Carl Currie, who spoke words of comfort and admonition to the family and friends, using for his text John 14-12 "Let not your heart be troubled ye believe in God, believe also in Me. In my Father's house are many mansions. If it were not so, I would have told you."

At this time, one member renewed her membership by paying the annual fee. Offering for the meeting was \$3.60.

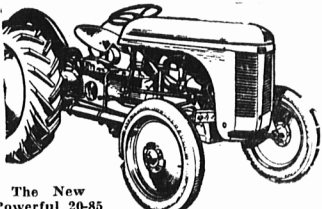
Mrs. Busden was the organist for the meeting, which closed with the singing of the hymn, "Blessed Assurance."

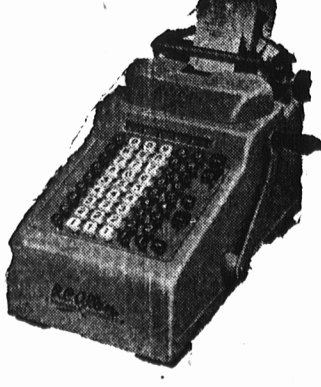

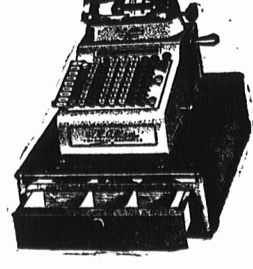
