Premier Says Property Deed To Be Transferred Shortly

Premier Matheson revealed yesterday that Port La Jolie, recently purchased by the Government of Prince Edward Island, has not yet been handed over to the department of national resources as an historic park site.

Mr. Matheson hastened to say, however, that only a few legal technicalities remain to be ironed out before the property is officially handed over to the Ottawa

government. Under the terms of the agreement, the federal government will develop and maintain the site, provided the provincial government can give them a clear title to the property.

The Premier said the local Government now has the deed for the property and final details of the transfer should take place very shortly.

Farm Loans Are Termed Satisfactory Business

Lending money to farmers on both short term and long term bases has turned out to be a very satisfactory business for the banks of Canada, banker William Hayward told a group of Island cattlemen yesterday.

Speaking at the annual banquet of the Prince Edward Island Ayrshire Breeders' Club held at Birch Court at noon yesterday Mr. Hayward, who is manager of the Charlottetown branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, said, "Since the introduction of Farm Improvement Loans in 1945, Canada's Banks have loaned millions and millions of dollars to Canadian farmers at losses averaging less than a fraction of one per cent."

Initiated to provide faster farm mechanization in the face of a dwindling labor force following World War Two, these loans originally were permitted to run only three to five years.

Under subsequent amendments to the Bank Act, it is now possible to loan money under this plan for periods ranging from seven to 10 years, Mr. Hayward said. Such loans might be granted for purposes such as improved drainage, fencing, repairs to buildings, erosion prevention, etc.

Short term credit needs of farmers were also provided by the banks of Canada, Mr. Hayward observed. These loans were available for such purposes as the purchase of seed and fertilizer in the spring, the purchase of feeder cattle, or the purchase of feed. This latter loan was usually carried by the dealer who supplied the feed, Mr. Hayward noted.

The guest speaker recalled that the bank which he was employed had decided to inaugurate a personal loan department about two months ago.

By this means the general public can borrow money for certain worthwhile purposes including debt consolidation he said. The loans are repaid in equal monthly instalments and can run as long as three years. Under this plan it is possible to finance the purchase of a car or truck at normal rates of interest, Mr. Hayward remarked.

Financing the marketing of primary products creates a "tight money" situation each fall, the guest speaker said.

For example, two or three caravans of southbound potatoes averaging \$300,000-400,000 might have to be financed by one bank for a month or longer. This tied up considerable amounts of money, if only for short periods. P.E.I. suffered a slight depression in 1957, but recovered

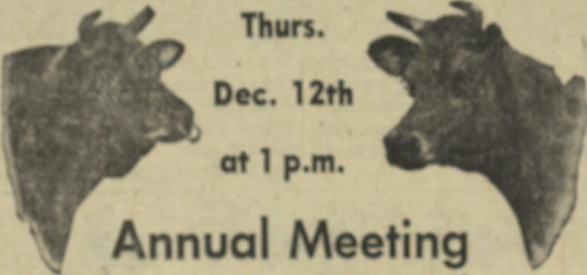

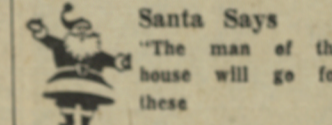
