burg, N. S. Mr. Cullen went on to say that the Island fishing industry should be advertised to a greater extent, and that a similar exhibition here would be a big help in this respect, as at the present time, 75% of the fish consumed in Prince Edward Island comes from other provinces. Mr. Cullen stated that two draggers, "Souris II" and "Elizabeth Alice", are now in operation, and others will be built. While it was not possible to build them in Prince Edward Island as was desired, Island industries are contributing where possible. The largest propeller moulded in P. E. I. was made recently by Hall and Stavert's of Charlottetown, measuring 46 inches, and a spare propeller was also made which measured 42 inches, for use on the draggers now in operation.

Fine Story But Nothing In It Says His Honour

A columnist in the Ottawa Citizen got hold of a good feature story concerning Prince Edward Island and it was published in his paper September 6. The story is effective and humorous. Unfortunately it is not true. His Honour Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Provost flatly denied it and told The Guardian he had never even mentioned the subject.

Following is the story: "Rock-cliffs may have had the first laugh when they walked off with the cannon of the Royal 22nd not so many weeks ago—but it looks now as if Uplands may have the last chuckle. "Back from a training session at Summerside, P. E. I., members of 2416 Aircraft Control and Warning Unit have an offer of a cannon of their own. And this one will be a permanent gift. It will not have to go back. "The offer was made to F/L Frank Bernier and F/O Bert Hanlon by the Hon. Lieut. Governor, P. E. I., Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island to present the unit with one of the cannons from the grounds of the Legislative Building in Charlottetown as a permanent memento of their visit to the Air Navigation School. Transportation Problem "At the moment the main problem is how to transport the cannon to Ottawa. But it is a standing offer and the Ottawa Radar Squadron are now trying to work out details of how to bring the cannon to Uplands. "The unit separated into two detachments for training with the R. C. A. F. Regular Force at Chatham, N. B., and Summerside, P. E. I. Their trip is believed to have set a record for distance traveled by any local unit for training purposes. "At Summerside a Wings Party marked the graduating of navigators at the Air Navigation School. It was while attending this party that the Lieutenant Governor made his offer to present the squadron with the cannon—one of those which played its part in the early defence of Canada."

Fluorine Aids In Reducing Tooth Decay

OTTAWA, Sept. 11—(CP)—A preliminary survey has indicated that the presence of fluorine in drinking water reduces tooth decay among children, the Federal Health Department said today. The survey was based on long-term tests of children at Brantford, Ont., where the water was artificially fluoridated; at Sarnia, Ont., where there is no fluorine in the water, and at Stratford, Ont., where fluorine occurs naturally in the water supply. Tests showed there is less tooth decay among children in Stratford than among those in Brantford and Sarnia. The situation in Brantford has been improving since 1948, but in Sarnia tooth decay has been increasing. The survey dates back to 1945 when fluorine in the form of sodium fluoride was added to the water supply of Stratford.

Quebec Man To Head Boxing Ass'n

CHICAGO, Sept. 11—(CP)—David Rochon, 53-year-old member of the Quebec Legislative Assembly, today was elected president of the National Boxing Association. He succeeds Archie Hindman of Hagerstown, Ind. Rochon's hometown of Montmireal was selected for the 1952 N. B. A. convention to be held in September. Rochon is a member of the Montreal City Council and Liberal member of the Legislative Assembly for Montreal-St. Louis.

BANDITS GET \$100

TORONTO, Sept. 11—(CP)—Three masked bandits held up the office of the Parkdale Iron and Metal Company at noon today. They got only \$1. The three, masked with white handkerchiefs, tied up the lone occupant of the office, 25-year-old Shirley Kirk, when she refused to tell them where the money was kept. They became frightened, took \$1 from her purse and fled in a rented car. The car was found abandoned later.

BOSTON, Sept. 11—AP—Precious stones valued between \$30,000 and \$40,000—donated by parishioners as ornaments for an altar vessel—were stolen Aug. 30 from a safe in the rectory of Holy Name Catholic Church, West Roxbury, police disclosed today.

City Cancer Program Launched Last Evening

In no Province in Canada is better work being done in the fight against cancer than in Prince Edward Island, the message delivered by the Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E., at the annual campaign dinner held last night in Trinity United Church Hall. One of the founders of the Canadian Cancer Society and a member of the national executive, Dr. MacMillan paid tribute to the provincial organization, members of the medical profession, campaign workers and the public at large.

Educational Program Dr. MacMillan stressed the value of the educational program being carried on among the people through the efforts of the Executive Secretary, J. P. MacInnis and stated that this fact was reflected in many cases coming to the attention of doctors in the early stages of the disease. The leading part the Province was playing in the fight against cancer was borne out in that some six Island doctors had attended special courses of instruction at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, in the last year. These doctors were highly qualified to deal with early cases both as to diagnosis and treatment. Dr. MacMillan stated the Island doctors were fortunate in having at the Mayo Clinic, Dr. Docherty, formerly of Cardigan, one of the leading pathologists in the United States. Doctors selected by the three hospitals to take this special course were, Dr. Harold Shaw, provincial pathologist, Dr. Wendell MacDonald, radiologist, Dr. T. A. Laidlaw, P. E. I. Hospital, Dr. J. A. MacMillan, Charlottetown Hospital, and Drs. W. B. Howatt and J. C. Simpson of the Prince County Hospital. Dr. MacMillan reminded workers that they were performing a Christian duty in taking an active part in a campaign such as that of the Cancer Society. He called upon one and all to exert every effort to achieve the objective of \$5,000 for the city and \$10,000 for the Province.

She trained as a nurse in the New York Post Graduate Hospital and after graduation went overseas in the First World War with the Canadian Red Cross as a Nursing Sister. She returned to Canada in 1919 and was at the old Rehabilitation Centre on the grounds of Government House before being posted to the hospital at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, Que. She later did private nursing duty here and in New York before again returning to this city to do public health nursing. During this period she served for a time at the Provincial Sanatorium. At the time of her death she had been connected with public school nursing for the Department of Health and Welfare. Surviving are her husband, Dr. C. H. Beer, of this city and one sister, Miss Winifred B. Gillan, Worcester, Mass.

Further Drop In Estimated Total U. S. Potato Yield

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, stated yesterday that he has received reports which indicate the estimated total production of potatoes in the U. S. is now set at 346,840,000 bushels, giving an average yield of 229.9 bushels per acre. This estimate is a further decrease from the Aug. 1st report which set production at 351 million bushels, and a still further drop from the July 1st estimate of 356 million bushels. Mr. Shaw reports an approximate production on P. E. I. estimated at 200 bushels per acre. This is a drastic reduction from early prospects, with almost 15,000 less acres planted on the Island and a substantially lower yield per acre. The potato production should not be unduly cumbersome. The continuation of the fine weather of the past few days, Mr. Shaw stated, is a welcome improvement and should have a beneficial effect on potato protection.
