Contract Let For Frost Proof Shed Extension; S'Side

OTTAWA — The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$74,967.50 to County Construction Company Ltd., of Charlottetown, P.E.I. for improvements to the Railway Wharf at Summerside, P.E.I. Specified completion date for the project is October 1, 1958. This work involves the erection of an extension to the existing East shed measuring 200 feet in length by 39 feet in width. Crossed on which the extension will rest are to be driven to rock in order that a solid foundation may be reached. Piles are to be capped to provide a sub-structure for the new work. Over the caps and extending to sills on sides and end, a two-inch flooring of plank will be placed. The planks will be laid on two edges and one side and in widths of not more than ten inches and not less than six inches, and in lengths of not less than twelve feet eight inches. Three inches of loose glass wool insulation will be placed over a layer of approved fifteen pound felt laid on the sub floor. Above this a top floor of two-inch tongue and groove plank will be placed. The existing north wall will be extended to the height of the roof of the extension. The roof is to be cut off flush with the extension side of the studding so that the sheathing and the one-inch tongue and groove boards may be placed inside the extension to the roof. A four-inch by four-inch cant strip will be placed at the contact line of the old roof and extension wall and properly fastened to both. Following the placement of 150 tons of sand fill will be placed along the east side. The existing ramp at the north end of the old shed will be relocated to a position at the north end of the extension. Twenty-one thousand, six hundred feet (Board Measure) of crosscut cps and corbels and six thousand, five hundred lineal feet of crosscut siding will be used during this project. Plans and specifications were prepared by the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch of the Department of Public Works in Ottawa.

Explains Why Gov. Adams Was Dropped

OTTAWA (CP) — Governor Sherman Adams was dropped from President Eisenhower's Ottawa party because the president decided he wasn't going to do any fishing. White House press secretary James Hagerty said Tuesday. Mr. Hagerty gave that explanation to Canadian and American reporters who asked why Mr. Adams, the president's executive assistant, did not accompany Mr. Eisenhower on his visit. The original plan, said Mr. Hagerty, was that Mr. Adams would accompany the president. Mr. Adams knew a good salmon fishing spot on New Brunswick's Restigouche River and the president wanted to do some fishing. But later the president cancelled the fishing trip because it would take another three or four days and he figured he couldn't afford to spend that much extra time away from Washington.

Canadian Optimistic Can Detect Ballistic Missiles

OTTAWA (CP) — Defence Minister Pearkes said Tuesday that Canadian defence scientists are "quite hopeful of achieving results" in research on methods of detecting intercontinental ballistic missiles. Appearing before the Commons estimates committee, he also said units of each armed service and the defence research board are working on the problem of radar jamming. Egan Chambers (PC—Montreal St. Lawrence-St. George) asked whether any progress is being made in devising methods of detecting approach of intercontinental ballistic missiles. Mr. Pearkes said a great deal of research on this subject is going on. Without elaborating, he added "we are quite hopeful of achieving results."

The Company, subject to the provisions of any general legislation relating to pipe lines for the transportation and transmission of oil and gas and other liquid and gaseous hydrocarbons which is enacted by Parliament, may (a) within or outside Canada construct, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire and hold, develop, operate, maintain, control, lease, mortgage, create lease upon, sell, convey or otherwise dispose of and turn to account any and all interprovincial, extra-provincial and/or international pipe lines and all appurtenances relative thereto for gathering, processing, treating, transporting, transmitting, storing and delivering oil and gas and other liquid and gaseous hydrocarbons and products thereof, including pumping stations, compressor stations, metering stations, gathering systems, terminals, storage tanks or reservoirs and all works relative thereto for use in connection with the said pipe lines; Provided that the main pipe line or main pipe lines for the transportation and transmission of oil and gas and other liquid and gaseous hydrocarbons shall be located entirely within Canada; and buy, or otherwise acquire, sell, distribute or otherwise dispose of gas and other gaseous hydrocarbons and products thereof; and own, lease, sell, operate and maintain aircraft and aerodromes for the purpose of its undertaking, together with the facilities required for the operation of such aircraft and aerodromes; and own, lease, operate and maintain interconnection telephone, telegraph and telegraph communication systems and, subject to the Radio Act, and any other statute relating to radio, own, lease, operate and maintain interstation radio communication facilities;" DATED at Toronto, Ontario, this thirtieth day of June 1958.
