## U. S. Potato Market Quota

In the story of the U.S. potato growers' protest against renegotiating tariffs the reference to quotas was misleading.

A standard quota of one million bushels of Canadian table stock potatoes enters the American market at a duty of 37 1/2 cents a hundredweight. This quota may be increased by the amount by which the American crop falls below the 350,000,000 bushel mark. Any shipments over the quota are charged 75 cents a hundredweight duty.

There is also a quota of 2,500,000 seed potatoes allowed into the U.S. market at 37 1/2 cents a cwt. Seed potatoes over that quota pay 75 cents a cwt.

American potatoes enter Canada duty free except from June 15 to July 31 when a duty of 37 1/2 cents a hundredweight is imposed.

## Rural Teachers Local Meets in Parkdale School

Certification and the Grade eight examinations were discussed Thursday night at a regular meeting of the Charlottetown Rural Teachers' local held in the Parkdale Junior High School. Thirty teachers attended.

The fall vacation question was discussed and left over until the next meeting.

Dr. Brendan O'Grady was guest speaker and dealt with several aspects of education. He pointed out that some students in this Province have difficulty in reading. He said the first eight year's in a child's school life are the golden years for learning reading, which he described as not one but several problems which are not easily solved.

The home was most important in teaching a love for reading. Dr. O'Grady said, particularly in pre-school children. By reading aloud as much as possible children's classics, nursery rhymes, Bible stories, poetry and all stories children love before they are introduced to school, a great step would be made in teaching reading.

Spiritual reading, he said, is important, especially at sacred seasons. A discussion period followed the talk.

A vote of thanks, moved by Mrs. Marjorie Dover, was extended to Dr. O'Grady by Mr. Frank Costello.

Lunch was served by the Parkdale teachers.

## Difficulties In Way Of Suggested Ferry Changes

OTTAWA (Special) - Although he is considering the ordering of structural changes to the Car Ferry Prince Edward Island to permit the vessel to carry more vehicles each trip, Transport Minister Marler said in the House of Commons Thursday that there are many difficulties in the way of such changes. He was replying to a question asked in the chamber by Neil A. Matheson, Liberal M.P. for Queens.

Mr. Matheson said he had been in receipt of many representations from persons interested in the feasibility of lowering the deck of the venerable ferry so as to provide more vehicle accommodation. He had been informed that if the suggested changes were made an additional 25 to 35 trucks and cars could be carried each trip. Boarding over an area near the engine would provide the additional space for vehicles but at the same time it would block the grades used for ventilation. Mr. Matheson is hopeful that this difficulty could be overcome.

The vessel is now at Halifax undergoing repairs.

He also noted that Mr. Sylvester MacAnuly of Campbell's Cove was crowned table stock king at the Royal Winter Fair. The achievement was made by Mitch who had the highest priced animal of any breed at the sale of Stars bringing \$4,000 was noted by Mr. Cullen. He also stated that A. MacRae and Sons had the highest priced female in the Ayrshire Sale of Stars and a second highest priced bull calf. He also observed that B.B. Jones' heifer brought the highest price at the Holstein Sale of Stars. "That is where it really counts is in the pocketbook," said the Minister.

Recognition of Mr. Stanley Willis was made by the Minister, who noted that Mr. Willis placed third at the Dominion plowing finals and next year would represent the Island at the World's Plowing Match "Mr. Willis although competing for only a short time has been exceptionally successful from the beginning. He seems to have a natural ability for this competition which places him among Canada's best," the Minister said.

**LOSS OF PERSONNEL**  
Mr. Cullen said he was sorry to report the loss of certain personnel in the Department during the year. He stated that the Department had instituted a plan of assistance to students engaged in the study of agriculture, home Economics and veterinary medicine.

Under this plan the Department will pay a grant of \$300 per year to each student who takes such a course. The payment may be had for the full university term of four years and does not make the student ineligible for other assistance through the Department of Education.

Two of the Department's horticulturists, George Wright and Winston Smith resigned from the Department. And Mrs. Ralph Manning resigned as director of the Women's Institute Branch. Mr. Cullen in answer to R.R. Bell's question stated that Wright and Smith had left because they were offered higher salaries which the Department could not match without going far out of line. He was happy to note that these young men would still be in the Province where their advice could be made available.

The Minister stated that the Department had secured the services of Miss Audrey MacMillan B. Sc. and that of Miss Theresa MacLeod as director of Women's Institutes. He also said that Mr. Alan Palmer who is now in college will return to the Department as fieldman in Prince County. Andrew Humphrey has been taken on as assistant soil analyst and from reports of his superiors is doing a fine job.

## Icebreaker Heads For Stephenville

STEPHENVILLE, Nfld. (CP) - The United States navy icebreaker Edista Thursday was cutting a path through ice-covered Port Harmon to allow oil delivery to Harmon air force base.

Three oil tankers - Lonejack, Paoli and Mission San Gabriel - are rendezvous off Cape Breton Island before proceeding to this west coast port.

The Edista is to escort the tankers into the harbor separately once a path has been cleared. Planes from the USAF base at Argentia are to aid by reconnaissance. Base officials said they expect the entire operation to take about 10 days.

Capt. John Osbourne, a Newfoundland employed by the U.S. military sea transportation service left St. John's Wednesday for Stephenville to act as ice pilot board the Edista.

## Editor of Red Newspaper Quits

TORONTO (CP) - John Stewart, for seven years editor of the Canadian Communist weekly newspaper Canadian Tribune, has announced he will quit his post next month because the paper is "died body and soul" to policies of the national executive committee of the Labor-Progressive Party.

In an article in National Affairs the party's monthly journal, he says he asked to be relieved of his duties at a national executive committee meeting Dec. 26 but his request was refused.

He agreed to continue editing the Tribune after the party's national convention April 19.

His article makes no mention of quitting party membership.

**PAPER LOSING GROUND**  
Mr. Stewart says circulation of the Tribune, at 17,000 after the Second World War, now is less than 4,000 and the paper is in debt \$10,000. He blames it on the Tribune's status as "an inner-party house organ of the L.P.P."
