### Former Athlete Dies Suddenly

HAMILTON, Ont. (CP)—Samuel Ryckman Manson, 61, a sports figure here for more than 40 years, collapsed and died Thursday in a bathtub at his home.  
He was captain of the Hamilton Rough Riders football team which won Canadian titles in 1909 and 1910 and later led two Hamilton Tigers football teams to national honors. He was one of the founders of the Hamilton Olympic Club, managed the Canadian team sent to the British Empire Games in London, and was manager of the Canadian team at the Olympic Games in Berlin in 1936.

### Raiding Party Captures Village

SUARATE, India. (Reuters)—A raiding party of Indian nationalists Thursday "liberated" a village in Portuguese Damao on the Indian west coast 80 miles from Bombay.  
The "liberation" marked the first time Indian nationalists, seething with union of French and Portuguese Indian territories with the Indian republic, have taken over territory from Portugal.  
A raiding party of 35 members of the Goan United Front entered the village of Dabra Thursday and hoisted the Indian tricolor after meeting with "some resistance" by local police.  
The Portuguese territory in India totals 1,537 square miles and has a population of 650,000. French India amounts to only 202 square miles with 325,000 inhabitants.

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—A juvenile court judge Thursday sentenced a mother of three months in jail for letting her 15-year-old daughter become a juvenile delinquent.  
Judge J. R. H. Kirkpatrick said the mother had been warned previously by the court about the upbringing of her daughter.  
The court was told that the girl had been found sleeping with another 16-year-old girl in a ditch and that the mother had taken her daughter to local roadhouses.  
The girl was committed to a training school.

### Almost Sold Silver For Trash

WASHINGTON, (CP)—The U. S. Air Force admitted sheepishly Thursday it included a "large quantity" of silver in a surplus sale under the mistaken impression it was trash. It discovered the error before the "trash" was delivered, however, and the sale was cancelled.

The silver was in the form of unused decoration medals offered for sale in the disposal of about \$10,000,000 worth of surplus materials at Wilkins air depot, near Shelby, Ohio.

Reports from Shelby said about 57 tons of silver was involved. One lot was bid at \$1.90 a pound and a second at \$4 a pound. There was no word of the fineness of the decorations, but the value of a pound of fine silver would be about \$145.
