FEAR KAISER MAY ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE FROM EXILE IN HOLLAND.

LONDON, June 28.—Apprehension exists in Holland lest former Kaiser William attempts to slip away from Dutch and Belgian territory in the event of a Royalist rising, following the assassination of Foreign Minister Rathenau, according to the correspondent of the London Daily Mail at The Hague. The writer, however, quotes J. B. Kan, Secretary of the Dutch Home Office, as saying that such apprehension is groundless. "We have no evidence that the Kaiser has any such intention," he said, "and the surveillance maintained around him is so close that it would be impossible for him to get away, even if he wished."

CONFIRMATION SERVICE

His Lordship Rt. Rev. Louis J. O'Leary, Bishop of the Holy Church, Charlottetown, accompanied by his Secretary, Rev. J. A. Gaudet until he left Thursday afternoon for St. John's. When his Lordship had taken the seat prepared for him in the Sanctuary, addresses in both French and English were presented to his Lordship, who in reply thanked the people most cordially. The procession lined up again, and proceeded to the cemetery, where various prayers for the dead were recited. The proceedings for the day terminated with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, by Rev. J. A. Gaudet, P.P. Thursday, His Lordship celebrated Mass at 7 o'clock in St. Anthony's Church, Confirmation Mass being at 8 o'clock, followed by the administration of the Sacrament of Confirmation. Seventy-nine boys and girls were confirmed by His Lordship in the presence of a very large congregation. Fathers Campbell and McDonald were assistants to the Bishop, Father St. John and Father Gaudet were Masters of Ceremonies. The sponsors for the children were Maxim J. Gallant and Mrs. M. J. Gallant. The confirmation sermon was eloquently preached by Rev. Father Campbell, who inspired in the little ones, the love of their Creator. FIRST VOYAGE SUCCESS OF EMPRESS OF CANADA.

VICTORIA, June 27.—Nine days and two hours from the breakwater at Yokohama, Japan, to William Head Quarantine Station, eight hours over the record for the run, held by the steamship Empress of Russia of the same line, the new Canadian Pacific Steamship Company's liner, Empress of Canada, the Vancouver-Orient run, arrived here early yesterday on her maiden voyage, in command of Capt. A. J. Hailey, R.N.R.

The new Empress is 627 feet long and two tons tonnage, and is capable of making 22 knots an hour. She is the largest passenger steamship, not only in the Canadian-Orient service, but on the Pacific.
