United Church Reports Progress

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP)—Harold L. Arupp of Toronto, a member of the United Church's treasury department, said Thursday that a new United Church of Canada church hall is being opened every 4 1/2 days in Canada, but this is not meeting the needs of the population. Describing church extension as "an urgent need," he told the Church's Maritime conference that a new church or hall should be opened every second day in Canada. During the last 10 years he said the church lost 1,124 ministers through retirement, death and withdrawal, and in the same period only 851 ministers were ordained. New officers elected in the conference's lay association included, Dr. R. S. Langstroth, Fredericton, president; Allison Profit, Freetown, E.I., 1st vice-president; John E. J. J. Halifax, 2nd vice-president; Mike Chapeau, Moncton, 3rd vice-president; and Dr. J. S. Munro, North Sydney, N.S. secretary-treasurer.

Is Critical Of N.S. Gov't In Pulp Mill Deal

MULGRAVE, N.S. (CP)—Leonard O'Neill, president of the Antigonish-Guysborough-Inverness-Richmond Development Association, said the fact that the Scott Paper Company has acquired property in Pictou county means the provincial government has traded "a bird in the hand for two in the bush." He said that when a company official announced Pictou county as the site for a possible pulp and paper mill it meant "the transfer of what we were working for and what we were promised in Mulgrave." It doesn't mean the company is going to "raise hay" in Pictou county, he said. He added, however, that another company was interested in the timber possibilities of the Mulgrave area and "we are led to believe the government has renewed contacts with this company, which in our humble opinion shouldn't have been broken off." He did not identify the company or indicate when earlier talks were held. Surveys in the four counties show a potential annual yield of 500,000 cords of pulpwood, he said. "It is high time the government showed some stability in handling matters of great concern to this area and to Cape Breton."

Sees Quality Of Education Down

MONTREAL (CP)—The standards of education in Canada and United States have been lowered in the last 50 years although educational facilities have improved tremendously, President Lionel A. Forsyth of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation said Thursday. Addressing more than 1,500 Canadian and U.S. delegates attending the 10th annual conference of the American Society for Quality Control, Mr. Forsyth said: "The frills of modern educational practices have had their effect, particularly in urban areas." He cited these as "relaxation of discipline and overemphasis of the social and recreational activities incident to academic life." "Upon the broad base of an undoubtedly sound principle that education is the opportunity to have one in the right of everyone, some one has proposed the entirely false corollary that everyone must have it," he said. "In order to insure this happy result its standard must be lowered to a level which debases its quality."

R.C.M.P. Transfers Are Announced

OTTAWA (CP)—Commissioner L. H. Nicholson of the RCMP Thursday announced that 20 senior officers of the force will be transferred to new posts during the summer months. Assistant commissioner C. E. Rivett, 54, officer commanding "B" division, Victoria, will be moved to Ottawa to fill a senior appointment at headquarters. He will be succeeded by assistant commissioner C. W. Harvison, 55, officer in charge of the force's special branch in the capital. Transfers include: Inspector F. B. Woods-Johnson, 50, from divisional personnel officer, Halifax, to senior personnel officer, Ottawa. Inspector Arthur Argent, 47, from divisional personnel officer, Winnipeg, to divisional personnel officer "B" and "marine" divisions, Halifax. EUKARNO TO SEE POPE ROME (AP)—President Sukarno of Indonesia will meet the Pope and President Giovanni Gronchi of Italy during his official visit here next week. Sukarno arrives Sunday from Canada.
