### Many Attractions Keep Show Going Smoothly

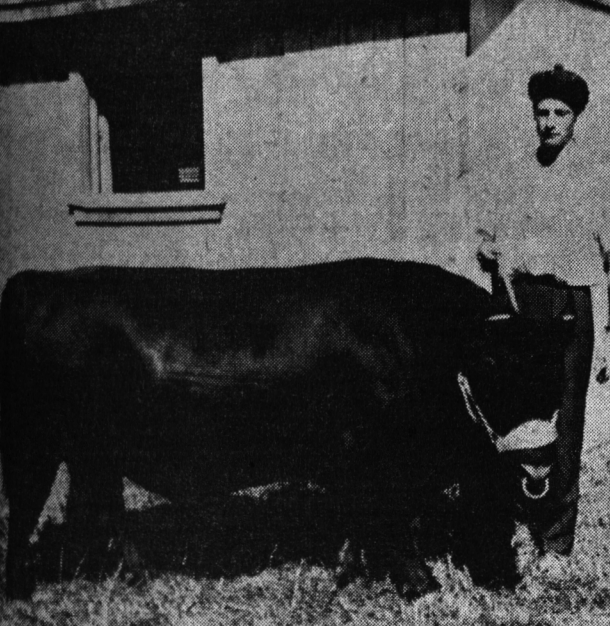
