Local and Other Items

SERVED THEM RIGHT.—Two men were each fined \$5 or one month imprisonment in Montreal the other day for expectorating tobacco juice in a street car when requested to desist.

SHIPMENTS ABROAD.—A Toronto firm has just shipped a consignment of cattle valued \$10,000 and bacon valued at \$17,500 to Great Britain by way of the Grand Trunk. Agricultural implements to the value of \$7,500 were also sent to Australia by way of Montreal.

STARVATION PREVAILS.—The French shore of Newfoundland, which is the subject of diplomatic dispute just now, is not a desirable district, if Rev Sydney Chancy, a Montreal minister there, is to be believed. He writes to the St John's papers that alarming destitution prevails along the whole west line, and that assistance is necessary to prevent wholesale starvation.

THE SKATING RINK.—Ice is being made as rapidly as possible, and the rink will be open for skating on Monday evening, Dec. 25th (Christmas). Tickets will be for sale at the Drug stores, A W Reddin, C D Rankin and Johnson & Johnson, Kent street. Prices will be the same as last year. CRAZY IN THE BANK.—A crazy fellow created something of a sensation by being found in the Bank of England premises at 11 o'clock last Saturday night. When discovered he said that he wanted to cash a check, and made a frantic resistance which was taken into custody. In his pockets they found silver and gold coins, jewelry and a loaded revolver; and one story says that he was only prevented from using the revolver by the military guards with fixed bayonets closing around him. At the police station he gave the name of George Taylor, and being examined by a doctor he was taken to the Bow infirmary.

MAY NOT ACCEPT.—A Montreal despatch says: The announcement that W C Macdonald is to be knighted was semi-officially confirmed at McGill University to-day. Her Majesty will, it is said, confer the honor on the occasion of the opening of the chemistry and mining building, his latest gift to the University. There is, however, a possibility that Mr Macdonald may not accept the proffered honor, as it is well known that he is averse to accepting distinctions of that kind. If he does accept it would only be after great pressure had been brought to bear upon him.

News Notes

The imports into France during the last eleven months increased £17,393,960. The exports during the same period decreased £5,898,200.

The cultivation of tobacco in Great Britain was prohibited, says London 'Times', by an act of parliament passed in 1782. Tobacco had been successfully cultivated in England, but when Charles II. commenced to derive revenue from the imported leaves, so heavy a tax was imposed on the home-grown article that it was hoped, would stop its cultivation. The growth was, however, continued in spite of all laws to the contrary right down to the reign of George III, when it was finally stopped by an act in 1782. The plantations in Yorkshire were then destroyed and the planters imprisoned and heavily fined—the large sum for those days of thirty thousand pounds being exacted as penalties. In Ireland the cultivation was not finally stopped till 1831. In April, 1886, permission to grow tobacco in England under certain stringent conditions was granted by the Inland Revenue Commissioners; but there is no chance of the general prohibition being withdrawn, as doing so would injuriously affect one of the sources of the national revenue.

The Sale of Ontario Apples.

TORONTO, Dec. 15.—A large sale of Ontario apples has been made by McWilliam and Everist to Mr Charles Richardson, of Buffalo. The consignment amounts to five thousand barrels, almost all of which will be exported to the United States.

INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION.

Failure of the Negotiations Creates No Surprise at the Capital.

Ottawa, Dec 14.—The report from Washington that there is a possibility of the High Jointers adjourning until March, does not astonish anyone here. According to private advices from the United States capital, very little progress has been made, especially in regard to reciprocity, and much as Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues may long for a trade interchange, there is little or no prospect of securing it, except at a tremendous cost to Canada. However, if the agony is to be prolonged into summer, it is the Government's outlook. Should the adjournment take place until after Congress finishes its work on March 5th, it is said in official circles here that that Parliament will be immediately called together, and an effort be made to conclude business within two months, as was the case when Sir John Thompson went to Paris in 1893. As a matter of fact, the Government has little or no Parliamentary business to submit, and would be well satisfied to get the estimate through. The Conservative leaders, however, would not likely consent to any such arrangement, except on a positive pledge being given that another session would be held before Parliament is dissolved.

TWO-CENT POSTAGE.

The Mail and Empire remarks that: There is a law on the statute book authorizing the Government to reduce the domestic rate of postage to two cents.

For letters to Zanzibar, St Helena, and the Straits Settlements, we will have at Christmas the two-cent charge; but the rate, in spite of the law, will continue at one cent more to any part of Canada.

Why should we pay three cents for a short distance in our own country and two cents for a trip round the world? Putting it another way, the resident of Zanzibar, or the Niger district, or South Africa, can, under special arrangement with Mr Mulock, send his letter to any part of Canada for two cents; but the Canadian who wants to communicate with his relatives or friends in the next town is taxed three cents.

Why should Mr Mulock force the Canadian to pay fifty per cent. more for his postage within Canada than is charged to the resident of Africa?
