Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint

Did you ever try walking along a main highway and catching snatches of conversation from groups gathered here and there along the route? Eavesdropping on the fly it might be called, but a rather harmless form of that particular dissipation. The other day we decided to conduct this new sort of Gallup Poll. We sauntered along on the sidewalk past clusters of men, through store aisles where other men were patiently waiting for their better halves to finish their purchases. You don't hear enough to get any considered opinions that way but you do find out what people are talking about. We discovered that almost without exception men, at least, down here in Prince County are discussing only three subjects: the firing of General MacArthur by President Truman, the Islanders-Millionaires hockey series, and the approaching provincial elections.

The heave-ho of the five-star General is a ponderous question. We admit the man-in-the-street has every right to form an opinion and to chew it over with the cronies of his group. You can get a lot of fun out of discussing world problems even if you have a very faint conception of the currents of thought lying beneath the surface of the news headlines. But we'd rather leave such an involved question to the experienced commentators. The Islanders-Millionaires hockey series has a few side shows resembling the Korean battlefields, but it still belongs on the sport pages. So that leaves only the provincial election.

What is the big issue in this election? It is making sure that we elect a government in line with our Federal Government? Is it the serious condition of our highways? The mounting provin-

cial debt? The past record of the government, good, bad or indifferent, according to your point of view? In our humble opinion, none of these things, as important as they may be. The main issue, as we see it, is something which candidates may say is not an issue at all. We refer to the possibility, or probability, or certainty, depending on your state of mind and judgment, of an indirect sales tax being foisted upon the people of Prince Edward Island.

This tax, if introduced, would aggravate an inflationary situation which is getting near the breaking point right now. It would hit at the very heart of the household of the common man. It would rob his children of their right to receive proper nutrition and seriously interfere with his struggle, now bitter enough, to make ends meet.

Will this legislation be introduced, and what party, if elected, will introduce it? That is for every man and woman to decide for himself. At least, the question should be asked each and every candidate soliciting votes. Pre-election promises are fragile and easily broken, but the more a man reiterates the promise, the more publicity he gets doing it, the harder it will be for him to go back on his word later on. In the last analysis, however, the voters will have to form their own opinions as to what will be done after the election and act accordingly.



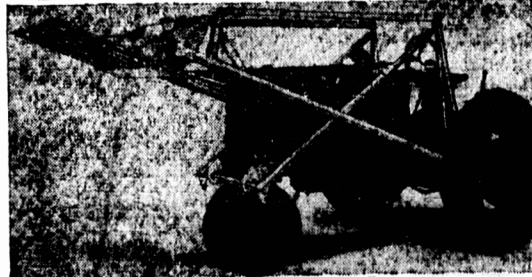

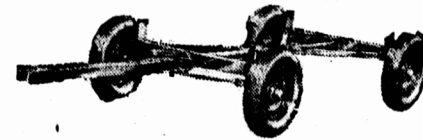
