Steamer Arrives
At S'ide With
Cargo of Potash

The S.S. Michael from Ham-
bourg, Germany, arrived at Hol-
man's Wharf, Summerside on Fri-
day evening with more than 2,
000 tons of potash for Canada.
Packers fertilizer plant at Sum-
merside. Unloading operations em-
ploying about 60 local men were
began on Saturday and are ex-
pected to be completed on Friday
of this week. The work of unloading
is continuing around the clock.

This 350-foot ship will go from
Summerside to a New Brunswick
port to load pulp wood.
It is believed that this is the
first time that a freighter of ocean-
going size has ever docked at Hol-
man's Wharf which has recently
been rebuilt. The dock facilities
recently used at the Marine Wharf
are presently being rebuilt thus
creating a serious problem for
shipping which was unable to use
the shallower docking facilities at
the Holman's Wharf. This, how-
ever, was remedied through the
efforts of the local federal mem-
ber, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught,
the parliamentary assistant to the
Minister of Fisheries, who was in-
strumental in having deeper dredg-
ing done at the Holman's Wharf
to permit the normal import - ex-
port trade in fertilizer, farm pro-
duce and pulpwood.-S.

New Purge Hits Soviet
Republic Of Georgia

LONDON, (AP) - A new purge,
the third within 18 months, hit
the Soviet Republic of Georgia Mon-
day. The two top men were fired
in a shake-up possibly mirroring
a fresh struggle in the Kremlin for
political control of that homeland
of Joseph Stalin and Lavrenty
Beria.
A broadcast from Tiflis, the cap-
ital, gave the details:
Premier Valerian Bakradze, who
had headed the government since
last April, was dismissed in dis-
grace and G.D. Javakhsishvili, a
former deputy premier, was named
in his place.
Secretary Mirtskhulava of the
central committee of the Georgian
Communist party was simultane-
ously dismissed and replaced by
a man named Muzaladze, pres-
umably a former justice minister
of the republic.
Apparently the Kremlin leaders
felt the Georgian Communists were
being too easy on Beria's hench-
men still in power. The removal
of Bakradze and Mirtskhulava
could be just a delayed - action
clean-up of Beria men in top Ge-
orgian posts.
Georgian politics have become so
complicated in the last year and
a half it is difficult to follow them.
In April, 1952, a man named
Charkviani, political boss, hench-
man of Beria and first secretary
of the central committee of the
Georgian party, was removed and
disgraced. A clean sweep of all
senior political jobs in the republic
followed.

Reported Quake
In B.C. Fictitious

The recent supposed earth-
quake in Terrace, British Colum-
bia, is the subject of an interest-
ing letter received in Kenning-
ton from a reported eyewitness.
He said the matter was causing
considerable laughter in the area
as all that happened was a huge
fill had sunk, probably due to
some subterranean stream caus-
ing an underground cavity.
The writer said "it may be that
there was no bottom to the fill
and it just sank like something
in a bowl of jelly. The most
amazing thing about it was to
see the contour of the earth
change around the area as trees
on both sides of the right way
appear to be growing in towards
it and a nearby beaver dam was
raised almost 20 feet."
Stories like this recalled to a
correspondent an event of over
50 years ago when a young re-
porter of the Klondike Nugget,
published in Dawson, was ordered
to go out and get a real news
story or not come back to work.
Walking down First Avenue he
happened to see some Peel River
Indians who had just arrived
after a 200 mile mush which took
them 9 days to complete.
The reporter told him about passing a
large flat topped mountain and
that they saw what appeared to
be a ship or the remains of one
on the mountain top. The report-
er, a young Irishman named
Casey, having some knowledge
of geology, knew that Alaska and
all the Northern country had a
tropical climate prior to the ice
age.
He immediately dreamed up a
story that the phantom ship seen
by the Indians was really the re-
mains of Noah's Ark and argued
that Mount Ararat was really in
Alaska. This was announced to
the world over the newly install-
ed press association wires and it
was added that the ribs of the
Ark were still visible. The story
is reported to have caused quite
a sensation at the time but what
happened to Casey afterwards is
a mystery.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., (AP)
The United Nations steering
committee, by a vote of 12 to 5,
Tuesday rebuffed a stubborn move
by Russia's Andrei Vishinsky to
reopen the whole question of who
will sit in the Korean peace con-
ference.
This vote came shortly after
United States delegate Henry
Cabot Lodge Jr. tossed in a sur-
prise suggestion that the Korean
peace conference itself decide the
controversial question whether
neutrals will take part in the
parleys.

Vishinsky immediately denou-
ced Lodge's suggestion as a
"mere chess move which is inap-

ference.

Recalls Laughter
Selwyn Lloyd of Britain, who
backed Lodge's idea immediately
as a constructive gesture, re-
minded Vishinsky that he laugh-
ed at American arms proposals in
Paris two years ago but lived to
regret his untimely laughter.
Lloyd said he hoped that Vishin-
sky would have second thoughts
again. He described his attitude
as "lamentable."

Vishinsky whispered to Julius
Katz-Suchy, Poland, while Lloyd
was speaking, and Katz-Suchy
promptly answered that the Soviet
bloc had not taken a position
on the subject. Some delegates

ference be enlarged to include
neutrals and listed them as the
Soviet Union, Burma, India, Pak-
istan and Indonesia.

Voting Against Russia
The 11 countries voting against
including the Soviet proposal for
debate were: Canada, United
States, Britain, France, Nation-
alist China, Mexico, Israel, Bel-
gium, El Salvador, Iraq and Ven-
ezuela. The Soviet Union and
Poland voted for it and Yugo-
slavia abstained. The assembly
president, Mrs. Vijaya Lakshmi
Pandit, who is the 15th commit-
tee member, did not vote.

The committee decision will go
to the full 60-nation assembly
where Vishinsky is expected to
renew in vain his demand for
immediate consideration. He ap-
peared to foresee his defeat to-
day, for he and Katz-Suchy said
they would insist in the political
committee that the Korean item
now on the agenda be discussed
first. The present Korean item
deals mainly with questions of
reconstruction and rehabilitation
but it has been used in previous
assemblies as the starting point
for any angle of the Korean de-
bate.
