

MISSING ART. McLEAN.

Evidence at the Investigation.

Court opened at 4 p. m., Tuesday, 21st. FRANK KELLY (sworn)—I live in North Bedouque. I remember Saturday night, 11th. I was in Summerside, and went to Noonan's with Dave Lefurgey. I went away with Capt. Reid, and went back to Noonan's. Capt. Reid was the only man I knew. I saw a man sitting on the counter in Jerry's shop. Kenny and I were talking about the harbor and the depth of water for smelt fishing. The only words I heard the man say was "Peter, come here, I want you." I left there and went to the dining room and ordered some tea and a feed for my horse. I may have said something to Will Noonan. I left Noonan's at 9 o'clock. I had sent my horse home before that with Lefurgey's man. Lefurgey was under the influence of liquor. He did not tell me when he left Noonan's. I heard on Tuesday that the man was missing. Lefurgey was down here with me on Tuesday. He talked about McLean on the way home. He said he did not see him on Saturday night. He said nothing about any one lying in Noonan's yard. If McLean was under the influence of liquor he was very quiet when I saw him on the counter. I thought he was sober. I saw him about 8.30. I was in Noonan's bar and saw Sherry there. Lefurgey got home about 11 o'clock. It might have been 11.30, but not 12.

KENNETH MCKENZIE (sworn)—I live in Summerside. I am in the employ of Daniel Stewart. I saw McLean on Saturday evening, 11th inst., about 7 o'clock. I was at Noonan's asking about him on Monday. I saw Will Noonan in the blacksmith shop. He said it was very strange. He told me that McLean was found in the yard drunk, and that they took him in and put him to bed, and that he got up and went into the nursery, and the old man went for him pretty lively, and McLean said, "I want to go home." I went to Bedouque to see Noonan. When I came back I saw Sherry at Noonan's, and had a talk with him about McLean. Sherry said he could not swear which way he went out, but thought he went towards the railway. He said he would not be sure how well his boots were laced, but his overshoes were buckled. He had his gloves on. I was talking to John Gardiner on Wednesday. He was in the barn when we went to his place. We asked him if he was in Summerside on Saturday. He said yes. We asked him if he saw McLean, or if he knew him. He told him he was missing. He said to hush up, and not let the women know. He could not remember McLean. He remembered some young man putting him to bed. He remembered getting up and going through two or three rooms. He didn't see anyone in any of the rooms. He said if McLean had a couple of hours sleep he would be sober. He heard no disturbance. Said his dog was in the room when he awoke. He was surprised that the dog was there. He said it was strange that he never heard a word all day Sunday about McLean being there. McLean was in the habit of drinking. I never saw him drunk, but saw him pretty full. He was not quarrelsome when under the influence of liquor, but rather clear in his brain. I did not hear him say anything lately about going away.

JEREMIAH NOONAN, (re-called)—My name is Jeremiah Noonan. I live in Summerside. I was not there on Saturday, 11th inst. I was at my father's at Albany. I left here on Jan. 2nd, and came back on the 13th. I knew Art McLean. I did not see him since New Year's Day. I never saw him since New Year's Day. Court adjourned till Friday.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.

In the House of Commons to-day, Casgrain introduced a bill to further secure the independence of Parliament by providing that each member should take an oath that he was returned without any corrupt endeavors on his part, the oath to be taken before the Clerk of House.

Replying to Gordon Sir John said no special application had been made to the Government for a repeal of the law restricting Chinese immigration.

In answer to Cartwright Sir John said the receipts of the Intercolonial for the last half of 1889 were \$1,582,897 and operating expenses \$1,834,046.

On motion by Hesson for a settlement respecting insolvent banks, Foster said the Government were preparing their banking bill and would have the views of a deputation of bankers on Saturday.

The House adjourned.

Casey has given notice of a resolution declaring that the Government should guarantee the absolute soundness of all paper currency issued, and should make such guaranteed currency legal tender, whether issued by the Government or by bank.

A Great Storm.

LONDON, Jan. 23.

There has been a great storm of wind and rain in southern England, and enormously high tides as a consequence. The Severn overflowed its banks, Gloucestershire was submerged with great loss of property, the Lynton and Llanelli, Portsmouth, and South Wales Railways have been temporarily stopped. The damage has been found to be enormous as it is reported in detail. A quarter of a mile sea-wall between New Haven and Seaford, collapsed.

Perished in the Flames.

St. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 23.

John Gorley and three children perished by fire Tuesday night. Gorley died in the flames, when about making a third attempt to rescue his children from the burning house. His remains were found with his head burned off and a child in his arms.

The West End Scandal.

LONDON, Jan. 23.

Newton Taylor and DeGalia, charged with conspiring to defeat justice in connection with the West End scandal, were to-day committed for trial, and were subsequently admitted to bail in £100 each.

The Excitement Abating.

LISBON, Jan. 23.

The tremendous patriotic fury against England is abating, and the Anglophobists are nearly silent. The excitement and demonstrations in the provinces have ceased.

To the Electors of Charlottetown, Common and Royalty.

GENTLEMEN,—Thanking you for the liberal support you have given me in the last three General Elections, and having again been nominated a candidate for the representation of your interests in the House of Assembly, I now seek your suffrages.

After the promotion of the Hon. W. W. Sullivan to a seat on the Supreme Court Bench of this Province, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor entrusted me with the formation of a Government.

Having accomplished the formation of a Government, it was deemed proper, in view of the number of partial elections required to be held in consequence of the vacancies created and the nearness of the completion of the term of the present Parliament, to consult the electors by means of a General Election before entering on new legislation.

Agriculture being the main industry of the Province, measures will be adopted which will best render the labor of the husbandman remunerative, by increasing the aid given to the Annual Exhibitions, by the importation of improved stock, and by providing instruction on Agricultural Chemistry and a course of popular lectures on agricultural subjects.

In order to give greater shipping facilities, and until the Dominion Government shall have taken over all the wharves that became the property of the Dominion Government at the time of Confederation, it is our policy to keep in repair such of them as are essential to the trade of the locality where they are respectively built.

As in the past, our policy is to vigorously press to a settlement our claims against the Federal Government.

Rigorous economy will be practiced in the expenditure of public money, while at the same time liberal provision will be made for the public service.

Pending the adjustment of our claims against the Federal Government, our annual resources may not be sufficient to carry out the proposals indicated, and at the same time provide for the large expenditure required for our educational system. In that case, such measures to supplement our revenue will be adopted as will bear the least heavily on the people, and will at the same time be just and equitable.

Changes will be made in the public service in order to secure efficiency and greater security to the public interests.
