Colorful Wings Parade Marks Graduation At S'ide RCAF Station

The 16th class of air navigators to receive their wings at the Air Navigation School at this R. C. A. F. Station, graduated at Summerside on Saturday afternoon in a colorful wings parade. The presentation of wings and scrolls was made by a high ranking visitor to the Station, Chief of the Italian Air Force Generale Di Squadra Aldo Urbani, who on a liaison visit, his first to Canada, flew here from New York on Saturday, and following the wings parade, met and talked with the Italian airmen in training at the Summerside Air Station. The wings presentation was made in the drill hall, colorfully decorated with signal flags for the occasion. The parade, in the form of a hollow square, was composed of Canadian, British, Belgian, Italian, French air force and French navy airmen, who are being trained as air navigators under the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The graduation class, in the center of the Parade square, was an all-Canadian class. In future it is thought that the graduating classes will have representatives from the various nations in N. A. T. O. who are in training here. The parade in Saturday's wings parade included two Prince Edward Island men, Douglas MacLeod, of Hartsville, and Herbert Parker of Georgetown. The Honour Student of the class was Pilot Officer Vallancourt of Rimouski, Quebec. Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, commanding officer of the Summerside Station, in introducing Generale Urbani said the general was doing the Station a great honor by being present at the Wings presentation ceremony, and pointed out that it was not often that a station had the pleasure of welcoming a person of the General's rank from another country in the N. A. T. O. organization. Generale Urbani's command of the English language seemed very limited, and he spoke mostly through an interpreter. Speaking in English directly to the Canadian graduation class he said, "I am appreciative of this very fine ceremony. I give to you my best wishes and I extend my best wishes to all the Canadian Air Force." General Urbani who left yesterday for Ottawa where he will confer with the Hon. Brooke Claxton, and visit the Italian Air Embassy, was accompanied by Brigadier Remondino, Major Franchina, both of the Italian Air Force, General Cigara, air attache to the Italian Air Embassy in both Washington and Ottawa, and by Air Commodore W. E. Kennedy and Squadron leader Moraluoto of the R. C. A. F.
