The following is the form of ballot to be used in the election for Prince County, marked as it should be by all voters for Hackett and Lefursey:—

Election for the Electoral District of Prince County District, P. E. Island, February 22, 1887.

HACKETT, I. Edward Hackett, County of Prince, Merchant. X

LEFURSEY, II. John Lefursey, County of Prince, Merchant and Shipowner. X

PERRY, III. Stanislaus F. Perry, County of Prince, Trader.

YEO, IV. James Yeo, County of Prince, Farmer.

The following is the form of ballot to be used in the election for King's County, marked as it should be by all voters for MacDonald and Muttart:—

MACDONALD, I. Augustine Colin MacDonald, of Montague, King's County, Merchant. X

MACINTYRE, II. Peter Adolphus Macintyre, of Souris, King's County, Physician.

MUTTART, III. Ephraim Bell Muttart, of King's County, Physician. X

ROBERTSON, IV. James Edwin Robertson, of Montague, King's County, Physician.

The following is the form of ballot to be used in the election for Queen's County marked as it should be by all voters for Campbell and Ferguson:—

Election for the Electoral District of Queen's County District, P. E. Island, February 22, 1887.

CAMPBELL, I. William Campbell, of Milleville, Park Corner, Queen's County, Farmer and Mill Owner. X

DAVIES, II. Louis Henry Davies, of Charlotte own, Queen's County, Barrister-at-Law.

FERGUSON, III. Donald Ferguson, of Tulloch, Queen's County, Farmer and Stock-raiser. X

WELSH, IV. William Welsh, of Keppoch, Queen's County, Farmer and Ship-owner.

HOW TO MARK THE BALLOTS.

Be sure to mark your ballot for the Liberal Conservative Candidates.

The elector, on receiving the ballot-paper, shall forthwith proceed into one of the compartments of the polling station, and there mark his ballot paper, making a cross with a pencil on any part of the ballot-paper within the division containing the name of the candidate for whom he intends to vote, and shall then fold up such ballot-paper, so that the initials on the back can be seen without opening it, and hand it to the Deputy Returning Officer, who shall, without unfolding it, ascertain, by examining the initials, and the number upon the counterfoil, that it is the same he furnished to the elector, and shall first detach and destroy the counterfoil, and shall then immediately, and in the presence of the elector, place the ballot-paper in the ballot-box. Ballot Act, Sec. 45.

No voter should make any mark on the ballot-paper save one cross on any part of the ballot-paper within the division containing the candidate's names for whom he intends to vote. If the voter writes his name or initials, or any marks, except the X he makes his ballot worthless.

A simple cross upon the ballot for your candidates will assist in electing them. Any other mark or writing will contribute to their defeat.

- 1. Poll opens at 9 o'clock a. m., and closes at five o'clock p. m.
- 2. Vote early.
- 3. See that your Liberal-Conservative neighbor votes early also.
- 4. If you have a sleigh, place it at the service of your Committee to bring tardy voters to the polls. Give the information to the Secretary of Committee.
- 5. Do not "pair" on polling day with your Grit neighbor. Poll your own vote and let him look out for his.
- 6. Poll every possible vote: the loss or gain of a single vote in each polling division may make all the difference between victory and defeat.
- 7. Each Liberal-Conservative should vote as though the result of the election depended upon his individual exertions.
- 8. Remember that any bribery, corrupt treating, hiring of vehicles, paying of voters' expenses, or any undue influence, will not only void the election, but is punishable by law.
- 9. Electors can only vote at the polling division where their names are registered.
- 10. Any elector's vote may be challenged who has received anything on account of his vote, or has been promised anything directly or indirectly, either to induce him to vote at the election or for loss of time, travelling expenses, hire of teams, or any other service connected therewith or even if the said elector has directly or indirectly paid or promised anything to any person, either to induce him to vote or to refrain from voting at the election.

Grit vs. Tory Rule.

In five years the Grits added \$10,513,907 to the net debt and left nothing to show for it—but Fort Francis Lock and a few other monuments!

In seven years, the Tories added \$50,015,823 to the net debt, and there is to show for it the Canadian Pacific Railway and other public improvements in all parts of Canada.

During the Grit term the total expenditure upon public works was \$33,883,932, or \$773,137 less than the average rate of the Tories.

During the Tory term the capital expenditure upon public works was \$73,008,433, or \$17,624,296 more than the addition to the debt.

During the Grit term the average rate of interest was 4.65 per cent, and five years later they had reduced it to 4.65 per cent, or by .41 per cent.

During the Tory term the average rate of interest was 5.39 per cent, or by .74 per cent.

In 1873 the assets of the Dominion amounted to \$29,919,700, and yielded an average rate of interest of 1.56 per cent.

Under Tory management the assets mounted up to \$8,236,915, an addition of \$33,706,716, or within a fraction, or 109 per cent, while the average rate of interest yielded augmented to 3.94 per cent, an increase of 2.38 per cent.
