W. A. CURRIE HONORED

Anniversary Marked By Y's Men's Club

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — The local Y's Men's Club last night celebrated its 28th anniversary with a weekly dinner meeting and at the same time, W.A. Currie was honored by having the title of honorary member bestowed upon him.

Alex Campbell who chaired the meeting, told the gathering that the qualifications for honorary membership was very high and it was a pleasure to chair a meeting for such an occasion.

Bob Schurman, presented a book to Mr. Currie entitled "This is your life, Bill Currie" and before making the presentation, read the contents of the book.

The book, prepared after extensive research by both Mr. Schurman and George Clark, contained information about Mr. Currie leading back to his birth at McNally's Mills, N.B. in 1900.

Mr. Currie first came to the Island as an employee of the Canadian Bank of Commerce and served both in Montague and Charlottetown. He left the bank to become a credit manager with Eatons in Moncton and from there came to Prince Edward Island as credit manager with Holmans. He became secretary and treasurer and director with the firm in 1946 and retired in 1960 after 26 years with the firm.

Following his retirement he became associated with Eastern Securities for which he is now branch manager here.

A former mayor, Mr. Currie served six years as chief magistrate, being elected for the first time in 1956 by acclamation.

Also presented to Mr. Currie during the ceremonies last night was a scroll honoring him as an honorary and charter member. The scroll was drawn up by F.L. Bob Owen of the local RCAF station. Another gift was presented to him by the newly elected president, Don Baker.

REALLY STUNNED — In accepting the honor bestowed upon him, Mr. Currie said "this is one occasion when I am completely stuck for words; I am really stunned". He added "friends, I am most undeserving of all this" and commented that he appreciated the trouble

the club members had gone through to prepare this book on his life history.

He expressed pleasure at seeing many of the old charter members in attendance as well as the younger members and for the new members he felt the experience of belonging to the Y's Men would be a new and rewarding one.

In attendance for the ceremonies were Mrs. Currie along with one daughter and son-in-law; and four grandchildren.

Blood Donor Clinic Tops Quota By 16%

Yesterday was another very full and gratifying day for the members of the mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Charlottetown and the local Red Cross volunteers who assisted them. A total of 396 donors attended, 137 in the evening and another 209 in the morning to chalk up 1243 for the three days of clinics held at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown.

"This is a 116.6% result on the quota of 1065," Fremont Archer, chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee for Charlottetown said last night as he commented that this fine showing puts the city and surrounding area "in the running" for the "Manning Trophy" which is awarded each year to the centre achieving the highest percentage of its blood donor objective. Souris won this trophy in 1964 with a 141% response.

Winners in all the various competitions could not be established last evening, but it was noted that in the Bankers' Competition the Bank of Montreal had a 100% attendance of eligible donors with the Royal Bank providing stiff competition.

57 students from the Vocational Institute gave the clinics a great boost by their attendance.

The girls came out on top again in their race against the boys for "blood donor supremacy" at Prince of Wales College, 54 girls registered as against 50 boys. Today will be "Slave Day" at PWC when the boys will be the "slaves" of the girls to reverse last fall's result when the boys won out.

The "Robert Bradley" trophy will be going to the Parkdale Lions' Club this time in recognition of their 90% response of eligible donors.

Members of St. Dunstan's Basilica Parish Council of the Catholic Women's League provided volunteers at the afternoon session while representatives of the St. James Ladies' Auxiliary and the Notre Dame and Birchwood high school Red Cross council assisted at the evening session.

In extending sincere thanks to all donors, workers and boosters, Mr. Archer expressed great satisfaction with the outstanding response and particularly with the large number of new donors who had registered at this spring's clinics. He also commented on the excellent of the co-operation received from the staff at the Confederation Centre where the facilities were placed at the disposal of Red Cross free of any charge for the three days of clinics.

Last evening The Circle Workshop Players presented "Remember Mama" at the Confederation Theatre on the opening night of the Regional Festival of the Dominion Drama Festival and adjudicator, Andrew Allan, famous radio and television personality from Toronto described it as a "most entertaining evening."

Esther Pleich as Mama was singled out by the adjudicator for her "quietness of control and her constant presence" (the audience) felt even if she was not on stage, Mama was superb — without hustling or bustling," said Mr. Allan.

He also said that Uncle Chris played by Danny Dayan was quite well done and he cited

Benny Smith's portrayal of Nels as "marvelous".

Mr. Allan thought the sets were "very clever" and he congratulated the set designers and the stage crew. He said he "thought no one was inadequate."

Mr. Allan did have some criticism of the tempo of the play he felt, "it could have been a little faster." He said he thought the audience missed some of the major and minor climaxes in the play. One reason for this, that he gave was the timing, which was a little off.

The adjudicator said he "felt the play was a little over articulated."

"I Remember Mama" played to a full house at the Confederation Theatre on March 2 and received a standing ovation from the audience. Last evening there was a much smaller house with only some 500 in attendance.

High Standard Expected By Festival's Adjudicator

Andrew Allan, adjudicator of the regional festival of the Dominion Drama Festival which opened last night at Confederation Centre, said yesterday he expects the three plays to set a high standard.

Mr. Allan has just come from the Wolfville, where he adjudicated the Nova Scotia regional festival, and stated he found the standard there "surprisingly high."

He said there was a spirit in the festival there similar to one found in a good professional company.

He credited television with some of the responsibility for the high standard.

One reason for the cultural revolution in this country, he said, was the immigration of Europeans who were accustomed to live theatre and started theatre groups here when they moved to Canada.

He said theatre is an important part of community living and the audience is a participating part of theatre.

"We can't sit in an audience stewed with stupidity as we do before the TV screen," said the one time host of the television show "Q For Quest."

Mr. Allan won himself a world-wide reputation as a director of radio drama back in the days before television. He still feels there is room for radio drama. He pointed out there are some parts of Canada where television doesn't reach.

He also feels that radio drama is a good training ground for an actor as it teaches the importance of voice and timing.

Mr. Allan was formerly on the staff of the CBC but resigned two and a half years ago. He is now writing and directing. This past year he said "he has been directing a number of college plays."

He said he finds this "very enlightening. It makes me think of my craft. When dealing with college students, most of whom know very little, you have to remember so much of what you took for granted when you dealt with professionals."
