MONTREAL, Dec. 27.—Word has been received that Wilfrid Dougall, nephew of John Dougall, of The Witness, has been seriously wounded in South Africa, having had his eyesight destroyed and nose injured. Dougall went to South Africa with the second contingent.

**KITCHENER'S ACTIVITY.**

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 27.—General Kitchener has left Naauport and gone northward.

A rapid concentration of troops in the disturbed districts, through the personal energy of General Kitchener, has allayed the loyal uneasiness.

ZERUST, (Transvaal), Dec. 27.—The Boers captured two waggons containing Christmas luxuries des-

tinued for the camp of Lord Methuen.

**KITCHENER'S PROCLAMATION**

LONDON, Dec. 27.—Lord Kitchener according to a despatch from Johannesburg has issued a proclamation dated Pretoria, December 20th, announcing that Burghers who voluntarily surrender will be allowed to live with their families in the Government laagers until such time as the guerilla warfare has sufficiently abated to admit their returning in safety to their homes.

The proclamation also promises that all property and stock brought in at the time of the surrender will be respected and paid for if requisitioned by the military authorities.

**NEW ZEALAND AGAIN!**

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Dec. 22.—The sixth contingent of New Zealanders—two hundred strong, half being Maoris,—will sail for South Africa in three weeks.
