Cardinals Financial Loss Draws Committee's Ire

SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Lobster Carnival committee showed an overall deficit of \$693.36 for 1964. It was learned here last night during a heated session.

At the annual meeting of the Lobster Carnival committee President Francis "Ginger" MacQuarrie said upon reviewing the financial statements, the committee owes the Town of Summerside \$3,869.85, the balance of an original \$5,189.63.

Mr. MacQuarrie said the bill from the town was much greater than he had expected. He said he figured the bill would be only \$1,000. "I'll tell you this, it seemed to me to be one hell of a lot of money," said Mr. MacQuarrie. Among other items, wages and unemployment insurance stamps ac-

Means Of Increased Ownership Given For Canadian Industry

Two courses of action could lead to increased Canadian ownership of Canadian industry—encouragement of greater domestic savings and curtailment of government borrowing—according to the president of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.

Addressing the annual meeting of the bank's shareholders yesterday, J. P. R. Wadsworth said "the savings derived from the business and personal sectors of our economy would normally be more than adequate to finance the real investment required by the private sector."

Mr. Wadsworth noted that in recent years savings derived from business in the form of retained earnings and depreciation allowances have accounted for more than two thirds of total net savings. During the same period, personal

Contests Names Island's Oldest, 100-Year Homes

This year the Centennial Committee and the P.E.I. Junior Farmer Federation conducted a contest to find a house built in 1864, and also the oldest house on P.I.E.

These houses had to be lived in and were judged on the records available and the least changes made since the time they were built.

Prizes for houses built in 1864 went to: first, Stanley Williams, Bideford, Ellerslie; second, Louis Vessey, York.

The number of branches and banking offices increased over the past year by 51 to a total of 1,354. Of this total, 1,202 are in Canada and the others are in United States, England, the Bahamas and the West Indies.

There was an increase of almost 14 per cent in commercial and other loans, widely spread over the full range of the bank's lending business, Mr. Currie said. He said Government of Canada direct and guaranteed securities were reduced by \$78,000,000 to finance in part the expansion in loans.

Total deposits were up \$188,000,000 to \$4,971,000,000.

"The liquid position of the bank continues to be strong with quick assets at \$2,200,000,000 equal to 46.9 per cent of the bank's total liabilities to the public," Mr. Currie said.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says light snow is falling in the western Maritime provinces Tuesday. A weak disturbance was moving up the coast of Nova Scotia and this cold front spread snow eastward into Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton. Only light falls of one or two inches are expected. The disturbance will move away today, leaving mainly cloudy skies in most regions.

Parliament At A Glance

TUESDAY, Dec. 8, 1964

The Commons spent its seventh day on the current flag debate, defeating a Conservative motion to accede to other business.

Jack Horner (PC-Adair) moved that the House adjourn the flag question and allow the question period to be resumed.

The motion was defeated by a vote of 139 to 88, four Conservative members voting with the government and one Liberal against it.

Gilles Grogan (Credite-Lapointe) said debate totalled 1,267 words on the flag, indicating "all madmen are not locked up."

Marcel Lambert (PC-Edmonton West) said Mr. Grogan wanted to gag the Conservatives.

Douglas Fisher (NDP-Port Arthur) said he is one of many voters who don't share the Royal Canadian Legion view of keeping the Red Ensign.

The Commons met at 2:30 p.m. EST to continue debate on the flag. The Senate stands adjourned until Dec. 14.
