Cleveland Increases Lead By Whipping New York 8-2

NEW YORK (AP)—Smith's three-run homer with the score tied in the seventh and two home runs by Larry Doby helped defeat Eddie Lopat Friday night as Cleveland extended its American League lead a 1 1/2 games with an 8-2 victory over New York Yankees in the opener of their vital series.

If the Tribe should lose the other two games, they still will leave town Sunday night with a percentage point edge after this victory.

Smith, Cleveland's hitting star, drove in five runs. His homer climaxed a four-run seventh inning off Ed Lopat.

Lopat rode along on a 2-0 lead until Doby hit his 18th homer in the sixth. The Yanks had reached Early Wynn for a pair in the fourth on Irv Noren's single with the bases loaded.

In the seventh, three successive singles sent home Bill Glynn with the tying run.

Doby got his second homer in the eighth.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Bobby Thomson, who came to Milwaukee from New York in the winter trades, slapped a pinch single to left with two out in the ninth inning to give the Braves a 3-2 victory over the Giants Friday night.

Thomson's smash past third scored Jim Pendleton from second to break up a tie game. The Braves scored their other runs on homers by Joe Adcock and Eddie Mathews.

The single, Thomson's third in four pinch-hitting assignments since he returned to the Braves after a spring training accident, hung the loss on reliever Hoyt Wilhelm.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Rookie Joe Cunningham drove in three runs with a double and tie-breaking homer Friday night to give Vin Raschi his first victory since June 15 and St. Louis Cardinals a fifth straight triumph by a 6-4 score over Brooklyn Dodgers.

Cunningham's homer came in the sixth off righthander Raschi, who suffered his third defeat against seven wins.

Raschi yielded a three-run homer in the first inning to Gil Hodges—his 26th of the season—and then checked the Dodgers with one tally thereafter.

The Cards tallied once in the first on a double by Rip Repulski, an error and a single by Red Schoendienst. They tied the game in the second on doubles by Ray Jablonski and Cunningham, an out field fly and an error.

Brooklyn went ahead in the fourth on Sandy Amoros' first homer of the season.

On Monday and Tuesday of this week I accompanied members of the Ellerslie Biological Station on a trout 'shocking' expedition.

Dr. Smith, Biologist with the Dominion Fisheries, had charge of the party. Dr. Smith specializes in the study of trout. It was not my first experience along this line as I was present last year when experiments were carried out on streams in the western section of the province.

The 'shocking' device is an elaborate affair and could be really shocking if used for other purposes than for which it was originally constructed.

The machine is carried on a trailer and 200 feet of waterproof cable is wound on a winch. This enables the men to cover considerable stream length on either side of the road. The men wear arm pit length rubber waders and are otherwise protected as electricity and water combine for a dangerous situation unless extreme caution is exercised.

The shock treatment is used to secure fingerlings and larger trout for tagging and to estimate the number and size of trout on any stream that may be selected for study purposes.

The electrode draws trout after the manner of a magnet, but doesn't actually stun them, and they can be readily scooped up in an ordinary landing net.

Care is taken not to set the machine at too high voltage for in that case the trout would be shocked to death.

The electrode is on the end of a long handle and the man holding it wades down the bank and unshoves it into holes under the bank or beneath a heavy fringe of overhanging alders. Its a real thrill to Continued on page 7

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DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

In the latest issue of The Harness Horse is the following—'Dan Steele, Canadian veteran born trainer who winters annually at the Metropolitan Speedway track at Allston, Mass., on the Charles River near Boston, has been driving harness horses for 56 years. The 73-year-old horseman has nine head at Bay State Raceway here. He holds two track records for trotters—three-quarters in 1:35 3/4 with Senator Song, and the mile and three-quarters of 3:56 3/4 with Muriel Hanover.' We looked up what we believe to be Dan's first start. It was at the Charlottetown Exhibition on Wednesday, September 14, 1898, where he drove Minnie, by Administrator, owned by James MacLeod, Summerside, in the 2:26 class and was 2-7-3. Provider, owned by W. S. McKie, Charlottetown, and driven by Alder Black, won in three straight heats. Other well-known Island drivers who were racing at that meeting included J. H. Curtis, Peake's Star, F. J. Steele, Charlottetown, P. S. Brown, Charlottetown, J. M. Nicholson, Charlottetown, Harry Morris, Charlottetown, Royalty, Dr. Andrew Lecky, Charlottetown. Later, we think it was in 1907, Dan set up a new track record at Charlottetown of 2:17 3/4 with Ada Mac and that stood for many years.

Last Saturday night at Saint John's N. B., just Nellie C. (Archie Strong) was a double dash winner (dashes 1 and 4). This handsome mare was owned at one time by Dr. R. F. Seaman of this city. Twinkle Dawn, owned and driven by Walter Akerly, won dashes 2 and 6 with Sparkle Dawn (Lee Jones) 2-2, best time 2:22. Peter Brewer, owned and driven by J. Coughlin, that has had pretty much his own way since arriving there, won the 3rd dash but finished fifth due to a bad break in the 7th which was won by Al Langille's old reliable Royal. Donald G. R. 2:08 3/4 that we have been waiting to see show some of his former greatness, uncorked it in dashes 3 and 8, winning both for owner-driver L. O. McKinnay, Gagetown. Diana O. Grattan (Rybichaud) was 2-3, Fortune Boy, owned and driven by Harvey Cormier, Moncton was 8-2. He is a 13-year-old pacer with a record of 2:04 3/4 and in his racing career has won \$13,412 and is eligible to the 2:17 pace.

On this page you will notice an ad for a 6-year-old pacer, John D., owned by Willis J. Reid, St. John's, Nfld. He is by Big Gun, dam of Guy Abbey, and his dam will remember L. O. McKinnay, Gagetown. Diana O. Grattan (Rybichaud) was 2-3, Fortune Boy, owned and driven by Harvey Cormier, Moncton was 8-2. He is a 13-year-old pacer with a record of 2:04 3/4 and in his racing career has won \$13,412 and is eligible to the 2:17 pace.

His time in the second race was 2:18 1/2. Sandy Mar with the same field, took the 6th in 2:20 and passed his backers the largest sum that we have noticed this season—\$103.20 for a \$2 bill. . . . Marion Budlong, driven by Jensen and owned by E. A. Grant, Houlton, Me., won the 3rd and 7th dashes, best time 2:15 1/4.

It was generally expected that the unbeaten free-for-aller of the season, Sep Hanover 2:03, owned by the Princeton Stables and driven by Al Langille, Jr., would win the big event of the night, the Free For All, and he did win Race 4 in 2:10—the fastest mile stepped in New Brunswick this season. My Volo (Carr) was 2. Abelard (Gardiner) 3, but in the 8th dash with the same field, My Volo outpaced Sep to the wire in 2:11 1/4. My Volo is a 9-year-old bay gelding by Gay Song 1:59 3/4 has a record of 2:02 3/4 and last season won over \$9,000 and has all time winnings of over \$49,000. On October 17, 1953, he won the \$5,000 A. Pace at Yorks Raceway, N. Y., in 2:05—wonderful time for so late in the season. Very few of us know about him but from now on we should hear a lot of him. His owner W. F. McGibbon, is noted for picking up high-class pacers and every few years astonishes the racers with a classy one. You will all remember Kato 2:10 3/4 and Ayceno 2:08 3/4 that he sold some years ago to P. C. McCormac of this city.

Summerside Raceway is certainly satisfying its patrons at the attendance shows. Last Saturday night upwards of 1,200 were present and enjoyed the sport very much. Pleading to admirers of Miss Knox was her winning both dashes in the B. Pace with the up-and-coming pacer Tommy Morgan (MacNeill).

Summerside Raceway had another large attendance on Wednesday night but unfortunately the race program had to be discontinued after the 5th dash. One of the highlights of the night was the payoff when Captain Morgan (Continued on page 7)
