R. Hughes, C. E. Robertson and Otto Crabb, left this morning for Bangor to attend the Exhibition. We wish them a pleasant trip. SIR HECTOR L. LANGEVIN, Minister of Public Works, returned from Rimouski and Baie des Chaleurs to Ottawa on Wednesday. He will shortly proceed thence to Windsor and other parts of Ontario. It is stated that the French Roman Catholics of Quebec Province have 1,269 clergymen, 780 churches, 14 theological seminaries, 34 colleges, 1 university, 97 academies, 22 asylums, and 38 hospitals. JOSEPH E. BOWEN, the oldest Master Mason in the United States, died at his residence in Philadelphia on the 22nd. He was ninety-four years old, and was installed the first master of Mount Mariah Lodge, No. 125, Philadelphia, sixty-two years ago. A GIANT LOBSTER was recently caught at Mr. James Grant's Lobster Factory, Belle Creek. A CAMP MEETING, held by northern Methodists (colored), at Pipey Hill, Rutherford County, South Carolina, was attacked by an armed body of Zion Methodists and fired upon. The northern Methodists fled in disorder, seven of them being wounded. The invaders then collected the effects of the routed party, piled them up and made a bonfire of them. THE North Sydney Herald says: William Sinclair, an experienced Colorado and Nevada miner, discovered an excellent vein of silver ore on Silver Mountain, Whycomagh, a few days ago. The vein is twenty feet thick, and Mr. Sinclair says the silver is far superior to any he has seen in Nevada or Colorado. He has also discovered near the same place a six foot vein of Galena and silver, which average 81 per cent lead, and two and a half ounces of silver to the ton on the surface. The discovery has caused considerable excitement in Whycomagh. We congratulate Mr. Sinclair and W. W. Beer, of Charlottetown, who is also interested in the good luck. HON. MR. FORTIN, M. P., in company with G. F. Baillarge, Deputy Minister of Public Works, Ottawa, and Joseph Rosa, Superintendent Engineer, visited the Public Works at Amherst, Etang du Nord and Havre aux Maisons, Magdalen Islands, during the past week. The Deputy Minister afterwards examined the Breakwater at Souris, and the Dominion Building at Charlottetown, on Wednesday, the Harbor works at Casampec on Thursday, and the Dominion Building at Summerside, after a visit to Tignish on Friday. Mr. Baillarge and Mr. Rosa left Summerside to-day (Saturday), to examine other works on the Baie des Chaleurs, and the River Saguenay.

OTTAWA, Aug. 29. Senator John A. Logan, of Illinois, and Mrs. Logan, narrowly escaped being drowned at the Islands a few days ago. Their boat capsized, and they were precipitated into the water. They were rescued with great difficulty.

Heavy Drug Fire.

LONDON, Aug. 29. The manufacturing establishment of Mawson & Thompson, makers of druggist sundries, was destroyed by fire yesterday. Loss \$250,000. Four hundred employees are thrown out of employment.

Heavy Loss by Storm.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Aug. 29. The losses by the recent storm to shipping, etc., is estimated at \$1,690,000. Fourteen lives were lost by the wrecking of three pilot boats.

Death of Archibald Grant, Esq.

NEW GLASGOW, Aug. 29. Archibald Grant, brother of Rev. Dr. Grant, Rector of Queen's College, Kingston, died this morning of paralysis, at Spring Hill mines.

A Miner Killed.

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, Aug. 26. EGGS. - There continues to be a good demand for Eggs, and Eastern extras command 17c per dozen, with some fancy marks but 1/2c more. Northern and Island eggs command 16c. FISH. - The Mackerel catch continues to fall off, the total quantity landed by the fleet since Friday being about 9,000 bbls, against 11,000 bbls, same time last week. The great body of Mackerel clings close to the shore in shoal water, and fishermen cannot throw their seines without great danger of tearing them. Prices are firm, with sales of inspected lots at outports at \$3 to \$3.50 for No 3; \$5.50 for No 2; and \$12.50 for No 1. Separate lots of late caught shore No 3 are held at \$3.50 to \$4 per bbl. Sales include a lot of P. E. Island unculled Mackerel at \$2.75 per bbl, in bond. There is a fair jobbing trade, and dealers are getting a slight advance on best quality, but prices still rule low compared with last year. Codfish are in better demand and sales include some 1,000 qtls Nova Scotia at \$3.50 to \$3.75 for large dry Bank \$3.75 to \$4 for dry Shore; and \$3.25 to \$3.50 for pickle cured Shore. Pickle cured Bank are scarce and command \$2.75 per quint. Nothing of consequence doing Hake, Haddock or Pollock. A little more inquiry has been developed for Pickled Herring, but there will not be many wanted before the middle of September. Choice new large splits are worth \$5 per bbl. Canned Lobsters command \$1.70 to \$1.75 per dozen, duty paid. Canned Mackerel are quiet at 65 to 75 per dozen.

Excitement prevails in Atlanta, Ga.

Over the report that a duel has been arranged between Colonel Gault, editor of the Banner Watchman, and Alexander Connell, representative from Decatur Co. Connell recently introduced a bill requiring that all bachelors after their thirtieth year should pay an annual tax to the State of \$2.50, which fund was to be applied for educational purposes. In criticizing Connell, Gault said he had proven himself unfit to be the "end man" of a tenth class minstrel troupe. In the House next day Connell denounced the editor of the Banner Watchman as a thief, liar and scoundrel, who ought to have been hanged ten years ago.

Truro has fewer vacant houses than, perhaps, any other town or settlement in the Province.

An advertiser, who wished to secure a dwelling, has failed to obtain one. In this matter of dwelling houses, at high or low rentals, Truro loses heavily every day. Many persons would locate here if they could obtain dwelling places, but they are compelled either to board or remain away from the town. The complaint is that the landowners want too much money for building lots, and failing to sell, refuse to build themselves. - Truro Guardian.
