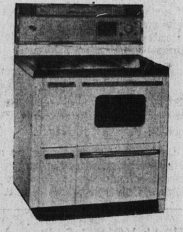

Commemorative Coin Design To Be Judged

An eight-man board of judges meets in Ottawa today to select the winning design for the 1964 commemorative silver dollar. H. Barry Bugden, public relations department of Maritime Electric Company Limited, is a member of the board of judges. The federal finance department sponsored competition to determine an appropriate design for a coin to commemorate the meeting of the fathers of confederation in Charlottetown in 1864. Designs submitted must bear the words "Canada" on top, and "dollar" on the bottom, and must provide space for the figures "1964-1964". The diameter of the coin, on which the design will be in relief, is to be 35.8918 millimetres. The winning artist will receive \$1,000, while the four designs receiving honorable mention will each receive \$450. Other members of the board of judges are: N.A. Parker, minister of the Royal Canadian Mint, chairman; Thomas Mahar, Quebec, chairman of the board of trustees, National Gallery of Canada; Marc Gagnon, Montreal; Dr. Charles Compton, director of the National Gallery; Dr. W. Kaye Lamb, Dominion archivist; Dr. L. Rasminsky, governor of the Bank of Canada; and K.W. Taylor, deputy minister of finance.

Queens MP Is Named Delegation Member

By KEN KELLY (CP) — Canada's international obligations and the standing of parties in the Commons may put a squeeze on MPs who attend the United Nations General Assembly this fall. Two of the government's 115 voting MPs—External Affairs Minister Green and his parliamentary secretary, Heath N. Macquarrie—were named Monday to the 10-member delegation to the Assembly which opens Sept. 18, just a little more than a week before Parliament assembles. In addition, the government may be asking at least one other vote by sending a Progressive Conservative MP as a non-confidence motion presenter. Car Demand For Steel Said Slow

CLEVELAND (AP)—A strong demand for durable goods and prompt stabilization of inventories during the fourth quarter will be necessary if U.S. input production for 1963 is to exceed the 88,000,000 tons produced last year, steel magnates said here. Industry estimates of output for the final three months of this year vary from 22,000,000

ingot tons to 25,000,000 tons. During the current quarter an estimated 20,000,000 tons will be produced, the weekly journal of metal-working reported. Continuing a gradual uptrend in orders that started in June, bookings for many mills during August were the best since May, Steel said. A common current complaint is that "the automotive boys haven't released as much September tonnage as we figured they would," the magazine said. As a result, some producers say their September bookings have levelled off and others report only a slight edge over August. "Until automotive buying picks up, steel-makers will be dependent largely on construction activity," Steel said. Ingot output this week is expected to be up two-tenths of one per cent from the estimated 1,675,000 tons pured in the week ended Saturday, Steel said. Steel's index on No. 1 heavy melting steel rose 33 cents last week to \$27 as exporter demands strengthened prices in the east.

U. S. Adventurer To Be Briefed On Northland

OTTAWA (CP) — A 31-year-old Chicago adventurer is going to be told that forming a settlement in the Canadian north will be no piece of cake. Robert H. Van Schoick, a former florist, said in Chicago last week that he is assembling a party which will embark next spring on a pioneering venture in the Northwest Territories. His plan is to establish a self-supporting community of from 20 to 50 persons in either the Mackenzie or Kootenai districts of the territories. He hopes that the group will be the nucleus of waves of settlers into the area. Officials of the northern affairs and immigration departments here do not discount Van Schoick's plan as impracticable but are concerned whether the adventurer appreciates the hardships involved. Van Schoick said in Chicago that the Canadian government has consented to the expedition and has offered assistance. How ever, government officials said no decision has been made as yet on whether Van Schoick will be allowed to go ahead with his plan. One official said Van Schoick has been asked to come to Ottawa next month to get "some cold hard facts about life in the Canadian north." He also said the government wants assurance that members of the party have the knowledge and equipment to cope with northern problems.
