The Revenue.

The revenue from all sources for the past three months has been as follows:—

Table with 2 columns: Month, Revenue. July: \$2,294,076; August: 2,885,409; September: 3,052,474. Total: \$8,229,959.

This total has been derived from the following sources—

Table with 2 columns: Source, Revenue. Customs: \$5,563,515; Excise: 1,387,625; Other sources: 1,278,819. Total: \$8,229,959.

Comparing these results with the three previous years, we find the following—

Table with 2 columns: Year, Revenue. First Quarter 1878: \$5,187,795; 1879: 5,035,086; 1880: 7,165,590; 1881: 8,229,959.

So that while the revenue last year exceeded the expectations of even our sanguine Finance Minister, we have good grounds for anticipating a much larger revenue for this year.

City Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening.

Present: Councillors Murphy, Chappelle, Lawson, Byrne, Dary, McLean, Smith, Blake, Morris, Koughan.

On motion of Councillor Murphy, Councillor Koughan took the chair.

A number of accounts having, during recess, been paid by Councillor Murphy, his action was confirmed.

Read a letter from the Fire Department, calling the attention of the Council to the necessity of having the tank at the head of Hillsborough Street repaired; and also asking for permission to import new suction hoses for the steam engine "Hillsborough."

Moved by Councillor Davy, seconded by Councillor Lawson—

Resolved, That the tank at the head of Hillsborough Street be repaired as to hold water.

Councillors Chappelle and Murphy objected to the motion, contending that it would be better to procure estimates of the probable cost and also the extent of repair necessary.

Councillor Chappelle moved, in amendment, seconded by Councillor Murphy and carried,—

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer procure estimates of cost necessary to repair tank at the head of Hillsborough Street, and report next meeting of Council—a special meeting to be called for the purpose.

Ordered that the Chief Engineer be authorized to procure suction hose for steam engine "Hillsborough."

A petition from the residents of the Esplanade asking for a sidewalk and lamp, was referred to the street committee.

Councillor Lawson, according to notice, then introduced a by-law to regulate and license owners of livery stables.

Moved by Councillor Lawson, seconded by Councillor Chappelle and carried.

Resolved, That the by-law to regulate and license owners of livery stables be now read for the first time.

Moved by Councillor Lawson, seconded by Councillor Chappelle and carried unanimously.

Resolved, That the by-law to regulate and license owners of livery stables be now read for the second time.

Councillor Lawson then gave notice that at the next meeting he would move for a committee of the whole on the said by-law.

Adjourned sine die.

Peters Combination Lock Company Affairs.

At the special meeting of the stockholders of the Peters Combination Lock Company, held a few weeks ago, as noticed in this paper, a very satisfactory report was received from the Manager, showing the Company to be then earning upwards of ten per cent. annually on its paid up capital, with about fifty hands employed.

The stockholders present seemed to agree with the views of the directors, that a further amount of the capital stock should be sold and the business extended, as the capacity for turning out work was not equal to the demand. Accordingly, the Directors decided to dispose of about thirty thousand dollars more of the capital stock and extend the business. To-day we are pleased to chronicle the fact that as a result of a short visit made to P. E. Island and Pictou, N. S., by the accountant, Mr. W. E. Knight, and a few voluntary subscriptions at home, upwards of eighteen thousand of the amount have been taken. Among the subscribers are some of the wealthiest and most prominent men of P. E. Island. This augurs well for the future of the Peters Combination Lock Company.—Moncton Times.

Drowning Accident at Tracadie.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.

The particulars of the serious accident which took place about seven miles off Tracadie harbor, resulting in the death of a fisherman named Rude, are as follows:— Thomas Larner, James Lynn, and deceased were returning from fishing, when seven miles from shore they saw a "school" of black-fish right ahead of them. Rude advised them to change their course and not come upon the monsters; but, unfortunately, the caution was unheeded, and as the boat passed over where the fish were supposed to be, it was struck in the bow by one of the monsters, almost splitting it in halves. The boat began to sink almost instantly. The men seeing nothing left for them but to take to the water, took off their boots, and each one taking an oar abandoned the wreck, which immediately sank. Their calls drew the attention of a boatswain about a mile off, who made to the rescue, but having a strong head wind to contend with, were nearly an hour before they reached the place. Alas, for poor Rude, he had sunk before they arrived. He, according to the statements of the survivors, kept afloat only about fifteen minutes. A few minutes and all three would have met the same sad fate. The names of the rescuing party were R. McKinnon, A., and James McDonald.

The Turf.

SALE OF THE FAMOUS COBHAM STUD.

The famous breeding establishment known as the Cobham Stud was sold at Cobham, England, on September 19th and 20th. The lots numbered sixty-one brood mares, thirty-three foals of the present year and four stallions, which sold for a total of 21,585 guineas. Of the stallions, "Blair Athol" was the most famous, although he did not realize, by fifty guineas, as much as "Wild Oats," who sold for 2,000 guineas to Baron C. Malizahn, of Austria. "Blair Athol" was bought by Mr. Stewart for 1,950 guineas, and it was understood that he would do service next year at Horsley Towers, the residence of the Hon. Randolph Stewart. "Blair Athol" was originally sold for 5,000 guineas at the break-up of Mr. Jackson's stud at Fairfield, Yorkshire, his purchaser being Mr. Blenkinsop, at whose sale in 1872 the son of "Stockwell" realized 12,500 guineas, his purchaser being the first Cobham Stud Company, and at their sale in 1879 he was retained by the then reorganized establishment for 4,500 guineas. Several of the best mares and quite a number of the youngsters were bought for New Zealand and Australia, where a class of horses are being bred that promise to be the equal of if not superior to those raised anywhere for speed and staying qualities.

The Scott Act.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR,—Will you allow me a few lines in reply to "Observer" on the Scott Act in King's County. He truly says that "the Act is virtually inoperative" and that with one or two exceptions no action has yet been taken to enforce the law. I may tell "Observer" that if all the temperance men in the County had continued to sit with folded arms, bemoaning the illicit traffic, there would be no exceptions to the general law-breaking for him to report. The fault of such a deplorable state of matters, in my opinion, rests in a large measure on the professed friends of temperance. I don't wish to screen the Inspector for the non-performance of what is really his duty. But from the nature of things it is impossible for him to go through the County hunting up evidence to convict those who are reported to him as breaking the law. Temperance men who live in places where the law is broken must do this work as heretofore, if it is ever to be effectually done. "Observer" says that liquor is sold openly and above board in over a dozen different rum dens that might be named. Knowing all this, then, why does he not report the proprietors of these "dens" with the necessary evidence which he can so easily get to the Rev. G. W. Hodgson, the indefatigable Secretary of the P. E. I. Branch of the Dominion Alliance in Charlottetown, who, while withholding the name of the sender, if desired, will in his official capacity, forward at once the information to the Inspector, with instructions to deal with the matter without delay. Let "Observer" do this, and I feel certain that he will have no cause to complain that the Inspector has failed in his duty. It is quite an easy matter for certain persons to fight temperance battles when the enemy is not in sight, and they can point their guns towards the stars, where "nobody is killed, and nobody hurt." It is however, quite a different thing to fight when the foe is in your midst.

In this case, backbone, skill and perseverance are essential to success, and if these are lacking in the professional friends of temperance, then we may expect to hear the continued wail of "rum dens" in our midst. Yours, etc., ANOTHER OBSERVER.

Personal.

SIR WILLIAM YOUNG, of Halifax, and ex-Chief Justice Richards, of Ottawa, are two of the Vice Presidents of the Association for the Reform and Codification of the Law of Nations.

THE REV. DR. BOYD, of St. Louis, is accused of plagiarism from Edward Everett; but the "Globe Democrat" says it is rather a "case of morbidly retentive memory reacting upon unusual receptivity of mind, and producing unconscious assimilation of ideas.

QUEEN SOPHIA, of Sweden, has made what is considered a marvellous recovery. When she left home for the Hague six months ago it was thought that she would never return alive, so ill was she. A famous doctor in the Dutch capital cured her, and she is now in the best of health.

The remains of President Garfield were transferred to a new metallic coffin on Wednesday. The new casket is very handsome, and the remains were in an unexpectedly good state of preservation. It is probable that the plans of the monument committee were changed, and that instead of the body being put in the ground a crypt will be erected, and the casket exposed to view.

ALEXANDER of Russia is the least happy of sovereigns. He feels himself walking in the shadow of death in its most sinister form. He looks gloomily into the future. When with his great-uncle William the other day, the Emperor promised to recommend his heir to prove a friend to the Czarina and her children in case of her premature widowhood. There was much religious conversation between the two rulers.

The Herald prints extracts from Guiteau's autobiography. Guiteau traces all his misfortunes and failures in life to his early training, and is especially severe on his father, to whom he attributes most of his calamities and ill-success. He shows how he persistently followed the late President with the intent to assassinate him, and re-affirms that he believed he was acting under special Divine authority. He denies any legal liability, and says that for twenty years he has had the idea that he would be President.

MANY traditions of romance met together on the marriage of the Crown Prince of Sweden with the Princess Victoria of Baden. The bridegroom is a great-grandson of the French savior of fortune Bernadotte; the bride, through her grandmother, descends from the exiled dynasty of Sweden called the "House of Vasa." As the childless sister of Charles XII. was the last of that house, the claim must rest on political succession rather than on blood relationship, but it is sufficient, no doubt, for a court genealogist at a wedding festivity.

AMONGST the stories told of Bernadotte's early life is one that when he was a sergeant and stationed in Marseilles he proposed for the hand of a young girl, daughter of a petty shopkeeper, who rejected the young lover as too poor. In after years, the lady, fallen on hard times, remembered that her old wooer was king of Sweden, and went to Stockholm to ask for help. Happily the post of superintendent of the palace laundry, a situation of considerable profit, was vacant, and Bernadotte appointed his old sweetheart, so that she who might have been his queen became his laundress.

PRINTERS TYPE SETTING FOR BIG STAKES.—A typographical contest has just closed between the Winnipeg Times and Free Press offices. The match was for \$150 aside, and continued six days between six compositors from each office. Fifty dollars on each side was up extra on the two best, McGaw of the Times and Leay of the Free Press. The Free Press compositors scored 64,817 the Times 62,749. Leay, Free Press, 11,810; McGaw, of Times, 11,652. The rivals were locked in a room each day for seven hours, and the key held by the referee. Nearly \$2,000 changed hands in the city.
