Our "Tory Members" on the Reciprocity Question.

THE Patriot of the 13th inst. contained an article headed, "Our Tory Members Opposing Reciprocity," in which Messrs. Hackett and Jenkins were denounced for making the alleged statement that "Reciprocity would do this Province little good."

Those of its readers who have any faith left in its veracity, will perhaps be surprised to learn that Messrs. Hackett and Jenkins used language the very reverse of that which the Patriot reported. Mr. Hackett—according to the Hausard report of his speech, which came to hand this morning—said:

"The question is one of great importance to the people of this country. The people of this country are desirous of having reciprocal trade with the United States, and the Government of this country is desirous of carrying out the views of the people in that direction, and I am sorry the hon. gentleman should introduce a motion of this kind, at a time when the people's representatives assembled here are endeavoring to vote supplies to the Government to carry on the affairs of the country, and that he should endeavor to make a party question out of it and to make a cry in the country. Coming from one of the Maritime Provinces, I may say that the question is viewed in those provinces as one of great importance. The people of the Maritime Provinces all know that the extension of trade with the United States, that reciprocity of trade with that country, would add materially to their benefits, and would be an advantage to the lower Provinces. But, sir, the people there consider that the Government of Canada feel the same way. They feel that the Government consider that it would be in the best interests of Canada to have an extension of the trade with the United States, and they are quite willing—and I know I voice the sentiments of a majority of the people of my own Province at least in saying—that they are willing to leave the matter in the hands of the Government, and they believe that justice will be done by them."

And Dr. Jenkins said:—"I am as desirous of seeing a reciprocity of trade with the United States as any man, and I fully appreciate the advantages to this country of reciprocity with the United States, but Sir, much as I would deplore any occurrence which might check that feeling of cordial amity which is growing daily between this country and the United States, I am not prepared to see the Government approach the United States and beg for reciprocity. We know, Sir, that it would not only be futile but undignified. We know that the Americans are a very astute and shrewd people. We know that if we want to approach them and obtain any change in our trade relations with them, we must not go there begging and saying that this change is absolutely necessary, that it is of vital importance to our existence. That is a very wrong way of obtaining reciprocity. But our Government must go prepared to show that reciprocity of trade between the two countries is for the benefit of both. If they can do that, I believe there will be no difficulty in obtaining reciprocity, but until then we would only get, as the late Government got, a humiliating rebuff."

So far from seeing anything to be ashamed of in the remarks of "our Tory members," the intelligent reader of Hausard will see in them much to admire. In fact Mr. Hackett, who replied to Mr. Davies' opening speech about Reciprocity, "floored" that gentleman as neatly and as completely as he did when he spoke on the question of the Budget.

City Council.

An adjourned meeting of the City Council was held last evening; present—Mayor Beer, Recorder Fitzgerald, Councilors Crabbe, Khougan, Kelly, McLean, Davy, Haszard, McRae, Douse, Morris and Horne.

A number of bills were passed and ordered to be paid.

A communication was read from Messrs. Lundrigan and Strong, asking the Council if they had power to collect Market Tolls outside the Market place. The communication was laid on the table.

A letter was read from Robert Angus, Esq., Agent of the Bell Telephone Co., in reference to supplying the city with telephones.

On motion of Councilor Crabbe, seconded by Councilor Kelly,—

Resolved, That the letter of Mr. Angus be referred to a committee of three members of the Council to confer with three members of the Board of Fire Underwriters in reference to a Fire Alarm, and report the same at next meeting of Council. Carried.

Moved by Councilor Crabbe, seconded by Councilor Kelly,—

Whereas, In the month of March last a large and influential meeting of the citizens was held in the Market Hall, called by His Worship the Mayor, to discuss the best means of civic taxation; and

Whereas, At said meeting a resolution was passed to levy a personal property tax in addition to real estate and poll tax, and a committee was appointed to act with the City Council to prepare an act to be submitted to the Legislature for their approval; and

Whereas, The House of Assembly and the Legislative Council have seen fit in their wisdom (influenced by interested parties) not to accede to the request made by the citizens to pass the bill to levy a personal property tax as adopted by them, but in lieu thereof passed a bill in opposition to the well understood wishes of the citizens, curtailing the taxing powers previously held by the City Council upon personal property.

Therefore Resolved, That this Council do now deem it advisable, under their present

limited powers, to levy the personal property tax. Moved in amendment by Councilor Douse, and seconded by Councilor Morris: Resolved, That the Finance Committee make their estimates for the present year before taking a vote on Councilor Crabbe's resolution.

Moved by Councilor McLean as an amendment that Councilor Douse leave to withdraw his motion.

The amendment was put and carried, and the motion withdrawn.

The original motion was then put and lost on division.

Yeas—Councilors Crabbe, Kelly and Khougan.

Nays—Haszard, Davy, McLean, McRae, Horne, Douse and Morris.

Moved by Councilor McRae, seconded by Councilor Horne,—

Resolved, That legal proceedings shall immediately be taken against all persons in Charlottetown that have on their premises privies, cesspools or water closets, contrary to the Statute of the 47th Victoria, Chapter 14. Carried.

Moved by Councilor Davy, seconded by Councilor McLean,—

Resolved, That tenders be called for supplying the city with 20,000 feet hemlock 2 in. deals, and 30,000 feet hemlock 3 in. deals. Carried. See advertisement.

Moved by Councilor Crabbe, seconded by Councilor McLean,—

Resolved, That the City Clerk collect the license fee at once from the coal meters and weighers, as specified by By-law. Carried. Council adjourned till Monday.

More of Zadkiel's Prophecies.

Among the remarks of Zadkiel on the annular eclipse of the sun on the 16th of March, we find the following reference to the beginning of trouble in the Northwest: "At Ottawa this eclipse will be visible; the R. A. of the M. C. will be 2° 58' 42", Aries 3° 13' culminating, and Cancer 24° 21'. Popular excitement, sedition and Fenian outrages will quickly follow. It will behoove the Governor General and his ministers to be on their guard against Fenian machinations, for there is danger of a raid on the frontier and of an insurrectionary attempt. Storms will do great damage. Fortunately, Jupiter is in the second house and this promises a good revenue and public prosperity in the end. The worst effect of this eclipse will be felt in Canada about the 25th of March and the 7th of September." The warnings to individuals on this occasion are as follows: "To persons resident in Canada and North America born when either the sun or moon be at the 20th or 27th degree of the sign Pisces, this eclipse speaks unmistakably of danger, and they are warned to avoid as far as possible all risks, and to live quietly throughout their ensuing year of life, more especially should they avoid danger by fire and water." Of the conjunction of Mars and Saturn on the 6th of August, Zadkiel says: "At Ottawa the conjunction takes place at 4h. 51m. p. m. * * * The conjoined planet are just setting; this presignifies sedition, bitter disputes, troubles both for the government and people of Canada, a siege of violence, corruption of fruit, overflowing of the sea, epidemic sickness, and a high rate of mortality."

At the present crisis in the relations between England and Russia, the following extract also will be of interest:—"At Herat the R. A. of the M. C. is 346° 14' Cancer, 3° 13' ascending, the conjoined planets exactly rising. What can we conclude from this but that war will rage around Herat, and that Russian hordes will overrun Afghanistan, unless the British Lion be at last aroused? Let the British Government be on their guard and no longer trust implicitly to Russian promises, or the most terrible fighting will be the consequence, and a costly war to protect our Indian possessions. Let the student observe that this conjunction falls in opposition to the place of the great mutation of January 26th, 1842, which was fully treated of in Zadkiel's Legacy, published in 1841. From that mutation Zadkiel foretold the wars in Afghanistan, Beluchistan and Scinde and the terrible Indian mutiny. Again will the effects of that mutation be renewed by this conjunction of Mars and Saturn falling in opposition thereto. Nothing but foresight, statesmanship and preparation for war, can avert the disasters which this conjunction presignifies."

St. Peter's Church.

Adjourned Annual Meeting.

The adjourned annual meeting of St. Peter's Church congregation was held last evening in the schoolroom, Rev. George W. Hodgson, Priest Incumbent, in the chair, and Rev. W. B. King acting as secretary. Accounts of the past year showing a surplus of about \$100, and estimates for the current year, were submitted and approved. The following gentlemen were appointed Church wardens, viz: Thomas Green, W. H. Stewart and L. W. Watson. Regret was expressed on account of the contemplated withdrawal of the Rev. W. B. King from his position of Curate in the Church, Master of the Choir and Master of the School; and after some discussion it was decided to request the Priest incumbent and the Church Wardens to obtain the services of a trained and competent school and choir master. Thanks were tendered to J. D. Mason, Esq., on his retirement from the office of Treasurer and Accountant which he has filled to the satisfaction of all, and also to Messrs. L. W. Watson, Parker Carvell and Fred Scott for efficient and gratuitous services at the organ.

The Halifax Mail says:—"The extent to which railway construction has annihilated space, receives a very good exemplification in the fact that in the last issue of the Mail we recorded the departure a few hours previously of a battalion of Halifax volunteers from this city, and that in this issue we record their progress westward along the Ottawa 1,000 miles away. With an excellent system of railways binding a country together, distance is no longer a factor to be taken into account. When the C. P. R. is completed—as it will be in a few weeks—volunteers can go from Halifax to British Columbia in less time and with less inconvenience, than would have been necessary thirty years ago in marching from Halifax to Amherst. Steam and electricity have assuredly made space of little account in the affairs of a nation, if they have not wholly destroyed it."
