We have been informed that the work in the Registry Office in Charlottetown was so great during the last year, as to require the services of one or two assistants.

The British League of Peace and Liberty propose to offer Charles Francis Adams an address previous to his departure from this country.

Harvey W. Lord, who is about to retire from the American Consulate at Manchester, was entertained by merchants of that city last evening at dinner.

In the House of Commons this evening a motion was made for the Government to lay before the House papers in connection with the seizure of the English vessel of that name by a United States steamer during the blockade of the Southern ports in the rebellion.

In regard to an inquiry regarding the circumstance of the imprisonment of W. Johnson, the Orange Secretary in the County of Down, Ireland, Lord Mayo said the prisoner was detained in jail because he refused to express regret for his action in heading an illegal procession.

The House went into committee of the whole, and resumed the debate on the state of Ireland. The O'Donoghue, member for Tralee, said the disaffection among the Irish people was widespread, and reached all classes of society.

We were very much pleased with the remarks that fell from the Hon. Mr. Howlan, and the Hon. Mr. Davies, having reference to our Town. These gentlemen are business men, and know the importance of helping and fostering any new Town.

We have received a communication commenting on the conduct of an individual who made himself busy in informing on several licensed Tavern keepers, and taking them to Malpeque Court, for not having a copy of their license posted up in their bar rooms.

Despatches from the south announce that the Grand Vizier had returned to Constantinople from Crete. He reports to the Turkish Government that the war between the Turks and Cretan insurgents had at length ended—there were a few guerillas still operating in the mountain districts, they were hardly a hundred strong, and no fears were anticipated of any fresh outbreaks.

The Corps Legislatif was engaged last week in a discussion of the new law in relation to holding public meetings, which was introduced by the Government. An important and comprehensive amendment to the Bill has been offered by Liberal members. It proposes to remove all restrictions from the rights of the people to meet in public assemblies when and where they please.

Advices from Berlin state that Prince Napoleon after a series of flattering entertainments in his honor has left for Paris. His visit to Germany has given rise to many surmises and rumors, and is extensively commented upon by the Press; but his mission has not been divulged. His reception everywhere in Germany has been most cordial.

Thompson and Mullaney, tried and convicted at Manchester, charged with being accessory to the murder of Police Sergeant Brett, to-day have been sentenced to be hanged.

A man named Mahon, said to be a Fenian organizer, has been arrested in this city charged with having endeavored to swear in soldiers stationed here as Fenians. It is stated that Mahon's efforts were attended with some degree of success, and that the evidence to be produced at his trial will show disaffection to prevail to an alarming degree in some Irish Regiments.

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London, March 16th, (eve.)—Political news unimportant. Mr. G. W. Hunt, Secretary of the Treasury, stated in the House of Commons that the total expenses of the British expedition in Abyssinia, up to date, were less than £4,000,000.

Dublin, 16.—Rooney, Kelly, Landers and Hurley, are the names of the four Fenians of the Jaemel party who have just been released by the British Government, on condition that they returned to America. It is reported that all their companions, including General Nagle, who were arrested at Dungarvon, will also be liberated on the same terms.

Chatham, (Canada) Mar. 14. The greatest freshet ever known in this section of the country is prevailing here. The Kent bridge and Chatham Fifth street bridge were swept away yesterday. A very large amount of valuable property in this town has been destroyed. The Great Western railway track, west of this place, is carried away for ten miles. All railway communication between Chatham and Detroit is stopped. The through passengers for the Great Western will be conveyed over the Grand Trunk railway from Port Huron to Detroit, until the road is repaired. The damage by the freshet is estimated at \$100,000. A large number of barns are inundated, and horses, and cattle killed and wounded.

Pokosto, March 17th.—There was a terrific hurricane here yesterday morning. It damaged the depots, dwelling houses, churches, etc., to an extent of fifty thousand dollars. One man was killed at the Grand Trunk Railway round-house, and several others wounded.

New York, March 14. The hearing of the impeachment case against President Johnson has been postponed till Monday, March 23d.

Washington, March 13. The hearing of impeachment commenced this P. M. The President's counsel demand 40 days to prepare a defence. This feeling is opposed, and, at last advice, arguments were being made on that point.

New York, March 17th.—Serious freshets are reported in various parts of the country, caused by breaking up of river ice.

O'Balwin, the Irish pugilist, has settled his match with Elliot, money being put up. O'Balwin bets \$10,000 to \$2,000 that he will be felled in half an hour. The fight is to be contested in May.
