of the latter. He says there has long been a personal feud between them.

LONDON, Nov. 5.

A Cabinet Council was held yesterday and another to-day. The Turkish ambassador had an interview with Salisbury before the Council met, and the French ambassador after its adjournment. The Russian ambassador had an interview with Beaconsfield.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 4.

Sir Austin Layard, British Ambassador, told Mahmud Nedim Pasha and Sauras Pasha, Turkish Ministers of the Interior and Foreign Affairs, plainly, that if Turkey continued the course she has pursued during the past year, very disastrous consequences will ensue. Many of these most competent to judge declare it too late to avert a catastrophe. People who witnessed the former crisis here, say they never before saw such a hopeless state of affairs.

LONDON, Nov. 4.

A despatch from Constantinople says that the rumor of an impending Ministerial crisis is contradicted. There is considerable excitement at Stamboul on account of the expected arrival of the British squadron in Turkish waters. The Porte, having received no official explanation regarding the British squadron, has telegraphed to Musurus Pasha, Turkish Ambassador at London, instructing him to ask Salisbury for information.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.

The Emperor, in giving audience to the new President and Vice-Presidents of the Chamber of Deputies, expressed himself well satisfied with the internal situation of Prussia.

VIENNA, Nov. 5.

The resignation of Count Zichy, Austrian Ambassador, is thought to be connected with the present crisis at Constantinople.

BERLIN, Nov. 4.

German Admiralty is considering the warlike complications in China and Japan, have resolved to reinforce their fleet in those waters to protect the German interests.

The Edinburgh Scotchman's London correspondent says it is stated that the Government will send two regiments of cavalry and a body of infantry to Ireland.

BERLIN, Nov. 4.

Bismarck has requested Russia to withdraw 20,000 cavalry from Poland on the borders of the German territory.

TURKEY.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 5.

It is believed here that British action will lead to the return to power of Khairuddin Pasha or to the assumption of the Premiership by Mahmud Nedim Pasha, according as the Sultan may yield to Great Britain or Russian assistance.

LONDON, Nov. 5.

The Times says: "We have no reason to suppose that the measures of reform on which Layard is insisting are beyond the powers of the Turkish government."

SPAIN.

MADRAS, Nov. 5.

By an accident to a passenger train near Arcunon on the 31st of October, in consequence of the sinking of an embankment after the rain, 19 persons, including three Europeans, were killed and 45 wounded.

Canada is now accorded, upon high authority, the place for some time claimed for her as the fourth country in the world with respect to extent of shipping owned. We stated a year ago, that if the lines of ocean steamers and clippers owned in Canada, but registered in Liverpool and Glasgow, were included, this country was entitled to at least the fourth place. The latest issue of the *Repetoire General*, issued by the French Bureau Veritas, arranges the ship owning countries in the following order: Great Britain, United States, Norway, Canada, Germany, Italy, France. The sailing ship is being steadily replaced by the steamer, as is apparent from the decline in sailing tonnage from 14,218,072 last year to 11,103,605 now. The share of Britain in the commerce of the world is shown by the following:

The mother country has, therefore, almost 45 per cent. of the tonnage of the world under her flag. The number of craft classified in this remarkable compendium is 49,024 sailing vessels and 5,697 steamers.
